GRANBY IS GOING OUT OF BUSINESS

Famous Mining Company Decides to Liquidate And To Divide up Its Capital

Allenby Properties Will Not be Sold at Present Time—Distribution of \$5 Per Share to be Made Soon—Liquidators Are Appointed

NEW YORK, Jan. 24: (CP)—Stockholders of the Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting & Power Co. of Vancouver today approved voluntary dissolution of the company's affairs at a meeting here. It was decided at the same time that the Allenby properties in the Similkameen district would not be sold without further consideration and approval. These have been closed since 1930 and maintenance charges on the shutdown basis approximate \$30,000 annually.

NO MOVES ON METAL

President Roosevelt Has Not Heard of Silver Revaluation Or Currency Stabilization

WASHINGTON D. C., Jan. 24: (CP) — President Franklin D. Roosevelt said that he had not heard of a rumored government move to revalue silver which would jump the coinage value of the metal to \$1.29 per ounce.

The chief executive offered comment on the rumor of the possible establishment of a free gold market and did not think any conversations were going on in connection with international currency stabilization.

Late King Is Honored During Air Program

Tribute to the memory of the late King George V, was paid last night on the regular weekly radio broadcast of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, Col. S. D. Johnston, officer commanding, First North B. C. Regiment, 102nd Battalion, gave a sketch of the late King's career. Mrs. D. V. Smith recited "Recessional" and Piper S. G. Leslie played two laments.

The air program also included quadrilles by a Scottish orchestra consisting of James L. Lee, James Watt, John Bremner and J. B. MacKay and vocal solos by Mrs. H. N. Brocklesby.

IS DESIGNATED "QUEEN MOTHER"

LONDON, Jan. 24: (CP)—King Edward VIII today designated widowed Queen Mary as "The Queen Mother," thus ending a controversy as to her proper title.

Liquidating value of the company's quick assets as of December 31 equalled \$10.06 per share and it was said there was possibility of a distribution of the capital of at least \$5 per share being made next month.

Nathan L. Amster, chairman of the board, and A. S. Baillie were appointed liquidators at a salary of \$12,000 each.

STARVATION THREATENS ONTARIO TOWN

Where Lindberghs Have Found Sanctuary in Wales

Aubrey Morgan, brother-in-law of Mrs. Lindbergh. A strange aspect of the case is the fact that the same men and reporters who Col. Lindbergh found so ubiquitous in the United States are still with him in Wales. They have laid a veritable siege to the old mansion.

Intense Cold Wave Over Area in Eastern Canada--United States

Eighty-Four Are Estimated Dead With Many Injured And Destruction Heavy—Pittsburg Has Bad Fire, Losing Five Lives

FORT FRANKS, Ont., Jan. 24: (CP)—Hunger and starvation threaten the sixty inhabitants of this tiny village which is isolated by snowdrifts seven feet deep blocking all road and rail communication with the outside world since Monday. Food supplies are exhausted. There was no bread this morning and a call for aid has been sent to Toronto.

Death Toll Heavy NEW YORK, Jan. 24:—Death toll as a result of the severe cold snap which is continuing today throughout the East and Middle West with no expectation of relief within 24 hours was estimated this morning at 84. Four below zero was recorded in New York this morning while Chicago reported 15 below with 24 below registered in certain suburbs of that city. International Falls, Minnesota, with 65 below zero, was the coldest point in the entire country to report.

Storm warnings covering the entire Atlantic seaboard from Maine to New Jersey were still being issued today. Last night a sixty-mile frigid wintry gale was reported to have torn the Nantucket lightship away from its moorings.

Highways throughout the country are blocked with snow. Huge drifts even in West Virginia are reported. Trains in the Middle West are running hours behind schedule and aerial transportation is seriously interfered with.

As a result of the intense cold, there have been serious fires at many places. The worst is reported from Pittsburg where two buildings were destroyed by a spectacular conflagration which resulted in five persons losing their lives while several are in hospital. It was one of the worst fires in years for Pittsburg. A number of paint barrels exploded during the height of the blaze. The severe cold and snow made it difficult for the firemen to fight the blaze.

At Swift City, Indiana, a school was burned down. Chicago had 176 fire alarms.

FIVE DEAD FROM FIRE

Fatal Conflagration In St. John's, Newfoundland, Early This Morning

St. John's, Nfld., Jan. 24: (CP)—Mrs. Anthony Noas and three children, Davis, aged six, Robert, 4, and Angela, 3, and Zifield Sheppard, maid, were suffocated today when an early morning fire destroyed their three storey home here.

Anthony Noah, father, was the only member of the household to escape. He rushed to telephone the alarm when he discovered the fire.

PERISHED IN BLAZE

Ottawa Woman And Daughter Met Death When Fire Destroyed Their Home

OTTAWA, Jan. 24: (CP)—The body of Gwendolyn Gladman, aged 20, was recovered from the ruins of her home here today. She and her mother had met death when flames destroyed to building last night. A sister, Helen, and two neighbors were injured.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Paul Kazoolin Asks Support of Members of Rotary Club In His Work Here

At the Rotary Club luncheon yesterday afternoon in the Commodore Cafe, Paul Kazoolin, the recently appointed physical instructor here for the provincial government, spoke briefly of his work in the city. He mentioned the need of physical recreational activity in a city such as Prince Rupert and asked for the support of the members of the club in his work. He thought they would soon come to realize how valuable the work might become.

MINISTRY IS FORMED

Sarraut is New Premier of France; His Cabinet is Anti-Italian

PARIS, Jan. 24:—Albert Sarraut, who was Premier of France in 1933, today completed the task of forming a new cabinet for France to succeed the ministry of Premier Pierre Laval which was overthrown this week.

The new cabinet, a left centre coalition, is entirely sympathetic to the League of Nations and in favour of an anti-Italian policy as far as the Italo-Ethiopian conflict is concerned.

Former Premier Pierre Flandin is the new foreign secretary in succession to Laval.

After having resigned, Laval declined the invitation of President Lebrun to form a new cabinet and then Sarraut was called upon and accepted.

GENERAL HOLIDAY

All But Essential Activities Will Close on Funeral Day Of King George

VICTORIA, Jan. 24: (CP)—Liquor stores and beer parlors will be closed in the province next Tuesday, the day of the King's funeral, and theatres have decided to close until 6 p.m.

This is in addition to the general proclamation of a public holiday as a day of mourning which will close legislative buildings, courts, public buildings, schools and stores.

Generally, only essential public facilities will operate in the province.

VETO DOES NOT COUNT

House Passes Soldiers' Bonus Over President's Head—Senate Expected To Do Likewise

WASHINGTON D.C., Jan. 24: (CP)—The House of Representatives today voted 324 to 61 to override President Franklin D. Roosevelt's veto of the compromise soldiers' bonus bill, providing for the payment of more than \$2,000,000,000 in bonuses.

The overriding vote took place shortly after the vetoed measure had been returned from the White House. The vote was overwhelmingly more than the two-thirds necessary to override.

The bill now goes to the Senate where it is expected the veto will also be overridden.

Electric Eye Explained And Demonstrated

The work of the electric eye was explained and demonstrated at the Rotary Club luncheon yesterday afternoon by J. J. Little and it was shown how it might be applied to a number of businesses of the members, especially in protection against burglary, for traffic lights and other purposes. The principle depended upon the conversion of radiant energy into electrical energy.

Mr. Little explained how it might be possible to start or stop the whole operation of his power plant by flashing a ray of light on the electric eye in the banquet hall.

GETTING TOGETHER

The reaction in the United States to the death of King George has been one of the most astounding things in history. Those who look back a few years and remember the feeling of hostility in the States to anything British can best appreciate the wonderful change that has taken place in public sentiment there in the last two decades. The American newspapers and radio broadcasts have outdone even the Canadians in the amount of space and time given to the passing of the King. There has never been anything like it in the past. Evidently there is a drawing together of the British and American people which augurs well for the future of the world.

THINKING NATIONALLY

It has always been difficult to educate the people of a country to a point where they can think nationally. People as a rule take little interest in national problems. They are much more concerned for the city, town or village in which they live than in the great questions of the day. Newspapers by playing up prominently the big news can do a great deal to interest people in the big news of the day. As a matter of fact that is usually done. Possibly crime is featured rather much, but after all the existence of a criminal population in a country is of national importance as showing something that should be eradicated.

In spite of all that has been done, much of the population thinks parochially instead of nationally. The effects of the tariff, the reaction of the government to the League of Nations and other national and international news is only vaguely appreciated by a great many people. They are much more interested in the condition of the sidewalk in front of their houses, the method of garbage disposal and other small town problems.

It is only when something happens such as the death of the King that we find the people responding with a wave of patriotism that carries everything before it. That is a type of national thinking but it is emotional rather than practical. Yet it augurs well for the country that it should be so.

DETROIT, Jan. 24: (CP)—Detroit Red Wings, playing on their home ice, defeated the New York Rangers by a score of 4 to 2 last night and increased their margin of leadership in the American section of the National Hockey League to one and a half games over Chicago Black Hawks who were playing a one-all draw at Montreal with the Canadiens. The Toronto Maple Leafs suffered another defeat by a score of 3 to 2 at the hands of the Americans in New York. The Americans are again on even terms with the Canadiens for third place in the international section.

HER VOICE VERY FINE

Dame Clara Butt was Great Singer And Great Personality

NORTH STOKE, Oxford, Eng., Jan. 24: (CP)—A great singer and a great personality was one of the tributes paid to Clara Butt, Dame Commander of the Order of the British Empire, who died yesterday. Her contralto voice was considered by most music critics singularly wide in range and strong in tone. Ballad and oratorio singing became her forte.

Besides possessing the characteristic attributes of a great singer, she was intensely human, simple in her tastes, easily approachable and one who thought first of service to her country and to the world and then of herself.

World-acclaim of her talents as a singer did not alter or diminish her interest in home life. Her loyalty found wider expression than in mere patriotism—her outlook on life was international in character.

By nature she was gentle, grave and deliberate. Her voice impressed critics as low an bell-like in quality. Her rendering of the lowest tones in the scale was characterized as awe-inspiring in its richness and fullness. Her statuesque figure seemed a contradiction to her essential simplicity of manner.

Found Voice at Twelve

Born in Southwick, Sussex, Eng., February 1, 1873, Clara Butt "discovered" her voice when she was only 12. She won a scholarship at Bristol where she sang at "penny concerts" and small gatherings. The scholarship gave her three years' training at the Royal College of Music in London.

Later she said a series of scholarships paid the cost of training her voice. She made her debut in 1892, singing in Gluck's "Orfeo" with R. C. M. students.

In 1900 she married Kennerley Rumford, also a singer of some distinction. Her ambition from an early age was to be a great singer. Aware of the qualities of her voice, she was anxious to pass on the gift to others for their enjoyment.

During the War
During the war both she and her husband devoted themselves to war work. She organized concerts to relieve distress among artists poverty-stricken as an indirect result of the national emergency. She helped supply funds for needy women in general in Britain. She sang for the Red Cross.

In 1920 her services to her country were recognized when she was made a Dame Commander of the Order of the British Empire in the New Year's honor list. When wireless began to be developed, she expressed a desire to sing to the whole world. Aware that eventually some singer's voice would sound right around the world, she hoped that voice would be her's.

"I want above all things that that voice shall be mine... I would like my voice to do something to bring to pass the glorious day when war shall be no more," she said, according to Winnifred Ponder in her book "Clara Butt."

Dame Clara went to Canada in 1922 on a concert tour, her husband accompanying her. She was in the Dominion again the following year. At Toronto the latter visit coincided with that of David Lloyd George, Britain's war-time prime minister.

Amusing Incident
An amusing incident occurred at Calgary in 1923. Dame Nellie Melba, the great Australian soprano, was also touring Canada. Their agents booked them for the same night in Calgary, intentionally it was said, because of keen local rivalry. The principals were unaware of their coincident dates, however, and a
