### WAS NOTED JOURNALIST

C. Nicholas Was Outstanding Commentator and Personal Newspaperman

VICTORIA, May 20: (CP)-The late B. C. Nicholas, publisher of the Victoria Times, who died suddenly in his office yesterday afternoon of heart trouble, had been feeling unwell since his return from a recent trip to Eastern Canada. He was unwell when he came to his office yesterday morning but he stayed at his desk. He collapsed suddenly in the early afternoon and medical treatment failed to revive him.

Mr. Nicholas was born in Virginia City, Nevada, in 1879 and came to Victoria as a small boy CHICAGO, May 20—James Kelly, with his parents. He started work with the Times in 1900. He was secretary to Hon. William Templeman while the latter was in the Laurier government from 1907 to 1911. Then he returned to the Times and became its editor in

#### LOSS TO BRITISH COLUMBIA

The death of B. C. Nicholas of Victoria is a distinct loss to British Columbia. As mentioned a few days ago he was a man of outstanding personality and was spoken of as the most likely candidate to contest the constituency in the by-election there.

One of Mr. Nicholas's hobbies was advising and coaching young men. Bruce Hutchinson, one of the cleverest writers in the west, was helped during the early days of his career by Mr. Nicholas as were a number of other young Victorians. When a high school boy was preparing for a debate it was not uncommon for him to ask Mr. Nicholas for help. Hours of his time would the Times editor give to coach the lad and prepare him to present his case properly. Politicians and financiers would be kept waiting so that the schoolboys could have the guidance which was considered necessary. Having no family of his own Mr. Nicholas took the keenest interest in other people's boys and numbers of these can point back to the inspiration received from this source which has stood them in good stead throughout their lives.

#### A FRIENDLY GESTURE

As a friendly gesture, one of the United States congressmen is proposing to suggest to Canada that she throw in her lot with the United States. It is said that forty United States senators are back of the movement to invite Canada to join them.

We appreciate the good-will gesture but we think Canadians generally are not ready to change their allegiance just now. What the future will bring forth no one can say. Conditions may change in Canada, United States and Great Britain. No one knows what the future will do for any of us. Just now, however, we do not think Canada would be receptive to such a proposal.






