ITALY IS BECOMING INDEPENDENT

'JIMMY' THOMAS REITERATES HIS DENIAL

Proposed to Cut Off Imports Entirely Of Sanctionist Nations

Did Not Know and Had Never Heard Before Of Men Who Made Charges

Report of Judicial Inquiry in British Budget Secret Leakage is Expected to be Made Next Week

LONDON, May 20: (CP)—Rt. Hon. James H. Thomas, Colonial Secretary, denied before a judicial inquiry today that he had been in any way responsible for premature disclosure of budget secrets.

The inquiry started when it was disclosed that persons took out insurance against an increase in income and tea taxes which were provided for in the budget.

Mr. Thomas, who previously said he was "so anxious to clear my honor and the honor of my son" who was also implicated by witnesses, said he did not know and had never before heard of the witnesses who connected him with the revelation of the budget secrets.

The report of the inquiry is expected to be made next week.

The Hindenburg, which had taken 78 hours and 27 minutes for its second commercial westward crossing from Frankfurt-on-Main to the naval station here, will take off late today on her return flight.

JOIN WITH UNCLE SAM

New York Congressman Proposes Canada and States Get Together to End Idleness

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 20—Going so far as to suggest that Canada might voluntarily annex itself to the United States, Congressman William I. Sirovich, Democrat, New York, proposed in the House of Representatives that Canada and United States might co-operate to work themselves out of unemployment and the depression.

Canada, declared Sirovich, was the logical point of expansion for the excess industrial population of the United States.

NEW JERSEY FOR LANDON

Kansas Governor Favored Over Idaho Senator—Rhode Island Strong For Roosevelt

TRENTON, N.J., May 20—In the Republican presidential primaries for the state of New Jersey yesterday Governor Alfred Landon of Kansas was last night leading Senator W. E. Borah of Idaho by a vote of four to one.

PROVIDENCE, D.I., May 20—Rhode Island Democrats yesterday instructed their delegation of 18 to the Democratic national convention in Philadelphia to vote as a unit for President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Leaving Here To Make His Home In Gloucestershire

John A. Wynes, who has been located in this district since 1913, having spent a large part of that time engaged in ranching in the Naas Valley, will be leaving here on May 29 to his native home in Gloucestershire, England, to resume his residence. He will go east from here by rail and will embark from Montreal on the steamer Montrose on June 6.

Would Clip Wings Of Supreme Court

WASHINGTON D.C., May 20—Following the decision of the United States Supreme Court invalidating the Guffey Coal Act, Labor interests are continuing to press for the making of constitutional amendments to curtail the powers of the Supreme Court over legislation an issue in the following election campaign.

OTTAWA, May 20: (CP)—A Parliamentary committee will be established at the next session of the House of Commons to consider the advisability of substituting the lethal gas chamber for hanging in murder cases in Canada.

BUY SILVER FROM CHINA

United States Trying to Help Oriental Nation to Stabilize Her Currency

WASHINGTON D.C., May 20 (Canadian Press)—The United States has agreed to buy large amounts of silver from China to provide dollar exchange to help China stabilize her currency, it is announced by Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau.

NANKING, May 20 (Canadian Press)—A high authority of the Chinese government today said that the new Sino-United States financial agreement provided for the purchase by the United States of 75,000,000 ounces of Chinese silver at average prices. This would give China about \$25,000,000 of gold credit in the United States.

Base Metals Low On Stock Mart

TORONTO, May 20: (CP)—Quoted values of stocks listed on the Toronto Stock Exchange dropped \$17,837,208 in April to \$4,712,799.705. Aggregate value was still \$954,705,161 above that of May 1 of last year.

The heaviest decline of the month was in the base metal stocks. These were down \$77,652,292 in the aggregate from the total of a year ago. Market value of 24 utilities declined \$42,000,000 and 17 oil stocks lost \$34,000,000.

NAMU GETS NEW PLANT

B. C. Packers to Utilize Cannery Offal There—Operation Of Shannon Bay Confirmed

VANCOUVER, May 20: (CP)—Confirming announcements already published in the north, the British Columbia Packers announced here today that the salmon cannery at Shannon Bay in Massett Inlet which has been idle for six years is being put in shape for operation this year.

The company also announces that a new reduction plant is being built at Namu in Fitzhugh Sound to make use of offal from the salmon cannery which will be converted into oil and cattle food.

Another plant at Esperanza Inlet on the West Coast of Vancouver Island will also be put into operation and new boats built to supply it.

CONNELL TO COME NORTH

C.C.F. Leader to Take Part Personally in Omnica Campaign—Godwin Candidate

VICTORIA, May 20 (Canadian Press)—Rev. Robert Connell, C.C.F. leader, will take part personally in the Omnica by-election campaign, it was announced today.

Mr. Connell expects to be in the district about June 16, speaking at various points of importance in the north.

### LOSS TO BRITISH COLUMBIA

The death of B. C. Nicholas of Victoria is a distinct loss to British Columbia. As mentioned a few days ago he was a man of outstanding personality and was spoken of as the most likely candidate to contest the constituency in the by-election there.

One of Mr. Nicholas's hobbies was advising and coaching young men. Bruce Hutchinson, one of the cleverest writers in the west, was helped during the early days of his career by Mr. Nicholas as were a number of other young Victorians. When a high school boy was preparing for a debate it was not uncommon for him to ask Mr. Nicholas for help. Hours of his time would the Times editor give to coach the lad and prepare him to present his case properly. Politicians and financiers would be kept waiting so that the schoolboys could have the guidance which was considered necessary. Having no family of his own Mr. Nicholas took the keenest interest in other people's boys and numbers of these can point back to the inspiration received from this source which has stood them in good stead throughout their lives.

### A FRIENDLY GESTURE

As a friendly gesture, one of the United States congressmen is proposing to suggest to Canada that she throw in her lot with the United States. It is said that forty United States senators are back of the movement to invite Canada to join them.

We appreciate the good-will gesture but we think Canadians generally are not ready to change their allegiance just now. What the future will bring forth no one can say. Conditions may change in Canada, United States and Great Britain. No one knows what the future will do for any of us. Just now, however, we do not think Canada would be receptive to such a proposal.

From the Waterfront

On a month's charter to the A. P. Allison Logging Co. for use in transporting logging railway equipment from the mainland to the logging camp at Cumshewa Inlet, Queen Charlotte Islands, the Armour Salvage Co.'s big power tug Algy, Capt. Reg Green, left at the end of last week for Alert Bay. The Algy took with her two large scows. Locomotives, cars and other equipment are to be taken across Hecate Straits from various mainland points including Alert Bay and Bella Coola.

Back on the run in place of the Prince Rupert, C. N. R. steamer Prince George, Capt. Edward Mabbs, arrived in port at 11 this morning from Vancouver, Powell River and Ocean Falls with a fair-sized list of passengers and will sail at 4 o'clock this afternoon for Anyox and Stewart whence she will return here tomorrow evening southbound.

C. N. R. steamer Prince John, Capt. Dan McKinnon arrived in port at 8 o'clock this morning from

Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands and will be here until 10 o'clock Friday when she will sail on her return south over the same route.

Capt. Albert Rippon arrived in the city on the Prince George this morning from Vancouver to act as pilot of the freighter Hartington which is due from the Orient on Friday to load timber cargo. Capt. 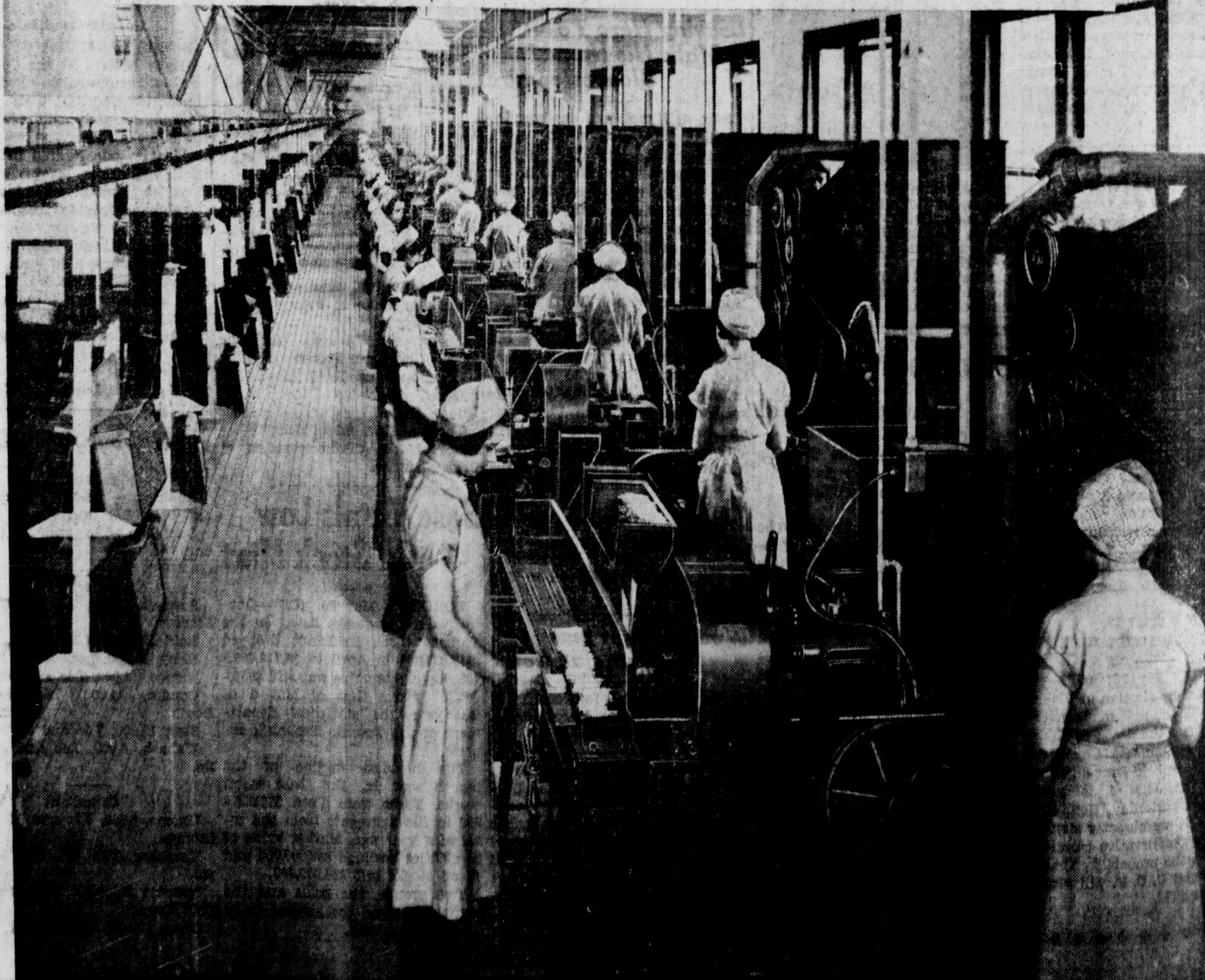

## Law Has Slump In Old London

LONDON, May 20: (CP)—Hundreds of barristers in London are unemployed and judges are without cases to try as a result of the biggest slump in the law courts since the century began.

High cost of litigation and the effects of the 1931 trade depression are given as causes. Eminent counsel are said to be feeling the pinch and judges who last year were overworked and facing long lists of unheard cases, are now up to date with their work.

During and after the 1931 depression people were disinclined to litigate, the effect now being fully felt. Strong comments have been made by some judges on high costs of trials. The legal profession is overcrowded but some quite prominent counsel are included among the lawyers feeling the slump.

## GRADS FACE GOOD FILM STIFF PLAY

**Will Tackle Team of Six-Footers in El Dorado Oilers**

EDMONTON, May 19 (CP)—By the time J. Percy Page and his Edmonton Grads depart in mid-June for Europe, the Olympics, an exhibition tour and much sight-seeing, they will pretty well have earned the holiday. Not many champions recognize all challengers as the Grads do.

Because of this, it is barely possible the world's women basketball champions will start overseas without a title. They open a best-of-five series at home May 28 against El Dorado Oilers, and this is the most important series Grads have ever engaged in. If you don't think so, just ask them.

The Oilers, it must be understood, were known as the Presbyterian College team of Durant, Okla., three years ago. They went into Edmonton and defeated the Page girls in a series played half under girls' rules and half under men's. It marked the only time Grads have been beaten in a series since their organization in 1915.

**Important Series**  
So you see how important this coming affair is to Edmonton. This time they will play men's rules and the Underwood International Trophy, held since it was donated in 1923, will be at stake. Grads will start thinking about the European trip when they are finished with the Oilers.

The El Dorado girls are playing this season for an oil company. Two years ago they moved from the Durant Presbyterian College—and they moved bag and baggage, coach included—to Oklahoma City, where they were sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce. Last year they represented Holdenville, Okla., with expenses paid by a wealthy Indian. It's the same Holdenville which bred Dizzy and Paul Dean.

Grads have already beaten teams ranked No. 1 and No. 3 in the United States. First it was the American Institute of Business Girls teams from Des Moines, Ia., No. 3 outfit, and then the 1936 U. S. champions, Tulsa Stenos. Those Stenos, Page asserts, were a great team.

"It will be hard for Edmonton fans to picture stronger competition than that furnished by Tulsa," he says, "but, if any is to be found it will probably come from the El Dorado quintet."

"To explain this statement, it should be pointed out that in six pre-tournament contests between the Tulsa and El Dorado teams, the latter won five games and tied the sixth. Whether it was the law of averages or just hard luck is a matter of opinion, but the fact remains that in the final game of the American tournament the hitherto unbeaten El Dorado girls dropped a one-point decision to their opponents from Tulsa."

## Very Tall Girls

These El Dorado ladies average close to six feet in height and they live for basketball. They are the No. 2 ranking team in the United States, but Page fears they may be the uncrowned champions.

Grads, win or lose, will leave Edmonton June 19 and visit England, Scotland, France, including Nice and Monte Carlo; Italy, Switzerland, Germany, Holland and Belgium. Women's basketball isn't on the Berlin Olympic program but Grads hope to play an exhibition during the games.

They will be away until September and maybe by that time it won't seem important how they made out against those Oilers.

## SPORT CHAT

Plenty of accommodation will be available in Berlin for visitors to the Olympic Games this summer. Officials say 210,000 beds have been arranged for but it is likely 40,000 more will be needed.
