Victorious Over Amerks in Stanley Cup Game-Detroit Wins League

TORONTO, March 30: (CP)-Toronto Maple Leafs remained in the thick of the contest for the Stanley Cup, emblematic of the world's professional hockey championship, when they defeated New York Americans at the Maple Leaf Gardens in Toronto Saturday night by a score of three to one in the first of a two game series to produce a finalist to meet Detroit Red Wings this week for the trophy. The second game will be played at New York.

Last night at Detroit the Red Wings downed Montreal Maroons Burned to Death two to one to capture the National Hockey League championship and the right to enter the Stanley Cup final against either Maple Leafs or Americans. The Red Wings won three games straight.

Tremendous Mandate By Voters Yesterday

Constitutes Largest Victory Ever Won by Political Leader In That Country—Meanwhile Countries of Western Europe Continue to Prepare For War

BERLIN, March 30:-In the German elections yesterday which constituted a plebiscite on the Reichsfuehrer's policy in regard to the military re-occupation of the Rhineland and his renouncing of the Treaty of Versailles and the Locarno Pact, a vote of 98.8 percent was accorded Adolf Hitler. It was the greatest mandate ever given no'itical leader in the history of Germany.

Of 41 954.937 ballots, 44,411.911 FLOODS IN opposite the name "Hitler." On the remaining 543.026 ballots, officials announced, the electors either "rote "no" or otherwise made their votes "invalid." 


