(Continued from Page One) g cided to fit himself for a legal career. He studied law in Char-6 lottetown and was admitted to the

Prince Edward Island bar in 1883. Almost at once he set out for the West, about which he had heard much, and for a short time practised in Winnipeg. "It was a toss up," he once said, "whether Winnipeg or Portage was going to be the commercial centre." He moved to Portage la Prairie, founded the firm of Macdonald and McPherson, and remained there until his appointment to the Court of King's Bench brought him to Winnipeg in 1906.

On the death of Hon. T. G Mathers in 1927 the government named Judge Macdonald his successor as chief justice of the Court of King's Bench. Soon after being appointed to this high office he was obliged to go to Rochester, Minn., to undergo two critical operations for a malady which had afflicted him for many years. He resumed his duties three months

## Investigated Charges

In 1929 Chief Justice Macdonald was a member of the Royal Commission which investigated charges of campaign fund irregularities made against the government of Premier John Bracken by Lieut.-Col. Fawcett G. Taylor, then Conservative Party leader. Serving with him on the commission were Mr. Justice A. K. Dysart and Mr. Justice J. F. Kilgour. The charges concerned granting of power rights at Seven Sisters Falls, on the Winnipeg River, 70 miles north of Winnipeg, to the Winnipeg El ectric Railway Company. The finding exonerated the government and dismissed all charges. During the course of the hearing the commissioners travelled to Los Angeles to examine a witness, A. W McLimont, former president of the Winnipeg Electric Company.

Always deeply interested in agricultural problems, he operated a large farm in the Portage la Prairie district. He was a member of the Portage town council, served as Crown prosecutor, and was preparing for entry into the political field when first called to the

In 1883 he was married to Marie Helen St. Luke Rogers in Winnipeg. There were four children.

Chief Justice Macdonald was a member of the Church of England and of the Masonic Order.

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



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
