Ready to Give up King

CANNES, France, Dec. 7: (CP)—Mrs. Wallis Warfield Simpson announced today that she is ready to give up King Edward VIII so that he may retain his Throne.

Mrs. Simpson, in a signed statement handed to the press by Lord Bronlow, said: "Throughout the last few weeks I have invariably wished to avoid any action or proposal which might hurt or damage His Majesty or the Throne. Today my attitude is unchanged and I am willing, if such action will solve the problem, to withdraw forthwith from a situation which has become unhappy and untenable."

The statement was given out by Bronlow at the gates of the villa where Mrs. Simpson has been staying. He made no comment after reading it aloud.
