British Newspapers Banned From Italy; Correspondents **Recalled**; Ignore Coronation

ROME, May 8: (CP)-All Italian news correspondents have been recalled from England, it was officially announced today. In addition, all but three British newspapers have been banned throughout Italy. A communique disclosed that these steps had been taken as a result of an alleged anti-Italian campaign in the British press.

The move by Italy against the British press was anticipated earlier in the day by German news agency reports in Berlin which said Italian newspapers had signed a joint protest against the "slanderous attitude of the British press concerning Itahan volunteers in Spain."

Newspapers here as a whole will disregard details of the Coronation and print only what factual matter is distributed by the Stefani (semi-official) News Agency.

Peace River to Coast

The chamber of commerce last night decided to refer to the Associated Boards of Trade a communication from the Monkman Pass Highway Association asking for support for their proposal to build a highway to Hansard. That body is representative of the whole country from Prince Rupert to McBride and Quesnel and is better capable of dealing with it than any other.

There are at present two highway proposals. One is already commenced and is well under way. That is the highway from Vanderhoof by Fort St. James to Manson Creek and Finley Forks to Fort St. John in the Peace River Block. It opens up a valuable mining country and also taps the Peace River Block which is in British Columbia. The other proposal is to connect the Alberta section of the Peace River country with British Columbia by way of the proposed Monkman Pass Highway from Beaver Lodge to Hansard. Most of the highway passes through a new

British Columbia territory but it gives an outlet chiefly mansen to the southern or Grande Prairie section of the Peace Frank district in Alberta.
