Proclamation of Coronation Date

Medieval pomp and pageantry marked the riles in several sections of London, when the formal reading of the proclamation, apprising the city that May 12, 1937, will be the coronation date, was performed by men of the King's household. Troops lined the route through which the gaily caparisoned heralds, pursuivants and men-at-arms. rode on their steeds, and in open carriages, to read the proclamation.
