# RESCUERS HAVE REACHED TWO TRAPPED MEN

## Minister of Health Goes Into Shaft To Give Soothing Drug

MAY BE SEVERAL HOURS YET BEFORE DR. ROBERTSON AND HIS COMPANION CAN BE TAKEN OUT—TUNNEL HAS TO BE ENLARGED SO THEY CAN BE MOVED.

MOOSE RIVER, N.S., April 22: (CP)—Stretchers were carried down the shaft of the Moose River gold mine early this afternoon a few minutes after a digger rushed to the surface and shouted "We've got through," to Dr. E. D. Robertson, Toronto surgeon, and Alfred Scadding, who have been trapped for ten days in the mine with Herman Magill who succumbed a couple of days ago to the effects of the harrowing experience. It was expected the two surviving men would be brought to the surface "after some time" required to administer hypodermics to relieve their great pain. Hon. Dr. F. R. Davis, minister of health for Nova Scotia, volunteered to enter the treacherous mine to administer a drug asked for by Dr. Robertson. He reached the side of Dr. Robertson and Scadding with his syringe shortly after 4 p.m. (Atlantic Standard Time—12 noon Pacific Standard Time) and was administering injections while workers were enlarging the tunnel for the removal of the two men. It was believed it would require several hours to get them to the surface.

## INTERIOR IS WARM

Ice Moves Suddenly Out of Bulkley River—Possibility of Floods

SMITHERS, April 22:—The very warm weather of the last few days has caused the creeks and rivers to rise with the result that the ice, with which the Bulkley River has been filled, suddenly broke up and was carried away. A spell of warm weather or heavy rains at this time would no doubt be the cause of considerable flooding as the snow still remains low in the hills. Portions of the main roads are showing some very soft spots which are causing plenty of grief to motorists as the frost is not yet all out of the ground. Gravel is being pushed to fill up the holes that are showing up first in one place and then another but, outside of these local difficulties, the roads for the most part are in very good condition.

## Find Low Range In Teacher Pay

Some Get as Low as \$350 a Year in Ontario

LONDON, Ont., April 22: (CP)—Some rural school teachers in Ontario are paid as low as \$350 a year, it is charged before the Middlesex Trustees and Ratepayers' Association, in annual meeting by M. A. Campbell, secretary of the provincial association. He said the range of rural primary school salaries in this province is between \$350 and \$1100. He indicated that \$700 or more is the salary paid to the majority of teachers who are making their appointments permanent.

# HAZELTON VISITED BY ANOTHER BLAZE

## ARE NEARING ADDIS ABABA

Italians Within Seventy-Five Miles Of Ethiopian Capital, It Is Announced

ROME, April 22:—Italian troops had reached within seventy-five miles of Addis Ababa yesterday in their advance on the Ethiopian capital, it was announced here.

Ethiopian troops were reported today to be in mutiny on the northern front where Emperor Haile Selassie was making a last stand against the Italian advance toward the capital.

Crown Prince Asfa Wasan has taken control of the Ethiopian government on direct orders from the Emperor.

An additional war appropriation of \$115,000,000 was published in Italy's official gazette today as Fascist troops continued their drive towards Addis Ababa and were reported less than seventy miles from the Ethiopian capital. The new appropriation brings the total war provisions thus far to \$800,000,000.

## Queen Mary May Call at Halifax

Attempt Being Made to Have Giant Liner Visit Nova Scotia

HALIFAX, April 22: (CP)—Great Britain's bid for the blue ribbon of the Atlantic, the new liner Queen Mary, may visit Nova Scotia this summer.

The government of Nova Scotia has been endeavoring for months to have the Queen Mary call at Halifax in order that the people of this province may have an opportunity of viewing the world's premier liner. Hon. A. S. MacMillan, Minister of Highways, said in a statement.

## Fund For Peggy Millar Growing

Subscriptions Mount For Slain Regina Policeman's Daughter

REGINA, April 22: (CP)—Subscriptions to the Peggy Millar fund, to provide for the eight-year old daughter of Detective Charles Millar, killed in the Dominion Day riot of 1935, have reached a total of \$4,500.

Trustees of the fund have purchased Dominion of Canada and Saskatchewan provincial bonds of total par value of \$4,800. The bonds will produce an annual income of \$205. This income and a part of the principal will be used for the girl's education.

## HAD MONEY BUT "BEAT" HIS WAY

Tom Yansen Wanted to Save His Resources in Order to Enter Business in Alaska—"Gyped" Railway

Although he had \$270 in travelers' checks as well as other money in his possession, Don Yansen admitted in city police court this morning before Magistrate W. D. Vance that he had "beaten his way" into Prince Rupert by train from Prince George. On his way to Alaska from the United States, Yansen had travelled by car to Prince George but found the roads so bad beyond there that he decided to take the train for the rest of the way. He did not want to spend any money to pay his fare but wished to conserve all his resources to go into business in Alaska. Little more than a youth, he intimated that he had no desire to remain in Canada any longer than necessary but, while coming north, he thought he would like to see the central interior where he had never been before. Yansen was taken off last night's train from the east.

The young man was fined \$5, with option of five days imprisonment, and ordered to pay the fare of \$18.70 from Prince George here. The magistrate observed that this was a poor way for a young man to start out in business.

## Hunter's Dog Fights Cougar, Saves Master

Bravery of a hunting dog owned by J. Dougan, Shawinigan Lake, saved life when an eight-foot female cougar he was trailing doubled back and attacked him.

The dog, only five yards in front of the hunter, was soon laid low and the animal turned its attention to Dougan. The hunter raised his rifle in self-defence, but the dog recovered and forced itself to its feet, renewing the attack. The large cat took to flight.

Dougan and the dog commenced wary pursuit. Once again the cougar charged. The dog threw itself in front of its master, halting the attack. Dougan stood by, unable to fire in the whirl of flashing fur before him.

Suddenly the dog dropped to the ground. Dougan fired quickly at the cougar, bringing it down with a well-aimed shot.

Although badly torn the faithful dog will recover.

## BURNS LAKE YOUTH DIES

Arthur Smith, Aged 17, Succumbs To Injuries Sustained When Knocked Off Truck

Arthur Smith, aged 17, died at 3 o'clock on Monday morning in the Burns Lake Hospital as a result of injuries received the previous day when he fell off a motor truck being driven by his brother, Walter Smith.

The accident occurred in the town of Burns Lake. Deceased was riding on the rear of the truck which swerved to avoid striking children in the road. He was knocked off and sustained a broken leg and head injuries. Circumstances were entirely accidental. Parents of the dead youth reside in Burns Lake.

## Cafe, Dining Room And Barber Shop Destroyed By Early Morning Fire

Irish Lee Tong, Survivor of Islander Wreck, Suffers Loss In Conflagration—Damage is Estimated At Between \$6,000 and \$7,000

HAZELTON, April 22:—Fire, breaking out at 3:40 this morning, destroyed the O. K. Cafe and dining room and barber shop, the property being a total loss. Only the personal effects of the Chinese proprietors were saved together with a barber chair. Half of a nearby blacksmith shop was also destroyed.

The property was all owned by Lee Tong, familiarly known as "Irish," and was operated by Lee Joe.

The loss is estimated at between \$6,000 and \$7,000.

"Irish" has been located in Hazelton for many years and was one of the survivors of the wreck of the steamer Islander near Juanau many years ago.

## TO MAKE WAR ON DROUGHT

Five Separate Irrigation Schemes To Be Carried Out In Saskatchewan

REGINA, April 22: (CP)—Saskatchewan's war against summer drought will open within the next few weeks when an army of workers swings into action on construction of five separate irrigation and water conservation projects in the southern part of the province.

Following out a plan drawn up by the Dominion government in 1935, hundreds of men will commence operations at Val Marie, Adam Lake, Middle Creek, East-end, Estevan, with another project at Wood Mountain still under consideration.

The initial survey has been completed by engineers. Efforts to eliminate the hazards of feed shortage are expected to be concluded this year.

The plan at Val Marie calls for an expenditure of \$125,000 to irrigate 6,000 acres of land. The land, split into blocks of 80 acres, is expected when irrigated to supply a constant source of feed to 50,000 head of cattle in the surrounding district.

Alfalfa for feed will be cultivated widely in the area. Sponsors of the plan state stockmen will be enabled to carry large herds through a prairie winter with few losses. Contracts for excavation and timber construction on many of the projects have already been let.

Engineers are also considering erecting dams on the Wood River. The river annually floods a wide territory, and conservation of this water supply will be of great assistance to farmers.

## OFFICERS PROMOTED

Sergeant Greenwood Advanced To Staff Sergeant—McClinton, Sergeant; Raybone, Corp.

Promotions of interest affecting local officers of the provincial police are announced today, Sergeant George H. Greenwood becoming a staff sergeant; Corp. J. H. McClinton, a sergeant, and Constable Harold Raybone, a corporal.

The announcement of the promotions does not intimate any changes in the present duties of the officers.

Staff Sergeant Greenwood is a veteran of the provincial police service, having been with the force since 1913. He has been in Prince Rupert since December 1, 1934, as chief of the city force.

Sergeant McClinton has been divisional clerk here since March 1, 1931, having joined the force in February 1929.

Corp. Raybone is skipper of the provincial police boat P. M. L. 8. With the exception of one year at Hazelton he has been here since 1926. He has been with the force since 1926.

#### STAY ON JOB AT OTTAWA

Prince Rupert's member, Premier T. D. Pattullo, has gone to Ottawa to stay until he gets things cleared up. He is reported to have told a Vancouver newspaper that the present negotiations with Ottawa are of a more important character than anything that has occurred during the past twenty years. The issues between the province and the Dominion are so great that it will likely take some time to settle them.

That Mr. Pattullo is the right man to undertake the negotiations just now is indicated by his statement made before leaving for the federal capital. These are said to have been his words:

"As British Columbians it is our duty to see that the interests of our province are protected and, as good citizens of Canada, it is also our duty to endeavor to cooperate for the general welfare of Canada.

"While this may require some restraint and patience I wish to assure the public that we shall do all in our power to further the interests of our people."

It is very clear that the views of British Columbia's premier and those of the average cabinet member at Ottawa are not in accord. People of the west have different ideas from those of the east and these are not easy to reconcile. We do not want to fight the east but we may have to. We may even have to take drastic means of making the east understand that the rights of the west must be respected. This, of course, is a family difference but it is serious all the same. We hope that the provincial premier will be able to show Mr. King and Mr. Dunning that British Columbia views must have proper consideration.

#### LOOKED ON AS PAUPERS

The east looks upon the west as pauper members of the family who are making constant raids on the family exchequer. As a matter of fact, it is the west that makes the east prosperous. The east fattens on the west. The Vancouver Sun editorially draws attention to this and suggests that, if British Columbia were not a province of Canada, it might buy many goods much cheaper in Japan where it sells its products. Both Japan and British Columbia would benefit. As it is the east benefits from the partnership and howls when the usually subservient west asks for a better deal.

Algie Goes Out to Assist Disabled Alaska Cannery Tender—Prince George Nearly Finished Overhaul—North Sea Calls.

Armour Salvage Co.'s power tug Algie, Capt. Reg Green, left port during the night for Lowe Inlet to pick up and take to Ketchikan the American cannery tender St. Nicholas which became crippled with a broken tailshaft in Greenville Channel yesterday. The St. Nicholas was on her way from Seattle to Alaska for the season when the mishap occurred.

C. N. R. steamer Prince George is nearing completion of annual overhaul at the local dry dock and it is planned to take the vessel from here on May 4 to Vancouver where she will remain for a week or so before going back into service in place of the Prince Rupert for a couple of weeks before the summer service of the steamers commences. Capt. Edward Mabbs, at present chief officer of the Prince Rupert, is leaving that vessel on the present voyage to join the Prince George

here as master, Capt. James Watt, taking over as chief officer on the Rupert.

Northland Transportation Co.'s steamer North Sea, Capt. A. W. Nickerson, called in port early this morning with fresh halibut from Ketchikan for trans-shipment east over Canadian National Railways. After discharging, the North Sea continued her voyage to Seattle.

With a good sized list of passengers, C. N. R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. H. E. Nedden, arrived in port on time at 10 o'clock this morning from Vancouver. Powell River and Ocean Falls and will sail at 4 o'clock this afternoon for Anyox and Stewart whence she will return here tomorrow evening southbound.

Armour Salvage Co.'s power tug Daly, Capt. Reg Green, made a trip from Big Bay sawmill to North Pacific cannery yesterday with a scowload of lumber to be used in seasonal repair work at the cannery.

C. N. R. steamer Prince John, Capt. Neil McLean, northbound from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands, was in Massett Inlet this morning and is expected to arrive here about 6 o'clock this evening.

## TO RACE BY SAIL

Five Nations Set For Bermuda To Germany Free-For-All

HAMBURG, April 22: (CP)—An ocean sailing race like never was sailed before, with schooners and ketches competing from at least five nations, and maybe seven or eight, is being rigged up to supply a thrilling prelude to the Olympic Games in August.

Officials expect more than a score of racing craft to pull out of the harbor at Hamilton, Bermuda, on July 1 and, as the wind bellies their canvas, strike straight across 3400 of mostly open water for Cuxhaven, the finishing point of the Elbe, waterway to Hamburg.

In the long history of Atlantic sailing races—the first was fought among three American schooners in 1856—this will be the first to finish at a German port. It will be the first to have entries from more than three nations. Contenders already are assured from United States, Germany, Norway, Sweden and the Free City of Danzig. British, French and Finnish sportsmen are still negotiating.

As a matter of actual fact, the great international field will compete in two separate and distinct races. First, all of the European entries will cross to America and, after refitting, join in the classic Newport-to-Bermuda race starting June 23. Then they and the faster and better American boats will square off in the main event to Cuxhaven.

Germany, going into anything that bears the Olympic hallmark with a burst of enthusiasm, is building three new racers especially for the event and will have at least three other starters, including the Stoertebeker, which was in the 1935 race. Her new boats are designed especially to comply with the rules of the Cruising Club of America.
