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# ITALIAN TROOPS IN LIBYA REVOLT

## MEN SHOOT LIEUTENANT

Rome Says Incident Was Entirely of Local Nature And That Colony as Whole Is Calm.

### Threat Is Made

"Scientific Weapons" May Be Used to Deal Death On Ethiopians—France And Britain Prepare.

ROME, Jan. 2: (CP)—Authoritative quarters admitted today that there had been a revolt in one detachment of Italian troops stationed at Tripoli, Libya, and that a lieutenant had been killed by his men. The spokesman said the incident had been of a local nature and that the whole Italian colony of Libya was calm.

Reliable sources, speculating as to the possibilities of an Italian campaign of "punishment" from the air, said today that the Fascist Army had vast quantities of "scientific weapons" that it was reluctant to use against Ethiopia. The weapons are being withheld, these sources reported, until such time as Ethiopian war practices may arouse a national demand to "fight fire with fire."

### Planning For War

LONDON, Jan. 2: (CP)—British and French general staffs are laying down plans for joint action should Italy retaliate against sanctions by acts of war. It is stated here.

### Pattullo's Warning

VICTORIA, Jan. 2: (CP)—Canada was warned by Premier T. D. Pattullo in a New Year's Day message to be prepared to face any contingency that may arise from European strife. The Premier also urged development of the Dominion's export markets and a program of public works to relieve unemployment. He further urged development of immigration.

## DUCHESS IS DOING WELL

Pneumonia Illness In Final Stages. And Progress Satisfactory

WINDSOR, Eng., Jan. 2: (CP)—A bulletin, signed by Sir John Weir and Lord Dawson of Penn and issued from the residence of the Duke of York Tuesday, gave formal announcement that the Duchess of York had an attack of influenza and pneumonia. The announcement intimated that the illness was following its normal course and was in the final stages. The general condition of the Duchess was declared to be satisfactory.

## SHAKE-UP AMONG HEADS OF RAILWAY PLANNED

TORONTO, Jan. 2: (CP)—Resignation of the present board of trustees of the Canadian National Railways and reorganization of headquarters staff is contemplated by the federal government, the Toronto Globe says in a special dispatch from its staff correspondent at Ottawa.

## IS UP TO PROVINCE

Dominion Government Has No Intention of Entering Health Insurance Field

VICTORIA, Jan. 2:—The Dominion government has no intention of entering the health insurance field, according to an important statement issued today by Hon. Dr. G. M. Weir, provincial secretary.

Dr. Weir stated that it had been the consensus of opinion at the recent Dominion-provincial conference that health insurance was a matter for the provinces and not for the Dominion to undertake. This view was held strongly by the members of the federal cabinet.

"Results of our discussion on this point," continued Dr. Weir, "are most important for British Columbia for they make it perfectly clear that we have no reason to delay health insurance in this province in the hope of Dominion action. At the same time the federal government should be encouraged to supplement provincial effort in matters of public health."

## NO HONORS TO CANADA

Two Viscounts, Four Barons, Two Privy Counsellors And Four Baronets Created By King

LONDON, Jan. 2: (CP)—Two barons were raised to the rank of viscount while the King was pleased to create four new barons, two privy councillors and four baronets, it was announced in the New Year's Honors List.

Field Marshal Sir William Chewwood was given the Order of Merit and about fourscore knighthoods were conferred.

Canada, the Union of South Africa and the Irish Free State were not represented in the Honors List.

The Duke of York becomes a Vice Admiral of the Fleet, a Lieutenant-General in the Army and a Marshal in the Royal Air Force.

The Duke of Kent receives the Royal Victorian Chain.

Lord Hanworth, former Master of Rolls, and Lord Trenchard, former Commissioner of the Metropolitan Police, are made viscounts.

## New Station At San Jose Open

Three And A Half Million Dollar Edifice Of Southern Pacific Now In Use

SAN JOSE, Jan. 2:—A new \$3,500,000 station has just been formally opened here by the Southern Pacific Railway. The tracks to it lead entirely underground and all level crossings within the city limits have been eliminated.

## Four Halibut Boats Seized

## Face Starvation On Caspian Sea

BAKU, Jan. 2:—One hundred seaman are facing starvation as a result of being caught in the ice on the Caspian Sea. The condition of the ice is such that the men cannot get ashore and assistance cannot be sent to the ships.

## Motor of Wiley Post Plane Has Not Been Injured

POINT BARROW, Alaska, Jan. 2:—Charles D. Brower, famous Alaska trader and friend of the late Will Rogers, says that the motor of the Wiley Post plane, which crashed near Point Barrow last summer, killing both Post and Rogers, has been stored in a warehouse here and is in perfect condition. To save the plane wreck from being destroyed by freezing weather and being washed out to sea, Brower towed it to Point Barrow after the crash, cleaned the motor and placed it in the warehouse for shipment to the United States next summer with the rest of the plane wreckage.

## British Flying Machine Drops Into Sea Tuesday Near Port of Alexandria

Pilot Was Only Survivor and He is in Critical Condition After Having Been in Water Five Hours Before Being Picked up by Warship

LONDON, Jan. 2: (CP)—Hope has been abandoned for twelve persons lost when the Imperial Airways liner City of Khartoum crashed Tuesday night shortly before landing at Alexandria, Egypt, apparently when all three motors cut off. Two unidentified bodies have been found. The only survivor, Pilot Vernon Gory Wilson, is in a critical condition after being for five hours in the water before being picked up by H. M. S. Brilliant. ## New Deal Still Losing Ground

LITERARY DIGEST POLL SHOWS 58.51 PERCENTAGE AGAINST ROOSEVELT PLAN

The popularity of the New Deal in the United States evidenced a further recession in the latest returns of the Literary Digest's nation-wide poll as nearly one million ballots from forty-one states are tabulated. The total of 987,158 votes reported shows a division of 499,527 votes marked in favor of the New Deal and 477,631 opposed. The percentage of the total balloting is 58.51 against the New Deal. Twelve states of the midwest Farm Belt continue to vote heavily, more than three to two, against the New Deal while eleven of the thirteen southern and border states register as strong support in its favor.

## CITY HAD DRY YEAR

RECORD FOR SMALL PRECIPITATION SET SUNSHINE, HOWEVER, WAS NOT ANY MORE THAN USUAL

The year 1935, with a total precipitation of 71.90 inches, was one of the driest years in Prince Rupert's history. This was a good deal less than the precipitation of 80.84 inches in 1928, the previous dry year in recent times. It was also much less than the 99.54 inches of 1934.

While there was considerably less rain than usual in 1935, it was by no means a record breaker as far as amount of sunshine was concerned. The total sunshine was 1013 hours as compared with 1037.2 hours in the year previous.

December was the wettest month of the year just ended with 13.24 inches and also had the least sunshine—only 2.2 hours. It was, however, an exceptionally mild December with five degrees the greatest amount of frost to be recorded. April was the sunniest month of the year 1935 with 159.4 hours and was also the driest with only .93 of an inch of rain.

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#### LESSENING THE DANGER

There was held at Newcastle-on-Tyne, England, in the month of September a conference dealing with voluntary migration within the Empire. This gathering was attended by Brigadier General Hornby who visited Prince Rupert last year in connection with his scheme of land settlement. Recommendations were made to the British government that the present Empire Settlement Act should be amended and asking that there be organized and developed on properly financed lines new communities overseas which, by working to support themselves, would create fresh demands for manufactured goods and stimulate Dominion and Empire trade.

It was pointed out to the government that the frozen assets of the Empire were men and women who were unemployed and unused lands in the Dominions. By properly mobilizing these assets the wheels of industry would be speeded up and unemployment would be relieved with consequent advantage to all parts of the Empire.

Under the scheme as outlined misfits would be returned to the Mother Land without the stigma of deportation.

What was not mentioned at the conference was the fact that as long as there are vast areas of unused lands in Canada other countries will want those lands and it may be necessary to have to fight to prevent undesirable people from taking them by force. To some people this does not seem to be a menace. It may not be an imminent menace but it may become imminent at any time. Let us do our part toward settling these lands with good settlers, men and women with similar ideas and ideals to our own and the menace will become very greatly diminished.

## Canines Give Ethiopians Warning Of Enemy Planes and Meet Death From Bombs

ADDIS ABABA, Jan. 2: (CP-Havas)—Whether or not a dog is man's best friend in other countries, he's that kind and more in Ethiopia.

No matter how many he may be, a hound that can hear an Italian bombing plane before it is visible is an invaluable ally. Ethiopia has thousands of such talented mongrels in every village in the land.

Ethiopians haven't always appreciated their helpful hounds. In half-wild bands that prowled through villages and even invaded Addis Ababa itself, in search of food, they have hitherto been the country's one and only scavenger service, a necessary nuisance. Since the coming of war, however, they have learned to function as prompt scouting patrols and signal corps as well.

A story about the prowling dogs of Ogaden, brought here by a doctor from Daggahbur, shows how quickly the Ethiopian dogs have learned to protect themselves against the enemy attacks. The Italian aviators first bombed Daggahbur a month ago, he said, and 50 dogs were killed, almost the only victims of the raid.

The second time surviving dogs heard motors in the sky, they didn't wait for bombs, but sought cover until the raid was over. The inhabitants of Daggahbur took the hint, and also hid themselves. Nowadays, throughout the war zone the Ethiopians say the behavior of the wild dogs tells them when a raid is imminent.

### Timely Recipes

#### FOR THE COOKIE JAR

One ingredient to be given particular attention is the shortening, for on it every good cook knows that the color and flavor of cakes and cookies largely depends. That is why thousands of cookie makers choose and use butter in their baking.

#### Shortbread

One cup butter, 1/2 cup fruit sugar, 2 1/2 cups flour, pinch of salt. Cream butter thoroughly and add sugar and salt, gradually. Add flour and work mixture with hands until dough can be shaped. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead until mixture cracks. Roll to about 1/4-inch thickness. Cut into fancy shapes. Bake in a slow oven (300 to 325 degrees F.) until very slightly browned (about 30 minutes). Garnish, if desired, with green or red cherries.

## Wedding Rings Of High Gold Content Banned in Germany

BERLIN, Jan. 2:—The Nazi government has issued a decree forbidding German brides from accepting wedding rings containing more than one-third pure gold.
