TALK BY WINDSOR

Former British Monarch Makes First Public Utterance Since His Abdication

PARIS, Oct. 27: (CP) - The Duke of Windsor, in his first public speech since abdication as King of England, announced to an Anglo-American newsmen's gathering here that he was going to the United States as a completely independent ohserver without political consideration. He hoped, he said, to be able to aid in the solving of some of the vital problems that beset the world.

"I am now a very happy married man," declared the former British monarch, "but my wife and I are neither content nor willing to lead a purely inactive life."

The Duke critized some newsmen for apparently seeking ulterior motives in his actions.
