Largest Conflagration In Modern History Has Laid Low Noted Resort

LONDON, Dec. 1: (CP)—The most spectacular fire London has seen in modern times last night destroyed historic Crystal Palace, show place and amusement centre for millions since Queen Victoria's days.

The building was valued at \$6,000,000. It was opened in 1855 by Queen Victoria and Prince Albert on the occasion of a great London exposition.

No lives were lost but the Palace orchestra, which was engaged in practising, had a narrow escape.

A violent government attack on the building, one of the Fascist strongholds in northern Madrid, followed blasting of the structure by Socialist dynamiters.

HEAD OFF FASCISTS

France Trying to Forge Bloc Of Nations Against Germany, Italy and Japan

PARIS, Dec. 1:—France strove yesterday to forge a bloc of Democratic nations to offset the alignment of Germany, Italy and Japan.

Yvonne Delbos, French foreign minister, who has already said that France would aid Britain if attacked, is said authoritatively to be ready to repeat the promise in the Chamber on Friday.

Informed sources say that Great Britain and France will pledge themselves to assure each others' security, extending the same guarantee to Belgium.

GALE HITS WATERFRONT

Cow Bay Floats Centre of Damage—No Boats Very Badly Hurt

A sudden and boisterous southwest gale springing up about 8 o'clock last evening gave the local waterfront quite a shaking up. The Cow Bay floats suffered the most extensive damage, a dolphin being dipped out there as a result of which an outside float went out of place and was this morning lying across the mouth of the bay towards the floats of the Prince Rupert Rowing & Yacht Club.

Owners of boats moored at Cow Bay hurried to get their craft to safety. Some moved into the harbor and anchored. Others went across the bay and some sought less exposed mooring places. It was a sleepless night for not a few boat owners. More or less minor damage was done to some boats but, as far as could be learned this morning, none had sunk.

The fishermen's floats east of the dry dock stood up well. The wind was one of those which affects the waterfront more than uptown.

The gale was also felt up the Skeena River and the telegraph lines were down during the night, communication being restored this morning.

Another special voyage is to be made to Alaska by the steamer Princess Louise.

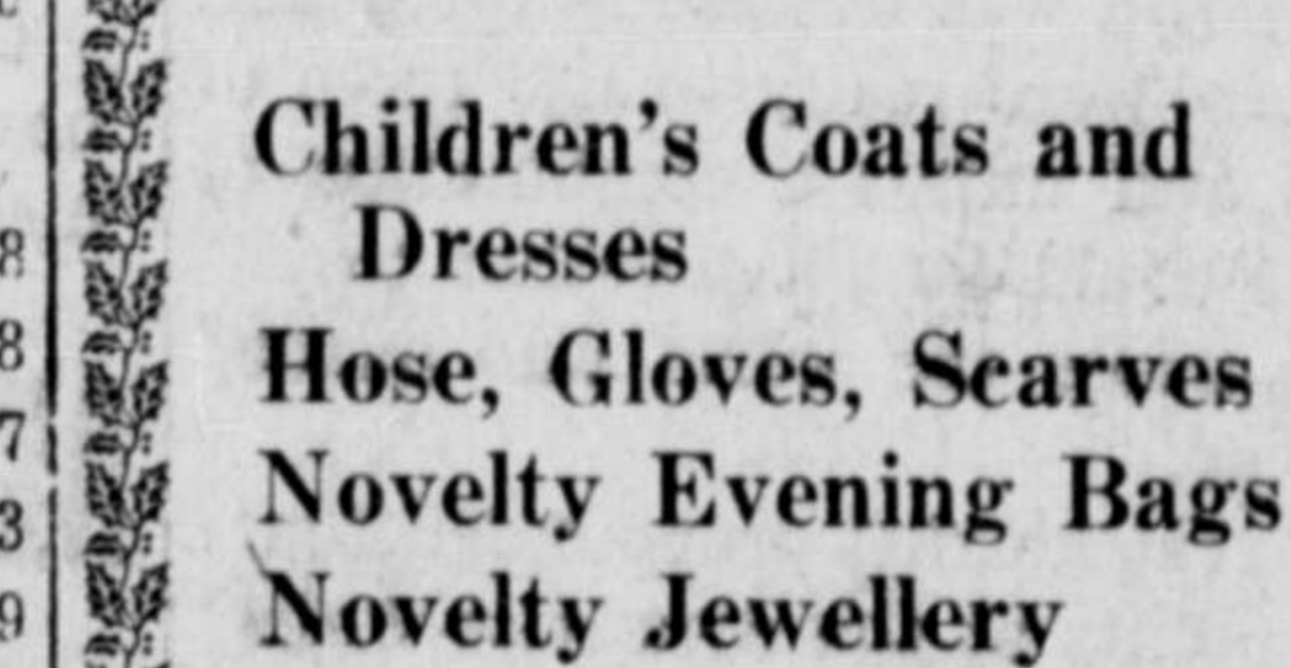

beginning should be made in the schools to develop will-power and higher moral standards. To do it effectively people must come back to simple teaching of Jesus Christ.

Last Evening's Meeting
 Bishop Wells' mission last night was well attended by a fair sized congregation. The subject of the address was "Religion in National Life."

"I'm a nationalist," declared the speaker. "But if I were born in Italy I would be a follower of Mussolini. I am a supporter of those who guide our national affairs believing it to be the best way we can function as a people. We can only succeed when we give God first place in our national life."

Joshua, Chapter 24, had been read as the scripture lesson and the missionary referred to the challenge made by Joshua: "Choose ye this day whom ye will serve."

The problems facing Joshua were greater than those that confronted Moses. Moses could go to the slaves in Egypt and hold out to them the hope of becoming freemen. The very thought of freedom was most powerful in arousing them to action. He could hold out the idea to them of becoming a nation and this again stirred their hearts.

It was much easier to enlist men in efforts of destruction than in those of reconstruction. It was easier to get money for war than for peaceful pursuits. Joshua had his returned soldier problem and he selected certain men as elders, judges and captains, discussing with them the problems of reconstruction. He recounted to them the story of their own people, how God had brought them out of Egypt, through the Red Sea and the wilderness and across the Jordan and had fulfilled all the promises made to their fathers. Joshua then asked: "What are you going to do for Him?" And they replied: "We will serve the Lord."

Joshua put God first in national life. The greatest need today was more religion in national life. There was little evidence of it in state functions, in Armistice Day parades, in schools and in municipal councils. The Governor General was a noble exception. When he travelled across Canada on Sun-

day the train was stopped and he attended divine service in some little church, usually taking part in the service. This was of great value as a recognition of the Lord's Day. The desecration of the Sabbath was worse in British Columbia than in any other province in Canada.

It was of value also in that the leader of the people took a definite stand for religion. Religion was the most stabilizing influence in human society.

Bishop Wells referred to Russia and its anti-God campaign, stating that it had agents scattered throughout the world in every group of society. "You cannot force people to be religious any more than you can force a man to be your friend." There must be a change in the attitude of religious people to each other, more kindness and less criticism. The speaker referred to the importance of influence and the power to influence others for good. Those who held

high positions wielded an influence that could not be overestimated. Therefore the people should see that representatives in public office were men of integrity possessing a high standard of moral conduct.

"A choice challenges us today," concluded the speaker. "A choice between the standards of the last 25 years when a new paganism has emerged wherein discipline finds no place and a stand for things true and pure and honest and of good report."

The mission will continue this evening when the subject will be "Religion in the Life of British Columbia."
