DEALING ON OIL RIGHTS

This Was How Negotiations For Sale of "E.P." Ranch Became Known

EDMONTON, Feb. 27: (CP)—The "E.P." Ranch near High River became known yesterday in connection with the oil leases on the ranch. It is not definitely known that the sale has already been arranged but it has at least been ascertained that negotiations are on.

When the Duke, as Prince of Wales, bought the ranch several years ago he was given a 99-year lease on oil and mineral rights with the stipulation that they could not be transferred.

LOW DEBT IN QUEBEC

Eastern Province Has Minimum Of Canada With Prince Edward Island Next

TORONTO, Feb. 27: (CP)—An up-to-date compilation of the funded debts of Canada and its provinces, shows that the Province of Quebec has the lowest net debt per capita of any of the Canadian provinces with \$48.31, compared with \$62.15 for Prince Edward Island, the next lowest. The gross debt of the Dominion of Canada amounts to \$324.44, not including contingent liabilities of \$117.16 per capita.

New issues of Canadian government and municipal bonds issued during the period from 1933 to 1936, are given in comparative tables. In 1936 a total of \$1,065,900,922 of new Canadian government and municipal issues was sold. Of this amount 91.74% was sold in Canada and 8.26% in the United States. More than 88% was for refunding purposes, with the balance for new money.

The compilation includes charts showing the trend of bond interest rates in Canada from 1900 to 1936 and the movements of sterling and the Canadian dollar.

Senate Passes Sumners Bill

Measure Providing For Retirement Of U. S. Supreme Court Judges Goes to White House

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 27: (CP)—The United States Senate yesterday passed and sent to the White House for presidential signature the Sumners Bill to permit members of the United States Supreme Court to retire voluntarily with full pay at the age of seventy. The measure had passed the Senate after a brief debate.

FLANDIN FEARFUL

Former Premier of France Sees Blum Government Heading For Disaster—Confidence Is Voted

PARIS, Feb. 27: (CP)—Premier Leon Blum and his Socialist government is "leading France to catastrophe," Former Premier Flandin charged in the Chamber of Deputies yesterday. Flandin declared that "events" may soon force Blum to crush France's capitalist system. The Popular Front government, he said, had exhausted its legislative program and the national credit and Blum "can now find no lenders, no more long term loans and no buyers of treasury bonds."

Flandin was speaking in the course of a debate which culminated in a 361 to 209 vote of confidence by the Chamber in the Blum government.

Former Naval Officer Gets Imprisonment

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 27:—Former Lieutenant - Commander John S. Farnsworth of the United States Navy yesterday was sentenced to from four to twelve years' imprisonment for selling naval secrets. He had admitted the offence and threw himself upon the mercy of the court.

PROGRAM APPROVED

Major Defence Debate in British House Ends in Non-Confidence Vote Being Rejected

LONDON, Feb. 27:—The second major debate yesterday in the House of Commons on the government's defence program providing for the expenditure of \$2,000,000,000 over a period of five years ended in approval being voted by a division of 307 to 132, a non-confidence motion by the Labor opposition being rejected.

In the course of the debate, Sir John Simon, Home Secretary, informed the House that sufficient gas masks had now been manufactured to provide for every person in the British Isles as a protection against gas attack.

Funeral Service For Al Buttmer

Many Gather to Pay Final Tribute Prior to Forwarding of Remains To Vancouver for Interment

Prior to the forwarding of the remains to Vancouver for burial a funeral service for the late A. J. Buttmer, pioneer Skeena River canneryman, was held last evening at the chapel of the B. C. Undertakers, many friends and sympathizers being in attendance to pay their final tributes of esteem and respect. Among those present were a goodly number of members of the Masonic craft who later marched in procession from the chapel to the wharf.

Rev. Dr. W. F. Dafeo, pastor of First Baptist Church, officiated and W. Vaughan Davies presided at the organ to accompany the hymns which were "Lead Kindly Light" and "Abide With Me."

The remains were placed aboard the steamer Princess Adelaide and were taken south by the son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Carter of Port Essington. There will be a private funeral service in Vancouver Monday morning. Pallbearers were R. W. Cameron, R. E. Benson, C. H. Elkins, George D. Tite, F. M. Davies and David Taylor.

"SUICIDE STRIKE" IN HUNGARY MINE ENDS

PECS, Hungary, Feb. 27: (CP)—The "suicide strike" of 250 miners, who had resolved to stay underground and starve to death unless the mine owners met their demands, collapsed yesterday and the men, half-dazed from hunger and many suffering from wounds received in a fight underground among themselves, staggered out of the shaft. They were greeted by sobbing wives and relatives and sympathizers. Some of the workers were too weak to walk and were carried upon the shoulders of comrades.

TREATY IS WELCOMED

British Press Generally Approves Of New Anglo-Canadian Agreement

Fish Benefits

Great Britain Pledges Itself To Maintain Preference on Various Kinds

LONDON, Feb. 27: (CP)—The British press generally accords a warm welcome to the new Anglo-Canadian trade treaty.

The Times says that the old treaty justified itself by the results and hopes that the new pact will similarly result in increased trade "with less discrepancy between the benefits accruing to the two sides."

Fish Benefits

OTTAWA, Feb. 27: (CP)—Fresh, frozen and canned fish was among twenty-one commodities listed in the United Kingdom - Canada trade treaty on which the United Kingdom binds itself to maintain a margin of preference shown for the life of the treaty. Kinds of fish with a margin preference are fresh sea, excluding livers, ten percent ad valorem; chilled or frozen salmon, one and one-half pence per pound; canned salmon, ten percent ad valorem; other canned fish, ten percent ad valorem.

REPORT ON MINE MADE

Government Engineer's Findings In Connection With Nicola Mines & Metals

VICTORIA, Feb. 27: (CP)—The provincial Department of Mines yesterday released the report of its engineer, M. S. Hedley, who examined the properties of the Nicola Mines & Metals Ltd. last spring. Of the six principal veins on the Nicola holdings, the Enterprise is by far the most important. Mr. Hedley says. Mining at all times has been little in advance of mill requirements. He adds: "This property is dependent upon the Enterprise vein. Of other veins investigations to date have not shown that any considerable tonnage is to be derived from them." Of the Enterprise workings he said that development must be pushed aggressively in order that there is assured tonnage for the mill to operate at the present capacity.

Baer-Pastor Bout Is Approved But May Not Go On

NEW YORK, Feb. 27:—The New York State Boxing Commission yesterday approved the ten round bout scheduled between Max Baer and Bob Pastor for March 19 although it is still uncertain as to whether the bout will go ahead. Baer has said that he will not fight in New York but is going to London.

JAPAN IS PREPARED

Would Resist Air Attack By Destroying Bases of Enemy

TOKYO, Feb. 27: (CP)—The Japanese Navy disclosed to the Diet today its general plan of air combat as being the complete destruction of enemy air bases before enemy planes are able to attack the Japanese mainland.

Vice Admiral Nitsumasa Yonai, Minister of the Navy, said that Tokyo and other large cities were safe from air assault. He disclosed that the "Navy is fully prepared to prevent any adversary's aircraft from reaching Japan."

Mr. Tucker Is Honored

Presentation Made on Behalf Of Cathedral Choir Prior to His Departure

On Wednesday evening prior to his departure for Vancouver to which city he has moved, E. W. Tucker, who has done valuable work as superintendent of the Postal Sunday School for the diocese, was honored at a meeting of the committee of St. Andrew's Anglican Cathedral where the presentation was made of a handsome mantle clock in appreciation of his long and faithful service to the church.

The presentation was made on behalf of the congregation by Very Rev. James B. Gibson, dean of the Cathedral, who voiced suitable remarks. H. T. Cross and R. L. McIntosh also spoke appreciatively. Mr. Tucker responded suitably.

Kimberley Winner In Puck Game

LONDON, Feb. 27:—The Kimberley Dynamiters representing Canada, defeated England by a score of three to nil last night before a crowd of 11,000 people at Wembley Stadium in the deciding game of the international amateur hockey championship which, as a result, is virtually clinched by Canada. It was the first defeat for England. Switzerland beat Germany six to nil in another game.

AUSTRALIA FAR AHEAD

Sets High Total For England To Shoot at in Deciding Cricket Match

MELBOURNE, Aust., Feb. 27:—A big crowd of 52,000 spectators attended yesterday's test cricket play when Australia took a decided lead over England in the fifth and deciding game. Australia today piled up a huge total for England to shoot at. After Don Bradman had been dismissed for 169 runs early in this, the second day's play two youngsters made big scores to carry the Australian total to 593 for nine wickets at the close of play. C. L. Babcock, a South Australian, made 118 and 20-year old R. Gregory of Victoria made 80.

SLAUGHTER IS HEAVY

Thousands Slain in Heavy Battles In Spanish Civil War—Results Still Indecisive

AVILA, Spain, Feb. 27: (CP)—In connection with the assertion that the general government offensive on the Madrid front had collapsed, the insurgent command in the Spanish civil war asserts that an entire battalion of Madrid militiamen was annihilated with machine guns and hand grenades. The number of soldiers in the slaughter is not estimated but the insurgents say that battalions usually number between six hundred and a thousand.

Reports from Barcelona say that two thousand insurgents were mowed down by government artillery in a mass attack by insurgents on Portal Bulo and Martin del Rio in Southern Aragon. Heavy fighting again centred around Oveda yesterday with 12,000 casualties on both sides.

Actor Is Executed

LISBON, Feb. 27:—A moving picture actor, Losita Diaz, who has appeared in American pictures, has been executed as a spy in the Spanish civil war, it is learned here.


