# FOURTEEN ARE DEAD IN AIR CRASH

## SMITHERS HAS FIRE

Big Barn on George Oulton's Dairy Farm is Destroyed

## Narrow Escape

Trapped in Loft, Interior Milk Operator Nearly Lost Life

SMITHERS, Dec. 9.—The large dairy barn on the Woodlawn Dairy farm owned by George Oulton was destroyed by fire on Saturday evening about 5 o'clock.

Mr. Oulton had gone into the hay loft with a lantern to throw down hay for the cattle and had hung the lantern on a nail. The lantern fell off and landed in the hay which immediately took fire and closed off the only exit from the hay mow, trapping Mr. Oulton upstairs. He tried to kick some boards off the building to make his escape but was unable to do so but there was an opening high in the peak of the gable where hay is drawn up on a cable when putting hay into the loft and from which opening the hay cable was still hanging, left there from the work of the summer. Mr. Oulton was able to haul himself up by the studding and bracing until he reached the cable and slid down to the ground about 30 feet below. He only got out in time as the flames had covered the whole hay loft when he made his escape.

His cattle were all tied up on the ground floor and he ran around the building to the door to let the cattle out. Fortunately Doug, Storrings who was passing along the road near the place in his car saw the fire and arrived at the barn door at the same time Mr. Oulton got to the ground and between them they managed to get all the stock out of the barn although the fire had dropped from the loft and the ground floor was afire before they got them all out.

The barn, which was 70 feet long, as well as the large silo at the end of the barn, was totally destroyed.

Mr. Oulton was alone in the barn at the time but his cries brought Mrs. Oulton to the scene although she was not able to do anything to aid him. He had a miraculous escape from the fire.

The farm is situated at the bridge across the Bulkley River one mile from Smithers and the fire lit up the sky for some time. So rapid was the spread of the fire that nothing could have been done towards saving the building. There was about 55 tons of hay in the loft at the time of the fire.

Mr. Oulton carried some insurance on the building but nothing on the hay or other contents and his loss is a severe one.


## Liberal Still Has Lead Over Social Credit

## Report 100 Bombers For Britain to be Built in Canada



Montreal hears that Canadian Vickers, Ltd., of that city has signed a contract to supply the British government with 100 bombing aeroplanes at a total cost of \$1,800,000 as a result of negotiations by a representative of the Imperial government. Company officials have not confirmed the report. The Canadian Vickers, Ltd., drydock along the Montreal waterfront as seen from the air, is shown in this Canadian Airways, Ltd., photograph; the light bombing aeroplane is one of the fastest and most recent machines built for the British government in an extensive air construction program. British government plans call for this type of bomber in the rearmament drive.

## King Wants to Have Both His Throne and Mrs. Simpson; No Settlement of Crisis as Yet

LONDON, Dec. 9.—King Edward wants to retain the throne and he also wants to have Mrs. Wallis Warfield Simpson. This he is said to have intimated last night at Fort Belvedere in a conference with Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin at which his two brothers, the Duke of York and the Duke of Kent, were both present. The monarch was reported to have put the responsibility for a final decision on the question back on Premier Baldwin when he asked that the government reconsider its stand of opposition to the marriage with Mrs. Simpson as long as he remained King. He considered, according to certain reports, that the government had given him advice which it should not have done. However, he intimated that he did not intend to defy his ministers' final decision. This was taken to indicate that he was prepared to abdicate unless the government could allow him some means of marrying Mrs. Simpson.

"I want to be a King like my father," Edward is said to have declared "and, like my father, I want to have a happy home. I want to be King in a constitutional way and I am ready to devote my life to the Empire."

The Morning Post, supposedly close to the King, complained bitterly today that, whether the King remained on the Throne unwed or abdicated and married the woman of his choice, his life was bound to be unhappy.

The Express rejoiced today that the "constitutional crisis has ended" and observed that at no time had the question of the crown overriding the government ever arisen.

Prime Minister Baldwin, mentioning to Parliament today the discussion with the King, told the House that he hoped to make a statement tomorrow on King Edward's decision regarding his wish to marry Mrs. Simpson. A dramatic debate ensued. On all

Was Twenty-First Famous California Convict Had Spent Behind Bars

SAN QUENTIN, Cal., Dec. 9.—Tom Mooney, serving a sentence of life imprisonment at San Quentin Penitentiary for his participation in the fatal Preparedness Day demonstrations on Market Street in San Francisco in 1916, had his fifty-fourth birthday yesterday, it being his twenty-first behind the bars. Mooney's attorneys announced that new proceedings would be instituted in January with a view to securing him a parole.

## Dutch Air Liner Comes Down in Flames After Leaving Croydon Port

Juan de la Cierva, Inventor of Autogyro, and Admiral Arvid Lindman, Former Swedish Secretary of State, Among Those Killed

CROYDON, Eng., Dec. 9: (CP)—At least fourteen persons, including Juan de la Vierva, inventor of the autogyro, were killed today in a Dutch air liner which crashed and burned near Croydon airdrome four minutes after leaving for Amsterdam. Fifteen passengers and a crew of four were aboard. Five were dragged from the burning wreckage and rushed to hospital. Admiral Arvid Lindman, former Swedish Secretary of State, was another prominent victim.

## Evangelist Is Insulted

Aimee's Counsel Refuses to Let Her Answer Questions Regarding Alcoholic or Narcotic Dreams

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 9.—Aimee Semple McPherson had her say in court yesterday preparatory to the slander trial which is being brought against her by Rhea Crawford, former Broadway actress.

The Foursquare Gospel evangelist insisted that Miss Crawford had started all the trouble.

When asked if it was true that she (Mrs. McPherson) had dreams due to alcohol or narcotic inhibitions, the evangelist's counsel refused to permit her to answer, remarking that it was an "insulting question."

## FLOOD HAS HUGE TOLL

May Never be Definitely Known How Many Have Perished In Philippines

MANILA, Dec. 9: (CP)—Except for the general knowledge that it will run well over a thousand, there was no definite estimate up to today of the death toll left by flood waters of the Cayagan River, largest in the Philippines, which overflowed into the Cayagan farming area, Army advices said.

Entire populations of suburban clusters of native huts were wiped out in what was called the greatest disaster the Philippines had ever known.

Authorities feared the exact toll would probably never be known.

Fifty-four villages were known to be inundated in the most populous rural section of Luzon Island.

At some points flood waters reached a height of six feet over telephone poles.

## Pacific Coast Maritime Workers' Strike About Settled; Only One Union Fails to Make Agreement

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 9.—The maritime workers' strike, which has paralyzed shipping on the Pacific Coast of the United States for over a month and which spread to Atlantic and Gulf Coast ports, was believed last night to be closer to a settlement than at any time since it started forty days ago. One only union—masters, mates and pilots—had failed to reach agreement with the shipowners.

A compromise arrangement was said to have been settled upon between the shipowners and six of the seven principal unions whereby local committee would be established in each port consisting of a representative of the unions, a representative of the owners and a federal mediator, said committee to settle all disputes. The deadlock over the question of control of hiring halls appeared to be weakening. Last night there was a mass meeting in San Francisco at which representatives of both sides to the long dispute were heard. Mayor John F. Dore, who had travelled from Seattle by airplane, was one of the speakers. A sympathizer with the strikers, he reviewed the situation as he saw it in the Puget Sound area.

### Big Scrimmage

Evidently Prince Rupert is saving up for the big scrimmage during the week preceding Christmas when high and low, rich and poor make a big final effort to secure from the storekeepers the articles they need as Christmas presents for the members of the family and friends. It becomes a big game and resembles to a considerable extent the scrimmage in a game of rugby football. It is easy to avoid this scene by shopping now instead of during the last week.

### Menace of Communism

While we do not agree with some authorities in their statements that communism is an immediate menace to Canada, we do think it may become a growing menace unless steps are taken to check it. In many of the cities of Canada and also in some country districts there are communist schools attended by children, mostly of southern and western European extraction who are being taught that it is right to take and seize the good things of the world because all these things really belong to the proletariat and that today the good things are held by force by people who have no right to them.

These same children are being taught to ridicule all forms of government, all higher education, all religion. They are taught that there is no such thing as honor in this world and that spiritual development is a figment of the imagination. They are taught to prepare to take part in a great struggle in which all the wealth of the nation will be taken by force from its present owners for the use of communists and that it may be necessary to exterminate the capitalists in this country as they did in Russia.

If the teaching is anything like that outlined here it is easy to see that it does not make for good fellowship. In Russia no person is allowed to teach a child religion until he or she reaches the age of eighteen. That eliminates the Sunday School entirely. In place of it the children are taught communism. We feel that it would not be encroaching too much on the liberty of the subject to have a law forbidding the teaching of communism to the young in schools or study groups. When the children reach a less impressionistic age it does less harm.

## FAMOUS IN MANY WAYS

Dr. John Leo Chabot of Ottawa Known as Soldier, Politician, Surgeon and Sportsman

OTTAWA, Dec. 9: (CP)—Surgeon, politician, soldier and sportsman, Dr. John Leo Chabot, who died yesterday, was one of Ottawa's best known citizens. He was a noted advocate of imperialism and protection and strong supporter of unity between the English and French-Canadians.

Dr. Chabot was a Conservative member of the House of Commons for Ottawa from 1911 to 1921, when he was defeated, and sat again in the house from 1925 to 1926.

A pleasing and effective speaker in both English and French, with a peculiar charm of manner, Dr. Chabot's voice was heard often on the hustings and in Parliament in support of a policy of protection and Imperial preference. His support of the Conservative party was unwavering. One of his outstanding public services was his work for complete amity between French and English. For any cleavage between the two races he had no sympathy.

Dr. Chabot's great medical skill was placed at the disposal of the government at the outbreak of the war. As major and surgeon of the Princess Louise Dragoon Guards he was loaned to the Canadian Army Medical Corps, promoted to rank of lieutenant-colonel and placed in command of the Ottawa General Base Hospital throughout the war. He received the long service decoration.

**Born in Ottawa**

John Leo Chabot was born in Ottawa February 23, 1869, of French Canadian origin, son of P. H. and Marguerite (Ethier) Chabot. His great grandfather served in the French fleet under Napoleon I. His maternal grandfather fought under Papinau-Nelson in the rebellion of 1837.

Known in the political arena and on the athletic field as "Jerry," he made his first bid to enter Parliament as a Conservative candidate for Ottawa in 1908 and again at a by-election two years later. On both occasions he was unsuccessful. In the Reciprocity election of September 1911, Dr. Chabot was elected for an Ottawa seat in a hotly contested campaign with a majority of 353 votes.

After sitting in the House of Commons for six years, the wartime election of 1917 saw him opposed in Ottawa by the old Liberal chief, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who was contesting two ridings. Dr. Chabot was again elected, this time with a majority of 5,023. He was defeated in 1921 but elected in 1925 with his majority cut to 2,116. When Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen took office for a brief period in 1926 following the customs scandal, Dr. Chabot was made a member of His Majesty's Privy Council. In the general election that year, he met defeat.

But it was as a surgeon and lover of athletics that Dr. Chabot first came into the public eye in Ottawa. Not only did he achieve a distinguished academic and professional career, but he identified himself with various athletic associations in the capital. Early in his practice, he became one of the best known and successful surgeons culminating with his election in June 1932 as president of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario.

**Outstanding Surgeon**

His outstanding work as chief surgeon of the Ottawa General Hospital brought him fame. In his wide medical activities, he has been a member of the Ottawa Hospital Association, physician to the University of Ottawa, surgeon to the Ottawa Police Force, President of the Ottawa Medico-Chirurgical Society and director of the Ottawa Medical Society. For a number of years Dr. Chabot was a frequent contributor to medical and surgical journals.

A lacrosse player himself in his earlier days, he was president of the famous Capital Lacrosse Club in 1908 when lacrosse was flourishing as the national game. Prior to this, in 1904, he was president of the Capital Athletic Association. Of late years, Dr. Chabot took an active interest in lawn tennis and bowling. When the Intermediate Capital Lacrosse team were intermediate champions of Canada in

he early '90's, "Jerry" Chabot was player and captain of the champions.

His athletic interest extended to football. In 1906 he was president of the Ottawa University Football team, then champions of Canada. Educated first at a private school, he attended the University of Ottawa where he graduated with the degree of Bachelor of Arts in 1899. After attending McGill University, he was awarded his medical diploma in 1892 and shortly afterwards returned to Ottawa to open a practice.

He married Miss Mary Devlin, daughter of the late E. B. Devlin, of Ottawa, in 1894 and after her death married Miss Hope Brunel, of Ottawa, who also predeceased him. Dr. Chabot had no children. He was a Roman Catholic.

### Notice

There still seems to be considerable misunderstanding as regards the meaning of the tuberculin test as carried on in this city in the last few weeks.

The tuberculin test indicates one of two things, viz: Either that the patient has not been in contact with tuberculosis at all when it is negative; or, that he has been infected with tuberculosis if it is positive. The latter is the case with 75 percent of our city population.

A physical examination and an X-Ray are necessary to discover whether the patient has tuberculosis disease.

There is no cause to worry, therefore, if it has been done and has been found to be negative.

Only two cases thus far have been found among all the children examined. These have been diagnosed early so have an excellent opportunity for recovery.

This alone seems to make our work worth while.

World peace, assured by the combined sea strength of England and United States, was visualized in a speech by Sir Samuel Hoare (lower right), first lord of the admiralty, in London. He indicated that Britain would pursue her announced policy of building up the fleet in co-operation with increased air efficiency, so that "when supported as it may be by the other great naval power, it will once again make a world war impossible." The "other great naval power" was interpreted to mean United States. Units of the two fleets that may some day work together include the big U.S.S. Arkansas at right and First British cruiser squadron moving in battle formation at the left. Starting at the bottom the British ships are H.M.S. Shropshire, Devonshire and London.

hands, the desirability of an early settlement of the whole matter, was stressed.

**Cannot Speak Today**  
In announcing that final word on the momentous cleavage between the King and his ministers had been postponed for another 24 hours, Premier Baldwin told the anxious House that he could not make any statement on the decision of the King between abdication and marriage to Mrs. Simpson before tomorrow at the earliest. "I regret I am not in a position to add anything today but I hope to make a statement tomorrow," the Premier said in reply to a question by Clement Atlee, Labor leader.

Party whips instructed all members of the House to cancel engagements outside of London in preparation for the Premier's expected pronouncement tomorrow on the King's decision.

Mr. Atlee mentioned the growing anxiety all over the country for the King's decision. The Premier replied that no one realized the anxiety more than he did.

Frederick Bellenger, Labor, said that business had been inconvenienced by the situation and asked if Mr. Baldwin would kindly suggest to the King the necessity of arriving at an early decision.

Shouts for "Order" interrupted the question but Mr. Baldwin said it had not escaped him.

Prior to the session of the House of Commons, cabinet ministers gathered in full session. It was believed that Premier Baldwin had related to his ministers details of the lengthy interview with the King yesterday.

**Cabinet in Session**  
Premier Baldwin called the cabinet into sudden unexpected session tonight to discuss latest developments in the constitutional crisis. The summons for the special cabinet meeting was interpreted to mean that every facility of the government was being pressed into action to enable a definite statement for Parliament tomorrow.

Radio reports that the King would abdicate today were said

to be based on a high source. It is learned officially, however, that as yet at least, there is absolutely no basis for so definite a report.

**"Wally" To Stay Away**  
CANNES, France, Dec. 9.—Mrs. Wallis Warfield Simpson was conferring last night with her lawyers, who had flown from London, not with a view to speeding up the granting of her absolute divorce decree but, it was stated, in regard to disposal of her property in England. She does not expect to return to the British Isles, it is stated, for some considerable time at least.

Mrs. Simpson denied that she would win over the government in said she hoped King Edward VIII the constitutional crisis.

**WHIFFLETS**  
From the Waterfront  
C. N. R. steamer Prince Rupert Capt. H. E. Nedden, arrived in port at 10:30 this morning from Vancouver, Powell River and Ocean Falls and sails at 4 p.m. for Anyox and Stewart whence she will return here tomorrow evening southbound. The vessel had a light list of passengers.

Hornsby promises a hustling team next season, one that he says will be fighting constantly to win, while Barnes and DeWitt have promised the manager full cooperation and any player aid possible. "We have a high regard for Hornsby's ability as a baseball leader," says Barnes. "We not only will give him a free rein on the field, but we will depend on his judgment in matters pertaining to trades and players."

The Browns' rebuilding program, in addition to its immediate object of trades to bolster the team for the coming season, has a long-range plan for jutting the club on its feet. DeWitt, executive assistant to the Browns, expects to organize a farm system patterned after the extensive chain which carried the Red Birds to the top.



## VANCOUVER IS AT POLLS

Voting Today to Determine Successor to G. G. McGeer, Who Is Retiring

VANCOUVER, Dec. 9: (CP) — Four candidates are being voted upon today for the mayoralty seat G. G. McGeer will surrender January 1. A winner will be decided from among Former Mayor L. D. Taylor, Alderman G. C. Miller, Alderman L. D. McDonald and C. E. Thompson. Alderman Miller appears to be the favorite.

Mr. McGeer has decided to concentrate on his duties as member of the House of Commons for Vancouver-Burrard and in a recent speech declared that so far as Canada's seaports were concerned, "most of the fellows at Ottawa are canoe-minded."

He leaves after a crowded two years the office he entered as an advocate of monetary reform. He unsuccessfully attempted early in his term to bring about reduction in bond interest; made sweeping changes in the City Hall and police departments; instituted civic days of prayer; read the Riot Act to demonstrating unemployed; and resigned from the British Columbia Legislature in 1935 to run for Parliament.

Since then he has commuted by air between Vancouver and Ottawa, was a driving force behind the Vancouver Golden Jubilee, received the Lord Mayor of London Sir Percy Vincent, and paid him a return visit. He came back from the Empire's metropolis with words of praise for many English accomplishments in solving depression and administrative problems.

Ex-Mayor Taylor, colorful figure in civic positions since the turn of the century, at 79 seeks the office he held previously for 11 years and from which Mayor McGeer ousted him by a majority of 25,000.

"While I may be old in calendar years, I'm also old in experience," Taylor said. "I have as much vision for the future of Vancouver as I've had for 25 years."

"Sound" Policy  
Alderman Miller was acting Mayor during the many absences of Mayor McGeer and is chairman of the City Council's finance committee.

"Money does not come out of thin air," said Mr. Miller, referring to platforms of other candidates who "promise to put everybody to work, reduce taxation and cut down assessments." He added, "I will see, however, that you get

100 cents worth-while value from every taxation dollar."

Alderman McDonald has already won one brush with Mr. Taylor. Last December he defeated the ex-mayor by a large majority in an old Taylor stronghold, Ward Five, for a seat on the City Council.

Mr. McDonald supports investigation of charges against Vancouver's police department made by W. A. Tucker, former police accountant. Tucker, chosen to make report of police department accounting methods, instead brought in a report charging irregularities within the police force. The Police Commission discharged him but appointed Hon. W. A. Macdonald, retired justice of the British Columbia Supreme Court, to investigate his allegations.

Mr. Thompson has a 14-point platform, but omitted the 13th plank because he was "a little superstitious and a little Irish too." He promises to seek provincial and Dominion aid for an extensive public works program and favors an advisory board of 100 citizens to assist aldermen. He was campaign manager for Mr. McGeer two years ago.

Eight aldermen-at-large will be elected from a large field. In former years 12 aldermen were chosen by wards.
