

Smith's Dictionary of the Bible was quoted in this connection, saying: "Taken separately, perhaps, or even all together, these passages seem scarcely adequate to prove that the dedication of the first day of the week to the purposes above mentioned was a matter of apostolic institution, or even of apostolic practice."

The following statements by Protestant clergymen were quoted: 'It is quite clear that, however rigidly or devoutly we may spend Sunday, we are not keeping the Sabbath. The Sabbath was founded on a specific, divine command. We can plead no such command for the obligation to keep Sunday. There is not a single sentence in the New Testament to suggest that we incur any penalty by violating the supposed sanctity of Sunday."

(R. W. Dale, Congregationalist.) Rev. J. Williams, B.D., of the Church of England, was quoted as follows: "And where are we told in the Scripture that we are to keep the first day at all? We are commanded to keep the seventh; but we are nowhere commanded to keep the first day. The reason Get New Boats why we keep the first day of the week holy instead of the seventh is for the same reason that we observe many other things, not because the Bible, but because the church, has enjoined it."

Then a Roman Catholic source vas quoted with Cardinal Gibbons is the authority for the church, as follows: "You may read the Bible from Genesis to Revelation and you will not find a single line! religious observance of Saturday, day which we never sanctify."

The choice was, Mr. Blair delared, between Catholic traditions, based on pagan practices and the explicit Word of God. It was choice between papal authority and the authority of the Bible. Both claimed to be infallible. The Bible was.

Mr. Blair called upon his hearers to help finish the unfinished reformation and swing back to the slogan of the early reformers, "The Bible and the Bible only."


