

# PARIS DEMANDS APOLOGY AND DAMAGES OF REBELS FOR SLAYING FRENCHMAN

Incident Seen as Another Spark Which Might Kindle General European War-Loyalists Use Aircraft To Head Off Insurgent Advance

### ADVANCING ON MADRID

SEVILLE, Spain, Sept. 17: (CP)—Insurgent planes bombed Madrid airdrome and government strongholds today following engagements in which three thousand Socialists were killed as the Fascists advanced on Madrid. This was said in rebel broadcasts. Many government planes are reported destroyed in scattered attacks.

PARIS, Sept. 17:-The French government last night delivered an ultimatum to the rebel commander in Spanish Morocco demanding an apology and damages for the slaying of a French citizen by insurgent forces. A reply to the ultimatum within twenty-four hours was demanded. The incident is seen as another spark which might kindle a general European war.




