North Dakota Remains Dry

Prairie State Votes Down Proposal For Establishment of Government Liquor Stores

BISMARCK, N.D., June 27:—The electors of North Dakota, at a state plebiscite, have overwhelmingly voted against establishment of government liquor stores. Thus the state retains its traditional dryness.

SELASSIE WELCOMED

Geneva's Greeting to Refugee Monarch of Ethiopia of Unprecedented Magnitude

GENEVA, June 27: (CP)—A tumultuous welcome, unprecedented in League of Nations history, was given Emperor Haile Selassie of Ethiopia yesterday. Thousands of residents of Geneva massed at the railway station to greet the refugee monarch who will take up with the League the plight of his country following the Italian invasion.

Unuk Mine Firm Is Incorporated

Ketchikan Men Are Principals With Registered Office at Prince Rupert

VICTORIA, June 27: (CP)—Among company incorporations announced by the provincial registrar of companies for the past week is one extra-provincial firm, the Unuk Placer Gold Co. with capitalization of \$100,000 and head offices in Ketchikan and Prince Rupert. Ketchikan persons are principals of the company, the registered office of which is with Patmore & Fulton at Prince Rupert.

QUEEN MARY KEEPS BUSY

Mother of King Still Manifests Great Interest in Public Affairs

LONDON, May 27:—Queen Mary has naturally withdrawn herself from state and high social functions since her widowhood. Nevertheless she has continued to manifest a lively interest in matters of moment to the nation at large. Her Majesty, who celebrated her 69th birthday May 26, remains in residence at Buckingham Palace but later in the summer will remove to Marlborough House, where King George and herself resided as Prince and Princess of Wales.

One of the most interesting of the Queen's recent engagements was her visit, last month, in company with the King and other members of the Royal family, to the great new liner bearing her name, then lying in Southampton water. The Queen launched the liner and gave the vessel her name at Clydebank in 1934.

During the month of May her Majesty paid a surprise visit to the Chelsea Flower Show. Wearing a gown of black relieved with white at the neck, her visit took place while workmen were still busy assembling the blooms. In previous years the Queen, who is very fond of flowers, always visited the show with King George after the official opening.

E. F. Benson, one of the most competent historians of the present era, writing recently of Queen Mary, said: "She became to her people the emblem of a noble life, perfect in queenliness and simplicity. Throughout these years there were troubles in plenty; no millennium succeeded the war, strikes and internal crises abounded, and during the winter of 1928 the King for many weeks lay desperately ill, but her faith and her reliance on the will of God never faltered. And more than a year ago there came to him and to her the crown of their incessant labors. . . . The memory of it is with her still, and the loving sympathy of England sustains her."

MARSEILLES IS TIED UP

Second Strike in Week Occurs in French Port—Overtime Bonuses Now Demanded

MARSEILLES, France, June 27:—Shipping of this port has been tied up by a second sailor's strike following refusal of shipowners to give overtime work bonuses.

Earlier in the week the sailors had had their first strike, hoisting red flags to the halcyons of fifty ships and tying up shipping in Marseilles harbor for three days until their demands for vacation with pay and bed sheets on bunks were met.

DEATHS IN HOLY LAND

Seven Arabs Are Killed Within Last Twenty-Four Hours

JERUSALEM, June 27:—Four Arabs were killed during an attack on a military convoy on its way from Haifa to Tel Aviv.

Seven Arabs have been killed in encounters with police within the past twenty-four hours.

Aircraft were used by the British Thursday in the effort to quell disorders.

MYSTERY SURPRISE PACKAGE

Fortune in British Bonds Delivered to American Druggist From This Province

MIZE, Miss., June 27: (CP)—R. W. Ford, 43-year old druggist, received a registered package containing British government bonds amounting to \$142,625, the package having been mailed from British Columbia.

The bonds ranged from \$25 to \$30,000 and the package was closed with the official seal of the Canadian government. Ford does not know the source or why they were sent.

CHICAGO, June 27: (CP)—Dr. Maud Slye, the woman who bred 150,000 mice to learn how cancer was inherited, said that she had developed control of the disease in animals to such a point where she could produce or prevent any kind of cancer at will.

TRAGEDY AVERTED

Boat Wrecked and Mail Lost in Dease River But No One Hurt Or Drowned

Divisional headquarters of the provincial police here are advised of another accident, which fortunately was not attended with fatal results, in the Dease River at the same dangerous point near Eagle River where Father E. Allard O.M.I. was drowned last year, Bishop E. M. Bunoz also having a narrow escape at the same time.

In the latest accident, which occurred on Thursday of this week, A. Marlon's boat was wrecked and is now beached. While no one was injured, mail on board the boat was lost. Col. Pragnell of Kamloops, inspector of Indian agencies, was on board as well as J. Harper Reed, Indian Agent at Telegraph Creek. The latter was thrown out of the boat into the water but was able to swim safely ashore.

The Dease River is very dangerous for navigation at this point, the message from Constable Meek says.

ROOSEVELT CANDIDATE

Renominated by Acclamation at Philadelphia—Official Acceptance Tonight

PHILADELPHIA, June 27: (CP)—President Franklin D. Roosevelt was unanimously renominated by the Democratic national convention early today. His choice was by acclamation on the first ballot. Later Vice-President John Nance Garner was also unanimously renominated.

President Roosevelt will deliver his acceptance speech at Franklin Field late today.

ILLEGAL BIRTHS

Canadian Welfare Council Director Gives Many Reasons For Social Problem

OTTAWA, June 27: (CP)—The problem of unmarried parenthood still remains, in spite of greatly improved legislation in six provinces in the last 15 years, one of the most perplexing and tragic questions in all social work in Canada, according to the recent report of Miss Charlotte Whittton, Executive Director of the Canadian Welfare Council.

Vital statistics show the number of children born out of wedlock is steadily increasing and the rate in Canada, although the third lowest in the world, has risen, the increase being consistent in all provinces.

Miss Whittton includes among "contributing social causes" influencing the problem "inadequate wages, poor living conditions, girls of low income whether boarding or at home, widespread idleness and unemployment, and quite frankly what might be described as speeding up the pace of living and a consequent profound change in traditional standards and attitudes to fundamental moral values."

"Related to this problem," she says, "is the question of whether through organized and commercialized vice has been brought under greater control, promiscuous prostitution is not seriously increasing."

One Reason
"It would be expected that the lower marriage rate, due in part to the insecurity of employment, and the deferred age of marriage arising from the same cause would explain the higher rate," Miss Whittton says, referring to the number of illegitimate children, but "the actual rate is now increasing."

MID WEST SWELTERS

Almost Entire Crop Failure From Drought Expected in North Dakota—Hoppers in Nebraska-Iowa

CHICAGO, June 27:—One hundred above zero temperatures are still being recorded in the Middle West.

An entire crop failure in North Dakota as a result of the drought is feared. Nebraska and Iowa farmers are suffering heavy crop losses due to the ravages of grasshoppers.

Connelly has Plurality of 192 over Godwin—57 Short of Clear Majority

BURNS LAKE, June 27: (CP)—The complete by-election result for Omineca as a result of Monday's voting is as follows: M. M. Connelly, Liberal, 897. Sydney Godwin, C. C. P., 705. Dr. Alfred Thompson, Con. 248. Connelly, therefore, has a plurality of 192 over Godwin and lacks fifty-seven of a majority over all.

THRIVE AT MATANUSKA

Two Families Notify Authorities That They Will Not Need Further Assistance

PALMER, June 27:—Two Matanuska Valley settler farmers have notified the authorities that they will be able to get along without further direct help from the government in getting themselves established. They will not require further assistance at the community commissary but will be able to support themselves from their forty-acre farms with the aid of occasional outside work.

(Continued from Page 1) creating beyond what can be explained by improved statistics.

"There are, of course, the predisposing individual factors of deficient mental endowment, moral sense and others which will always exercise the most direct influence in problems of this nature, but these are aggravated, and other groups affected by contributing social causes as well," she pointed out.

"This fact brings its challenge, as do the unsatisfactory laws still prevailing in three provinces and the indifferent provisions for administration in others," Miss Whittson says. "The question of adequate guardianship for those children whose mothers retain their custody and of aids in maintenance for mothers who can partially support their children calls urgently for more examination and thought than it is receiving."

FRENCH CANADA'S POSITION

Evidently there is strong irritation in Quebec over what they consider the subordinate position of French Canadians, industrially and religiously. According to an article in McLean's Magazine, this is at the bottom of the political mix-up in Quebec province. According to that article some of the French Canadians would like to have a separate Dominion for Quebec, others want a more autonomous province and others again are opposed to the Taschereau government.

What the magazine article fails to mention is that the English speaking section of Quebec is just as much opposed to the Taschereau administration as is the French and this will show itself in the vote which is to be taken at the coming election. However, the French predominate politically and it is natural that racial prejudices are brought into play at a time when political feeling runs high.

DOMINION DANGERS

There are all sorts of sectional grievances in Canada today. French Canada is a little restive over its position politically, economically and religiously. Western Canada has economic grievances and so has the far east, claiming that industrialism is protected and that the central provinces benefit at the expense of both west and east. Vancouver Island considers itself neglected by the rest of British Columbia and there have also been movements in Northern and Central British Columbia looking to the formation of a separate province. All these movements are based on grievances or fancied grievances. If the Dominion is to become a real nation all grounds for grievances must be removed or information provided showing that the grievances do not exist in fact but only in fancy. Full investigation and discussion will tend to remove the causes of friction and thus weld the nation into one political whole.

The present government at Ottawa is doing what it can to remove friction as between French and English interests. French interests in the cabinet are strong but the economic troubles remain untouched so far. British Columbia's premier has been carrying on a campaign of education looking to the removal of some of the causes of irritation. He has undoubtedly been able to impress the federal politicians and it will remain to be seen what the final outcome will be. Adjustments will have to be made from time to time in the economic set-up of the Canadian federation and this seems like a good time to begin to remove grievances.

Sockeye Fishing Season Starts Tomorrow Night—American Halibut Landings Light—Prince Robert Bringing Popular Movie Actress

The sockeye fishing season gets under way in Prince Rupert district at 6 p.m. tomorrow, marking the general opening of the salmon canneries on the Skeena and Naas Rivers and elsewhere in the district. Spring salmon fishing, which has been going on both on the Skeena and Naas Rivers during the last few weeks, will come to an automatic close with the commencement of sockeye fishing. The spring fishing has been quite good on the Naas while there has been a noticeable improvement of late on the Skeena. As previously announced, there will be about the same number of salmon canneries in operation in Prince Rupert district this year as there were last.

Again not much American halibut has been landed at Prince Rupert this week. It is reported that a number of the boats have been landing at Alaska ports without coming here, prices in the north being about the same as here. During the week some shipments of fresh halibut have been made by steamer from here to Vancouver enroute to the eastern markets. The continued railway tie-up is undoubtedly having a serious effect on the industry here.

Halibut landings at Prince Rupert for the season up to yesterday totalled 4,983,500 pounds of which 2,740,000 pounds was from Canadian vessels and 2,243,000 pounds from American. For the past week landings amounted to 217,500 pounds including 184,500 pounds from Canadian boats and only 33,000 pounds from American. Prices for Canadian fish during the week ranged from a high of 6.6c and 5.5c down to 6.1c and 5.2c while the American prices were 7c and 5c to 7.5c and 6c.

Making her first voyage of the season on the Alaska route, C. N. R. steamer Prince Robert, with Capt. Edward Mabbs in command will be in port on Monday morning next enroute to Skagway and a week from Sunday will be here again southbound. Among interesting passengers aboard the Prince Robert for the Alaska cruise will be Mr. and Mrs. William Seiter of Hollywood. Mr. Seiter is a director for the Fox Film Corporation while Mrs. Seiter is better known as Marion Nixon, a popular screen actress.

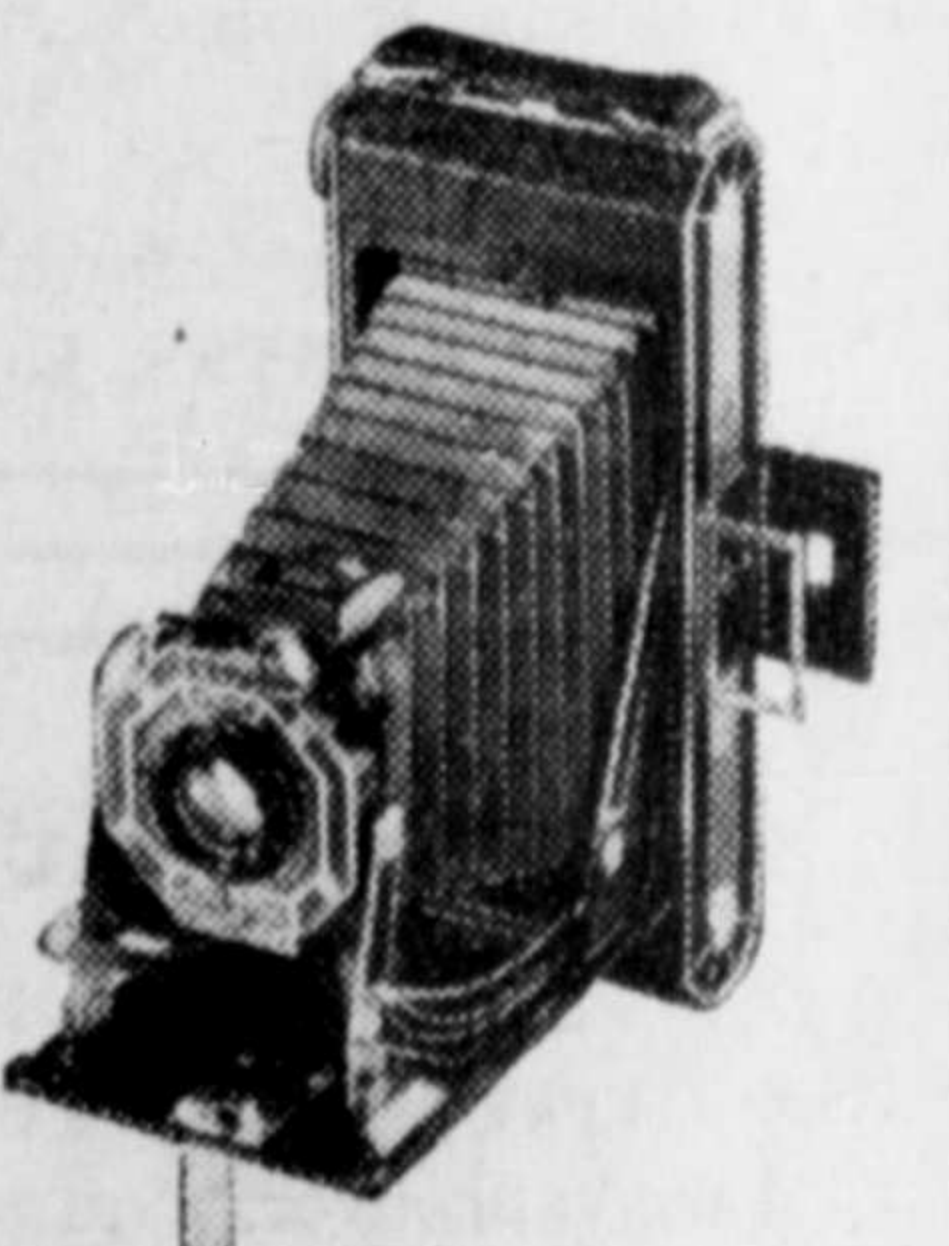
