MARITIMES HAVE HEAVY BLIZZARD

Provinces of Atlantic Seaboard Digging Out Today After Snowfall

One Man Dead and Two Persons Missing—Shipping Menaced by Fierce Gales—Planes Search For Two Lobster Fishermen

HALIFAX, Jan. 29: (CP)—Thousands of unemployed are today digging the Maritime Provinces out of one of the worst blizzards in years which blocked highway and rail traffic, leaving one dead, two missing and whipping gales along the Atlantic Coast which menaced shipping. Alex McKenzie died after struggling home through the blizzard. Planes are searching for two lobster fishermen who are missing in the Bay of Fundy.

Murderer of Chicago Boy Slashed to Death By Convict at Joliet

James Day, Serving Term For Larceny, Confesses to Grim Act and Tells Officials Why He Committed It

JOLIET, Ill., Jan. 29: (CP)—Slashed fifty-six times by a razor in the hands of an enraged fellow convict, Richard Loeb, co-perpetrator of the "thrill slaying" of Bobby Franks in 1924, was killed yesterday in the state penitentiary here. James Day, serving a term for larceny, confessed and blamed Loeb's persistence in pursuing him over a long period with improper advances, it was stated by Attorney Will McCabe.

TAKEN IN CHICAGO

James Lawler and Dave Anderson Arrested on Charges of Armed Robbery in Vancouver

CHICAGO, Jan. 29: (CP)—James Lawler and Dave Anderson, wanted at Vancouver on armed robbery warrants in connection with the hold-up there last December 23 of a branch of the Royal Bank of Canada when four gunmen escaped with \$3000, were arrested here Monday night and are being held for the Vancouver police.

SMITHERS ELECTION

Six Enter Contest For Three Seats On Board of Commissioners

SMITHERS, Jan. 29:—There will be six names before the voters of the Village of Smithers when they go to the polls to elect their three commissioners on February 1.

The three commissioners who have finished their terms of two years are all again in the running, these being S. J. Mayer, L. H. Kenney and Charles Morris. In addition there will be Harvey Davies, Hugh Boswell and Fred Cook seeking honours.

Under the new system the man receiving the largest number of votes will be elected for three years. The second largest number of votes will entitle the recipient to a two-year term and the third man will be elected for one year.

Hereafter there will be one man elected every year to serve a term of three years.

CHILDREN'S MEMORIAL

Five Hundred of Younger People Gather to Do Honor to Late King on Funeral Day

Some five hundred children were in attendance at the Capitol Theatre yesterday afternoon for the children's memorial service in honor of the late King George. The order of service was very similar to the general service which had been held in the morning with slight alterations to make it more adaptable for the younger folk.

City Commissioner W. J. Alder opened the proceedings and Rev. C. D. Clarke presided, giving the invocation as well as the general prayer. Hymns were "Land of Our Birth," "O God Our Help in Ages Past" and "God Save the King." J. S. Wilson led the children in singing. Miss E. P. Grassie was piano accompanist.

The scripture lesson, the Twenty-Fourth Psalm, was read by Adjutant Eva Laycock of the Salvation Army.

The address was by Rev. W. D. Grant Hollingworth. He dwelt upon the popularity of the King, ascribing as reasons for that popularity—first, his simple obedience to the laws of God, justice, purity and truth; second, his unswerving attention to duty; third, his attachment to family life; fourth, his devotion to the cause of religion.

At the conclusion of the service, Mr. Hollingworth gave a prayer for the new king, Edward VIII.

Progress Is Made In Financing Of Local Pulp Mill

Captain of Morro Castle Draws Two Years Penitentiary Term; Four Years For Chief Engineer

NEW YORK, Jan. 29:—William F. Warms, who was acting captain of the steamer Morro Castle, which burned off the Atlantic Coast in September 1934 with loss of 130 lives, was sentenced to two years in federal penitentiary by Federal Judge Herbert yesterday, following his conviction on a charge of criminal neglect for having failed to show good judgment and lacking in decision in connection with the disaster. He had been captain of the Morro Castle for only twenty-four hours, having succeeded the regular master who had died at sea.

Chief Engineer Albert, who witnesses declare was intoxicated and who was one of the first to take to the lifeboats, received a sentence of four years in penitentiary.

Henry Ichabod, vice-president of the company owning the vessel, was sentenced to one year's imprisonment but will not have to serve the time if he can pay a fine of \$5,000.

Judge Herbert expressed regret that he was prevented from imposing more than the maximum fine of \$10,000 on the Ward Line, owners of the ship.

Former Mayor Of Butte Succumbs

Lewis John Stone Passes Away At Rochester, Minn., Where He Went For Treatment

ROCHESTER, Minn., Jan. 29:—Lewis John Stone, who was mayor of Butte, Mont., between 1911 and 1915, is dead after having come here to receive treatment at the Mayo Clinic.

Provincial Constable H. L. McKenney of Terrace arrived in the city on last night's train from the interior, having in his custody five youths, committed for trial on charges of indecent assault and who will appear before Judge W. E. Fisher in County Court on Friday for election.

NAAS RIVER EXPENSES MEMORIAL REVEALED

Special Service of Mourning For King Held at Aiyansh How Much it Cost Each Candidate In Election is Shown

AIYANSH, Jan. 29:—A memorial service for King George was held Tuesday afternoon in St. Bartholomew Church at Kitlaxdamix, attended by Indian people of the Upper Naas River. A procession was formed outside Victory Hall. The village council, in their regalia, marched in front followed by the silver band, in uniform, which played the funeral march. After them came the women's auxiliary, young men and young women's associations, local Salvation Army and visiting Salvation Army from Canyon City, also Greenville Helpers' League. A large cross was carried and placed near the chancel during the service. While singing the hymn "Peace, Perfect Peace," wreaths were reverently laid at the foot of the cross to which the King's photo was attached with Union Jack for a background. The Harmonic Silver Band played "The Dead March" at the close of the service. It is estimated two hundred and fifty people were present.

Had Been Here Only Fortnight, Died on Monday

Mrs. Dorothea Louise Knutson, who came to the city only sixteen days ago from Alberta to visit with two sons here, passed away Monday evening at the home of one of the sons, 324 Seventh Avenue East. She was a Norwegian, seventy-nine years of age and came here with her husband. She had been a resident of Canada for thirty years.

Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers.

Chicago College Professor Plans Old Age Pensions

CHICAGO, Jan. 29:—Dr. Frank G. Dickinson of the University of Chicago has a new plan to provide old age pensions. He would tax bachelors and old maids as well as childless couples. Couples with one child or two would receive partial exemption while those with more than two children would be accorded complete exemption.

Old Massett In Mourning Over Death of King

MASSETT, Jan. 29:—The news of the death of King George V created a profound impression among the native people of Old Massett. The British flag was flown at half mast and a period of mourning observed. Rev. A. Abraham arranged special Church services appropriate to the occasion.

Great interest was manifested in the message broadcast over CROV by Chief Andrew Paul of Squamish who recalled that the late King George visited Canada as H. R. H. Duke of York and Prince of Wales and that three native Chiefs from British Columbia were invited to attend the Coronation in London, England, in 1911. Thus a great honor was conferred on the whole race.

The people of Old Massett are in line with others in their allegiance to the British King and their loyalty to the British connection. Several of their number volunteered their services during the Great War, of whom there is now but one survivor. The very great interest shown by the new King, Edward VIII, in the native people during his visit in 1919 as H. R. H. Prince of Wales, to British Columbia, will always be remembered.

Dr. Townsend In Bed With Severe Cold After Trip

JUST A MATTER OF WEATHER

Arrivals on the steamer from the south this morning doubtless felt it was not very pleasant stepping out into a drizzly rain but at the same time in many parts of the continent there was sub-zero weather and snow that blocked highways and railways and destroyed telegraphic and other communication. Our little period of pleasant frosty sunny weather seems to have passed but we may get more before the winter is over. At this time of year it is rather pleasant living in Prince Rupert.

THE HYDE COLLECTION

The Hyde collection of Indian curios has been handed over to the Prince Rupert Museum for safe keeping and as soon as necessary facilities have been provided will be placed on exhibition in the room over the library. While it has not yet been unpacked it is said to be an excellent collection and one that should prove a great attraction to the museum. Most of the smaller articles will have to be placed in glass cases in order to insure against loss from people who forgetfully place little things like this in their own pockets.

NO MORE REPRIEVES

It is satisfactory to hear from Governor Hoffman of New Jersey that there will be no more reprieves for the convicted baby killer, Hauptmann. At this distance from the event and without knowing the detail of the evidence it is difficult for people to form a correct opinion as to the justice of the case, but in view of the fact that the man was caught with the ransom money on him and that a jury of twelve men has decided that he is guilty, it seems difficult to understand why there should be delay in carrying out the execution. Others doubtless were connected with the case but that does not excuse the man who has been convicted. These delays help to bring the American system into disrepute.

SPORT CHAT

Some things the National Hockey League has brought out in two months of campaigning: Mike Karakas, pitched into the opener for Chicago Black Hawks, committed the season's biggest theft right off the bat. He stole Lorne Chabot's job. By the time the veteran Chabot, Vezina Trophy winner last season, was ready for goaling duty, Karakas was an institution. Two years ago Wilf Cude made a similar play at the expense of John Ross Roach. Detroit Red-Wings called on Cude to fill in for the injured Roach and Wilf was largely responsible for Detroit winning the N. H. L. title. Now with Montreal Canadiens, Cude is rated by many as the game's best goalie.

It so happens that hockey's outstanding netmen of last year aren't around in 1936. Alex Connell, hero of Montreal Maroons' Stanley Cup triumph, couldn't get off work to play again and Maroons are fighting without him. Chabot hasn't a hockey job. Syd Howe of Detroit hasn't been the goal-scoring sensation they expected him to be with a strong club. But he's still a swell forward. Cooney Weiland, shifted back to Boston from Detroit went right back among the point-collecting leaders and Marty Barry, who went to Detroit in the same deal, also benefitted by the change.

Leroy Goldsworthy is proving himself a brilliant big leaguer with Canadiens after many seasons in the minors and, most amazing of all, little Aurel Joliat is just about as great as ever. Howie Morzen is so good with the Black Hawks that he may get all-star mention for the first time in three seasons. It hasn't been a terrific year for Charlie Conacher and Harvey Jackson and the reason is they have been checked harder than ever before. Johnny Gottselig and Paul Thompson of Chicago, who don't play on the same line, have jumped into the front line with Conacher and Jackson.

The early season's best coaching job was done by Red Dutton of New York Americans, whether or not the Americans get into the playoffs. Sylvio Mantha, another player-coach, is going to give Dutton a battle for that third playoff berth in the Canadian section. The best rookie of the year hasn't put his head above the pack, unless it's Karakas. Art Jackson of Toronto, Paul Drouin, the Bercier brothers and Joffre Desilets of Canadiens, are some of the good ones.

Toronto's King Clancy is still going—but not as fast as in other seasons. The end isn't far off for the King Players are saying that Babe Selbert is as good an all-around defenceman as Eddie Shore. The two give Boston the best defence in the league. Eddie Goodfellow of Detroit, Cy Wentworth of Maroons and Red Horner of Toronto are as good as either of the Bruins, according to some opinions.
