There is no intention of casting a slur upon those who find themselves in difficult positions and have to ask for relief but it does seem as if all initiative had left a great many people who do nothing but hang around the streets or loaf in their shacks reading literature about what they ought to have rather than getting out and trying to adapt themselves to difficult situations. The British Empire was built by people who solved difficult problems and hustled a living from seemingly barren ground. If a person wanted a job and was willing to work he could probably ret it even in Queen Charlotte City today but hel would not get it by sitting in his shack and grousing about how badly he was being used by the "bourgeoisie."






