TONGUES WAGGING

Gossip Aplenty About Former King Edward and Mrs. Simpson—May Live in Victoria?

LONDON, Dec. 19.—According to gossip here the Duke of Windsor, the former King Edward VIII, and Mrs. Wallis Simpson may be married at sea by the captain of a yacht after she secures her final decree of divorce and make an extended honeymoon tour on the ocean.

The former King was reported today to be in better spirits again in Austria after having been worried yesterday over the possibility of some hitch arising in connection with Mrs. Simpson's divorce.

It was stated at Cannes that Mrs. Simpson had received many invitations from various points in the United States to make her future home after she has married the former King.

One suggestion was that the couple might go to Victoria, British Columbia. The Duke has always been a great favorite there.

Would Take Jail Rather Than Pay Fine - Townsend

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 19.—Dr. Francis E. Townsend, father of the pension plan bearing his name, whose former supporters are now endeavoring to oust him as head of the organization, says that, in the event of his being indicted and convicted on charges being laid against him, he will go to jail rather than pay a fine.

HIS REAL INTEREST

Solving Drought More Important To Herman Trelle Than Grain Title

EDMONTON, Dec. 19: (CP)—Herman Trelle, Wembley, Alta., 'Wheat King,' returning from his triumphs at Chicago International Livestock and Grain Show, declared he was more interested in talking about relieving the drought situation than in discussing his grain titles.

The winner of the 1936 wheat and oats crown said he wished people would forget about my wheat prize. The important thing is not winning prizes but growing highest quality wheat seed to be used in improving the standard of Western Canada grain production.

NEGOTIATE FOR PEACE

Terms For Settlement of Chinese Civil War Under Discussion—Kai-Shek Home Soon?

NANKING, China, Dec. 19: (CP)—High officials of the Chinese government were called into session yesterday under protection of armed guards to hear what were believed to be the terms of Marshal Chang Hsueh-Liang, Communist rebel leader of Sianfu, to end the civil war and free Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek.

It was reliably reported that General Tin-Wen, who arrived from Sianfu with Chang's demands, had brought a letter signed by General Chiang Kai-Shek urging the Nanking government to halt military action against Chang's mutineers.

The terms suggested by Chang are said to be that a cash payment should be made by the Nanking government which would be distributed among homeless rebel soldiers and that Chang Hsueh-Liang would go into exile.

In some quarters it was expected that Chiang Kai-Shek, reported earlier in the week to have been slain, would be home by today.

TACTICS SWITCHED The Nanking government, in a sudden switch of tactics late today against the rebellious Chang Hsueh-Liang, ordered punitive military operations against Sianfu to be reopened Sunday unless Chiang Kai-Shek is released.

Reports Conflict As To Condition Of Holy Father

VATICAN CITY, Dec. 19: (CP)—Vatican officials displayed confidence yesterday that Pope Pius was on the way to recovery. This was in spite of reports the previous day that the Pontiff was no longer able to walk unassisted and that the circulation of the right foot was becoming very poor like the left. In addition to his other ailments, the Holy Father is afflicted with varicose veins. He is still attending to many of his duties.

Oscar Landry, district superintendent of Government Telegraphs, and Mrs. Landry sailed Thursday night on the Prince Rupert for Vancouver where they will spend the Christmas and New Year holiday season.

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Faint Radio Signals Cause Revival After Hope Had Nearly Gone

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 19: (CP)—Faint radio messages, the indistinct sound of a man's weak voice, have been picked up time and again by searchers hunting for the Western Air Express twin-motored Boeing transport planes which has been missing since Monday with four passengers on a derew of three.

HIGHEST PRICE FOR COPPER AND LEAD IN SEVEN YEARS TODAY

NEW YORK, Dec. 19: (CP)—Heavy buying of metals continued apace today, sending domestic lead to a new seven year high and export copper to a peak over a like span of years.

EDMONTON, Dec. 19: (CP)—Reorganization of the Alberta Social Credit League, founded by William Aberhart in his victorious 1935 drive to the Alberta premiership, is nearing completion and a general convention is to be held in Edmonton or Calgary soon after the New Year.

FOREIGNERS ARE ACTIVE

Fifty Thousand Outside Nationals In Spanish Civil War—France Supplying Arms

PARIS, Dec. 19:—According to information published here yesterday, there are at least fifty thousand foreigners fighting in the Spanish civil war with a large number of nations represented with their nationals. Several nations have fighters on both sides.

More nations than at first suspected have also been supplying arms to either one side or the other. In certain French quarters, it is said that France has been active in supplying the Spanish government with fighting materials.

Information is also said to have been received here that thousands of prisoners have been executed since the war started.

Withdrawing Non-Combatants MADRID, Dec. 19:—One quarter of the non-combatant population of Madrid has been withdrawn from the capital in view of the continued state of siege.

A rebel bombing plane is reported to have been brought down yesterday by the Spanish government.

British Gas Masks LONDON, Dec. 19: (CP)—Official sources explain that five thousand gas masks have been sold to the Madrid government in the last twenty-four hours but the Fascists have not requested any.

Cuban Political Crisis Still On Talk is Now Heard of Impeachment Of President Gomez on Coercion Charges HAVANA, Dec. 19:—With the political crisis between President Gomez and General Batista continuing over the 9c sugar tax which the former refuses to adopt in spite of the latter's insistence, it was reported today in authoritative quarters that proceedings might be instituted seeking Gomez' impeachment on charges of attempt to coerce members of the legislative chamber.

London Scheme Housing 11,000

County Council Undertaking Largest Project of its Kind

LONDON, Dec. 19: (CP)—The largest building scheme of its kind ever undertaken by the London County Council will provide for nearly 11,000 people in municipal flats on the site formerly occupied by the White City Exhibition.

It covers an area of 50 acres, and the proposed development is calculated to cost \$7,185,000. Provision is to be made for 2,285 dwellings, all blocks to be five storeys high and there will be shops, schools, public buildings and children's playgrounds.

The industrial average at closing was 179.42, off 1.36; rails, 54.43, off .51; utilities, 32.74, off .35.

**British Columbia Leading**

British Columbia is leading Canada in business recovery, according to statistics which continue to pour in. The latest to attest the truth of the statement is "Canadian Business," published under the wing of the Montreal Board of Trade, in an article "How's Business?" It says:

"In all probability, British Columbia continues to hold first position among Canadian provinces for an all-round high degree of business and industrial activity.

"Our monthly returns indicate that wholesale and retail trade in the province is uniformly good. Collections are equally satisfactory. This condition reflects not only the operations of lumbering companies but there is also the prosperous background of the mining industry, the large salmon pack and the favorable agricultural situation.

"The rise in base metal prices, with lead already back to 1929 levels, is of special benefit to British Columbia and the prospect of increased employment through the opening up and development of other mining properties is promising."

**Old Timers and Fishermen**

A letter arrived from the Queen Charlottes yesterday signed "A Few Old Timers and Fishermen" but, not giving the real name of the writer, it has to go to the waste paper basket along with all other unsigned letters. We have often explained that no letters can be published unless the writer signs his name although the real name may not necessarily be published.

In this case the oldtimers and fishermen, if that is really who they are, take exception to a recent visitor to Prince Rupert from the islands saying the people there could always make a living scratching the black sands for gold or catching a few fish.

In reply to this it might be well to remark that, since the advent of the relief system, many people who formerly could make a living during the winter without help now refuse to do so and call on the government to hand them out a dole on which to live and they are willing to accept it even though it be but a pittance. While taking it they grumble at the smallness of the amount and at having to work for it. There are, of course, exceptions to this. There are men who cut wood for a living during the winter, who "catch a few fish" or who seek employment of some kind and do not expect to have their food brought to them on a platter. The writer has on more than one occasion been so low in funds that he was only a few days from the bread line but on those occasions he was willing to undertake some unpleasant task until conditions changed and he had to hustle for those jobs, not waiting around until the employment officer asked if he would do the work.

There is no intention of casting a slur upon those who find themselves in difficult positions and have to ask for relief but it does seem as if all initiative had left a great many people who do nothing but hang around the streets or loaf in their shacks reading literature about what they ought to have rather than getting out and trying to adapt themselves to difficult situations. The British Empire was built by people who solved difficult problems and hustled a living from seemingly barren ground. If a person wanted a job and was willing to work he could probably get it even in Queen Charlotte City today but he would not get it by sitting in his shack and grousing about how badly he was being used by the "bourgeoisie."

**Think Mothers Retard Service**

**Teacher Says More Girls Would Go Domestic With Encouragement**

MONTREAL, Dec. 19: (CP)—Just possibly, a woman's place is in the home, but, says Miss C. I. Mackenzie, doing mothers in nine cases out of 10 prevent such domesticity for the rising generation.

The principal of Montreal High School for Girls, speaking before the Big Sisters Association here, gave her opinion the modern girl could not be blamed for less interest in home-making than her efficient grandmother.

High school girls, she said, would be happy to turn their interest to vocational work, including house-keeping, but in many cases, mothers barred their way.

Miss Mackenzie believed the most practical method of learning home-making was through domestic service. But, she added, domestic service is frowned upon either by parents or the girls themselves and is unpopular with girls from families of the poorer classes because they are not fit for such work.

To meet the situation, Miss Mackenzie favored establishment in each centre of a house where schoolgirls would be taught house-keeping which, she said, requires "a high order of intelligence, neatness, conscientiousness and certain artistry."

In such a school, young girls could be "properly fitted for domestic duties" through practical appliance of theory as part of their school curriculum.

Shipping generally was delayed on account of the wide variety of unfavorable elements but there appear to have been few major casualties either in or out of port. The most serious accident of the week was the sinking of the Armour Salvage Co.'s pile driver at the company's floats but that could be hardly attributed to the weather.

Arnold Evans is now relieving as purser of the steamer Prince John in place of Norman McLean who is ashore at Vancouver for his annual vacation. The Prince John arrived in port at 4:30 yesterday afternoon from Vancouver via Queen Charlotte Islands and will sail tonight on her return south over the same route.

Robin MacDonald has returned to his duties as assistant purser of the steamer Princess Adelaide this week after having been ashore for a month on his annual vacation.

Johnny Clausen, well known local fish packer, sailed last evening on the Cardena for a holiday trip of a couple of weeks to Vancouver, being accompanied by Mrs. Clausen.

Work of raising the Armour Salvage Co.'s pile driver which listed over and partly sank Thursday morning when it became fouled on an old pile while engaged in work at the company's floats is now in progress. The big derrick scow was being used yesterday in righting the pile driver.

John Currie & Son have started work preparatory to the carrying out of the \$8500 contract they were recently awarded for the building of an addition to the local Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve building.

The Imperial Oil Co.'s tanker Imperial was among many coastal vessels which were held up on account of the stormy weather of the past week in northern waters. The Imperial arrived Tuesday morning from Stewart and remained a couple of days at the company's local dock waiting out the storm before sailing Thursday morning for Ioco via Queen Charlotte Islands.

Having been delayed by unfavorable weather, C. P. R. steamer Princess Adelaide, Capt. Henry Anderson, is due back at 3:15 this afternoon from a special voyage to Ketchikan for a large party of passengers bound for Seattle. The vessel has to oil up here before sailing for Vancouver and will probably get away around 5 p.m.
