Japanese Continue To Advance

Premier King Urges Canadians To Preserve Liberties Against Subversive Movements

OTTAWA, Oct. 27: (CP) - Unless the people are careful to preserve their hard won liberties the question between dictatorship and democracy now being fought out in Asia and Europe "might be fought out on this continent as well," Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King warned here last night. Voicing a plea for the maintenance of the "two old political parties," which he said produced the greatest democratic institution the world had ever known, the Premier warned against subversive movements active in Canada and looking towards disunity of the Dominion. "In some parts of the Dominion," Mr. King observed, "the people seem to think their only citizenship is to the province, forgetting the larger responsibility of citizenship to the Dominion."

North Vancouver Couple Take Fortune In Sweepstake While Another Canuck Gets \$150,000

NEWMARKET, England, Oct. 27: (CP) - T. Westhead's Punch, colt by Lancegaye out of St. Judy, today won the ninety-ninth running of the Cesarewitch Stakes. Mrs. Sidney Freeman's Fet, winner last year, was second and E. Robson's Solar Bear third in a field of thirty-one. The four-year-old Punch won by a length with two lengths separating Fet and Solar Bear. The winner paid long odds of 17 to 1. Fet started at 20 to 1 and Solar Bear at 100 to 8. Solar Bear's Successful placing brought nearly \$50,000 to Mr. and Mrs. E. Sparrow of North Vancouver who held an Irish Hospital Sweepstake ticket on the third place horse. One Canadian, who used the pseudonym "Como" on ticket no. LR 02007, drew the winner and takes \$150,000.

DIVIDENDS DECLARED

United States Steel and Great Northern Pay for First Time Since 1932

NEW YORK, Oct. 27: - United States Steel and Great Northern Railway announced dividends yesterday which did much to bolster the stock market. United States Steel declared a \$1 per share dividend on common stock payable December 20, the first to be paid since 1932. Great Northern announced a dividend of \$2 per share on preferred stock, also the first since 1932, payable December 20.

Big Movie Deal In United States

NEW YORK, Oct. 27: - Landing here from England yesterday, Alexander Korda, noted film producer, said that he had \$6,000,000 with which he and Samuel Goldwyn would purchase United Artists. Mrs. A. D. MAROONED FOR WEEK

Canadian Fishing Skipper Comes to Rescue of Puget Sound Trolling Boat

SEATTLE, Oct. 27: - A trolling boat with five persons on board was reported last night to be on its way south from Ketchikan to Puget Sound after having been broken down at Nigel Island, near the north end of Vancouver Island, those on board being marooned for a week. The plight of the toiler, believed to be from Port Angeles, was observed by Capt. Hansen of the fishing boat Western Cruiser which gave assistance and towed the distressed vessel to Alert Bay where repairs were made. On board the toiler were two men, a woman, an 18-year-old youth and a 17-year-old girl.

CLEAN-UP OF G.O.P.

New Faces and New Ideas Urged by Former President - No Personal Ambitions

BOSTON, Oct. 27: - In an address here yesterday, Former President Herbert Hoover called for a rejuvenated Republican party with new faces and new ideas. He urged a clean up of the party and the adoption of an affirmative platform. Hoover again made it plain that he himself had no desire to be a candidate for any public office. Meantime Former Governor Alfred M. Landon, Republican candidate in the last presidential election and regarded as Hoover's principal rival for leadership of the party, was in conference with John Hamilton, national chairman.

TALK BY WINDSOR

Former British Monarch Makes First Public Utterance Since His Abdication

PARIS, Oct. 27: (CP) - The Duke of Windsor, in his first public speech since abdication as King of England, announced to an Anglo-American news-men's gathering here that he was going to the United States as a completely independent observer without political consideration. He hoped, he said, to be able to aid in the solving of some of the vital problems that beset the world. "I am now a very happy married man," declared the former British monarch, "but my wife and I are neither content nor willing to lead a purely inactive life." The Duke criticized some news-men for apparently seeking ulterior motives in his actions.

SHANGHAI DEPOT IS CAPTURED

Fierce Fighting Perilously Close to International Settlement; Fires Raging

Italian Killed

Invaders are Moving on Chapei and Kiangwan Native Quarters of Great Port

JAPAN REJECTS BID TOKYO, Oct. 27: (CP) - Japan officially rejected the invitation to the Brussels conference of nine-power pact signatories guaranteeing China's territorial integrity. SHANGHAI, Oct. 27 - It was announced early today that the Japanese had definitely taken the hell-torn North Shanghai railway station, another important objective of fighting of the past seventy days. The Japanese flag was flown over the Shanghai-Nanking Railway giving the invaders control of the Shanghai-Nanking Railway. This brings the scene of action perilously close to the international settlement. The American defense line adjoins the North Station. Chinese may attempt to flee through the foreign zone. Fierce shelling of the Chinese centres of Chapei and Kiangwan continues both from the air and from land artillery. The trend of fighting is definitely against the Chinese defenders of Shanghai who have started a general retreat. Tremendous fires, set by Chinese and Japanese, raged through Chapei, native quarter of North Shanghai, today and even penetrated the international settlement at our point. Chinese aircraft raided the Tangstepoo section, dropping incendiary bombs and starting more fires. An Italian soldier in the international settlement was killed by a shell. The Japanese asserted last night that Chinese had lost 250,000 men since the battle for Shanghai started in August and predicted that they would lose another 25,000 within the next twenty-four hours. Japanese troops today occupied Niangtzekwan, main entrance to Shansi Province, Japanese headquarters announced.

G. E. Bellerose of Montreal, general manager of the Canadian National Express Co., H. E. Hislop, traffic manager, also from Montreal; C. A. Cunningham, general superintendent, Winnipeg, and B. A. Latta, superintendent, Edmonton, arrived in the city from the East on last night's train in the course of a western tour of inspection and will sail this afternoon on the Prince George to make the round trip to Anyox and Stewart and thence south to Vancouver tomorrow night. MONTAGUE ACQUITTED

Hollywood Golfer Extraordinary is Found Not Guilty on Charge of Hold-up

ELIZABETHTOWN, New York, Oct. 27: - After four and a half hours' deliberation last night, the jury in the case of John Montague, formerly known as Laverne Moore, golfer extraordinary, brought in a verdict acquitting Montague of a charge of hold-up of a roadhouse ten years ago. Judge Owens, in accepting the verdict, said it was not in accordance with what he himself would have found on the evidence but that, of course, was up to the jury. Montague, who comes from Hollywood, would have made a speech of appreciation to the jury but was estrained from doing so by the judge. "Wait a minute, this is no how," said the judge who cleared the crowded courtroom after cheers had broken out at the verdict. The verdict brought a \$1,000,000 contract to Montague from Hollywood.

PEACE FOR LABORITES

Important New Proposals Made to A.F.L. by C.I.O.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 27: - New and important peace proposals were made by the Committee on Industrial Organization yesterday to the American Federation of Labor. Following the proposals, the conference between the two organizations adjourned after a brief session until today when the Federation is expected to make counter-proposals. The C.I.O. still seeks the right to organize the workers in mass production.

FINANCIAL POSITION OF PROVINCE DESCRIBED AT OPENING OF LEGISLATURE

Throne Speech at Victoria Predicts Continuation of Improved Conditions - Whittaker is Named Speaker of House

VICTORIA, Oct. 27: (CP) - Lieutenant Governor Eric W. Hamber opened the nineteenth legislature yesterday with the Speech from the Throne which forecast continuation of improved conditions reflected in a record provincial revenue of \$28,102,612 during the past fiscal year. Current revenues, more buoyant than ever before in the history of the province, were shown in the public accounts which were tabled. They were \$2,240,535 above the last fiscal year, the previous high record. Out of revenue \$25,413,589 had been spent on ordinary expenditures and \$2,689,023 on relief. This left unprovided for out of current revenue another \$1,706,603 in direct relief costs and \$2,467,230 in deferred sinking funds. In addition, capital expenditures were \$6,156,157. The government balance sheet showed an increase in the gross debt of the province of \$5,020,700. Assets were increased by \$13,230,180 and liabilities by \$11,644,197. In the Speech from the Throne, the Lieutenant Governor forecast a new ministry of trade and industry and improvement of the Securities Act. Also various mining acts would be improved, consolidated and simplified. Norman W. Whittaker, member for Saanich, assumed the duties of Speaker. The address in reply to the Speech from the Throne is being moved this afternoon by Fred Crone, member for Vancouver Centre.

TEACHERS' CONVENTION

Successful and Interesting Gathering at Burns Lake Last Week

BURNS LAKE, Oct. 27: - The second annual Omineca teachers' convention was held in Burns Lake with a registration of 65 teachers, who arrived by train and auto last Thursday morning, returning to their various schools or homes on Saturday and Sunday. Mild, sunny weather prevailed, making ideal conditions, especially where so many had to drive. The large pansies and sweet peas still blooming here delighted the visitors. The convention opened at 1:30 Friday with invocation by Rev. Frank Bushfield followed by the address of welcome by T. Radley, secretary of the Burns Lake board of school trustees. Miss J. Sargent of Prince George explained the service and use of rural districts have the use of the "Library Service," whereby this service from Prince George for school libraries, local literary societies and the use of books on professional subjects for teachers. Inspector Gamble of Prince George spoke on "Education and Life." In part he said that the school was but one of many forces contributing to the education of the individual. The home, school, community, church etc., were all factors in this. He stated seven purposes of education. First health, which was strongly stressed; second, society (adaptability); third, personality; fourth, interest in beauty; fifth, attitude towards life; sixth, character (self-control), and seventh, ideals. The British Columbia Teachers' Federation was dealt with very briefly by Harry Charlesworth of Vancouver who explained the purpose of the Federation and the ways in which it is able to help teachers. He outlined some of the achievements of the Federation. Four local associations were organized by him with centres at Vanderhoof, Burns Lake, Smithers and Hazelton. Two demonstration lessons were given by Miss R. Butler of Endako and W. T. Arthurs of Decker Lake. "Music in the Schools" was the subject of K. Clotworthy's address. Continued on Page Two

Tennis Star Sustains Shock, Cuts and Bruises in Accident with Car

BAKERSFIELD, Cal., Oct. 27: - Don Budge, world's No. 1 ranking amateur tennis player, was suffering from cuts, bruises and shock here last night after a smash-up in his automobile while driving from Oakland to Los Angeles yesterday. Budge's car went into a ditch and turned over three or four times, finally landing on a railroad track alongside the road. The tennis star, his own car badly wrecked, was picked up by passing motorists and brought here from the scene of the smash-up, ten miles north of Bakersfield. After hearing of the accident, Elsworth Vines, former American amateur tennis ace, now professional, left Los Angeles to pick Budge up and take him the rest of the way to Los Angeles.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 27: - An increase in foreign income and a new shipbuilding program will bring a new upswing to industry in the United States, Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins declared yesterday. 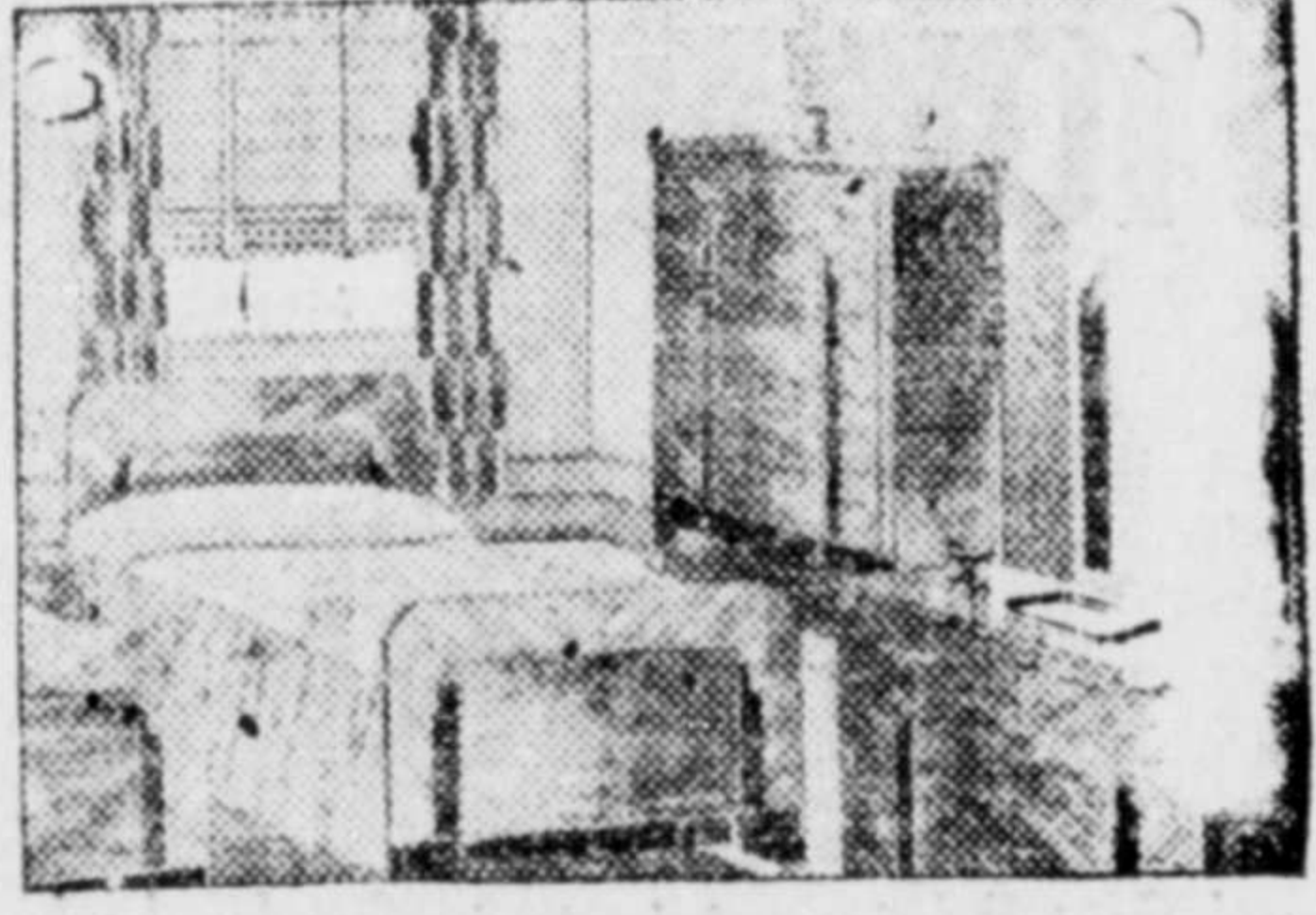

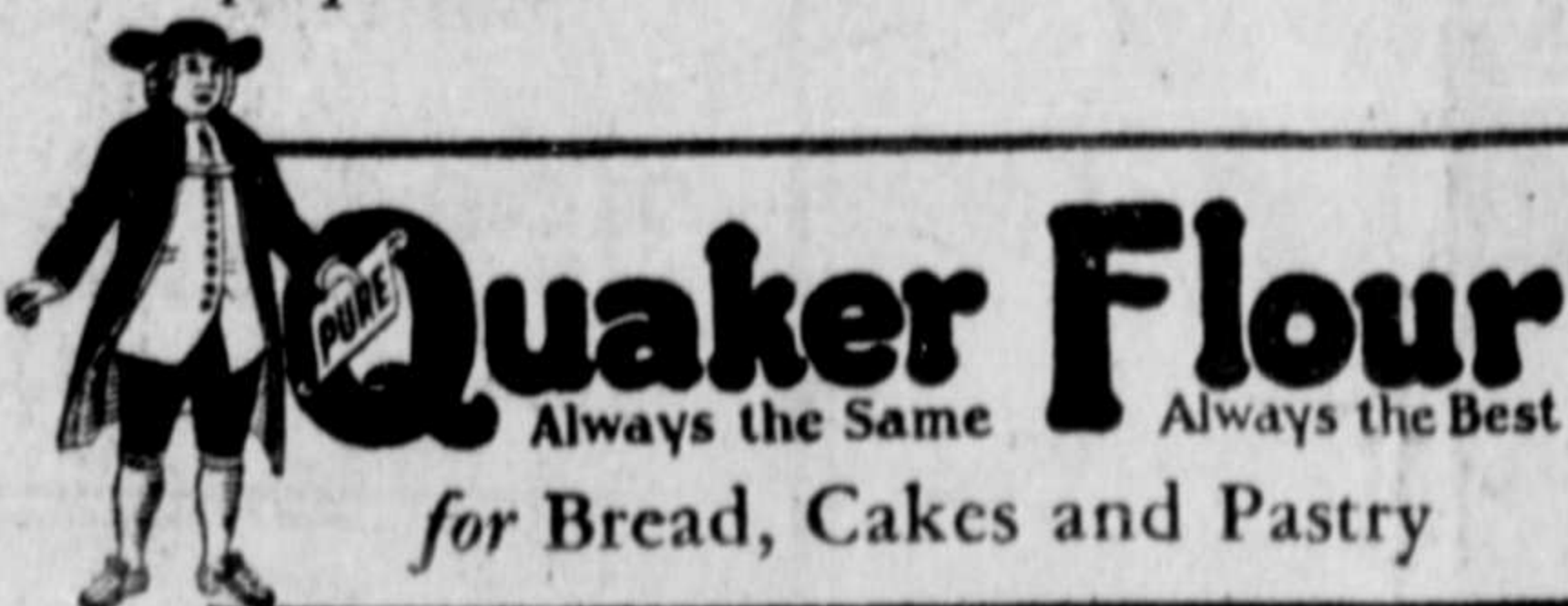

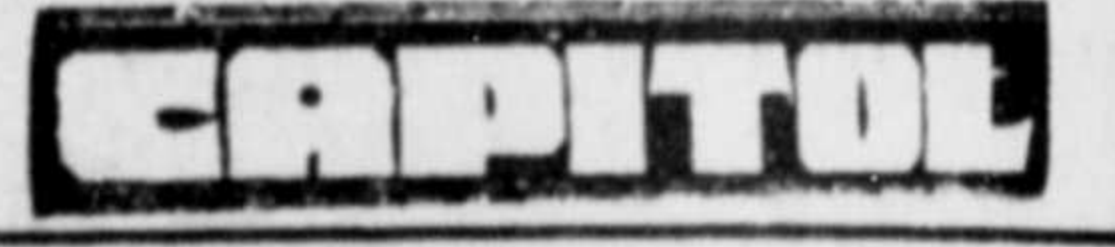
