# Even Worse Floods Are Expected

## SIX ARE ARRESTED

Escaped Prisoner and Detective  
Are Slain in Gun Battle in  
Quebec

QUEBEC, Jan. 26: (CP)—Police announce that they are holding six men as an aftermath of a gun battle last night that saw an escaped prisoner and a detective fatally shot in a rooming house. Wilfrid Darveau, lessee of the rooms where Arthur Fontaine and Honorat Bernard were trapped by officers, is held on a charge of complicity and five others are in custody as material witnesses. The prisoners had escaped Sunday night.

## TRAPS ARE DISCUSSED

Both Neill and Hanson Condemn  
Salmon Devices in House  
At Ottawa

OTTAWA, Jan. 26: (CP)—A. W. Neill, independent member for Comox-Alberni, and Olof Hanson, Liberal member for Skeena, spoke in opposition to salmon traps in the course of debate in the House of Commons yesterday afternoon. A motion sponsored by Mr. Neill calling upon the government to cease issuing trap fishing licences was withdrawn after Hon. J. E. Michaud, minister of fisheries, had said that he would not oppose the matter before the fisheries commission. The minister of fisheries said the government would continue the present policy of limiting trap licences of which four or five are taken out each year for waters at the mouth of the Fraser River.

The debate brought most of the Pacific Coast members to their feet. Olof Hanson, speaking as one interested in canneries, supported the removal of traps from the Fraser River, saying that such a step would be of great benefit to the fishermen as a whole.

## Pioneer of New Westminster Is Dead at Old Age

NEW WESTMINSTER, Jan. 26:—William Wolfenden, former collector of customs here and more recently engaged in the grocery business, passed away at the age of ninety-three years. A native of England, Mr. Wolfenden came west in the first Canadian Pacific train. He retired from the customs service in 1921.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Jan. 26: (CP)—Rt. Hon. Walter Runciman, President of the British Board of Trade, announced yesterday that he and President Franklin D. Roosevelt were close to an agreement in principle on basis for negotiation of a reciprocal trade agreement between United States and Great Britain.

## DECIDING FOR WAR

Premier King Gives Assurance  
That Parliament Will Be  
Responsible

OTTAWA, Jan. 26: (CP)—Projected increases of Canada's defence forces are solely for the defence of Canada and are not designed for participation in any European war, Rt. Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King, Prime Minister, assured the House of Commons last night. Parliament, Premier King said, would decide whether Canada should participate in any war, regardless of the participation of other nations of the British Commonwealth.

## How Militarists Blocked Forming New Jap Cabinet

TOKYO, Jan. 26: (CP)—Army opposition yesterday blocked General Kazushige Ugaki, former Minister of War and Governor General of Korea, to whom military interests are opposed, from forming a cabinet by the press declared, refusing to name a Minister of War. This automatically created a deadlock as Japanese law requires that a general officer on the active list must hold that office. Ugaki had been invited by Emperor Hirohito to form a cabinet following the resignation of Premier Koki Hirota and his administration.

## Heavy Snow In Lower Skeena

Train For East Delayed on Account  
Of Plow Breakdown

The rotary snow plow having suffered a breakdown while working on a slide between Skeena and Kwinitsa which necessitated it being brought in for repairs, it was 9 o'clock this morning before the train which was to have left for the east at 6 o'clock last night got away.

Traffic, today, however, is reported normal and it was stated at the general superintendent's office this afternoon that the train, due from the east at 10:20 tonight, was running on time.

## Pattullo Is Not Planning To Go To Coronation

VICTORIA, Jan. 26:—Although reservations are being made for provincial premiers at the coronation of King George VI in London next May, no royal invitations are being extended to them. Such invitations would be tantamount to royal command which the new King is not desirous of issuing. Premier T. D. Pattullo is making no plans to go to the coronation, so far at least.

## FLAMING OIL FLOATS THROUGH CINCINNATI AND DOWN OHIO RIVER

CINCINNATI, Jan. 26: (CP)—Flaming oil floated through parts of Cincinnati today and coursed downstream on the flood waters of the Ohio River, bearing a torch of destruction toward other communities. The oil originated from the \$1,500,000 fire in the industrial Mill Creek district. Eighteen firemen were injured in fighting the fire. There were more fires in Cincinnati last night. Little water was available to fight them hydrants being under flood waters.

## William Anderson Named Magistrate

Hazelton Man Also to Act as Coroner in and for County Of

VICTORIA, Jan. 26: (CP)—William W. Anderson of Hazelton has been appointed a stipendiary magistrate and coroner for Prince Rupert County.

## Charred Body Is Found in Ruins Of Burned Cabin

KOKSILAH, Vancouver Island, Jan. 26:—The charred body of a man was found in the ruins of a cabin a short distance off the Island Highway yesterday. The cabin is believed to have been burned about Sunday.

## BIG ISSUE OF BONDS

Canadian National Railways  
Securities to be Offered  
Thursday

OTTAWA, Jan. 26: (CP)—An issue of \$35,500,000 of Canadian National Railways Dominion guaranteed bonds to be offered throughout Canada Thursday was announced last night by Hon. Charles A. Dunning, minister of finance. The issue includes \$15,500,000 of seven-year two and one-half percent bonds and \$20,000,000 of three percent bonds, due 1952, to reimburse the government for advances made within the past year to the railway company.

## CAN'T AID ABERHART

British Social Credit Leader  
Leaving Edmonton—Impos-  
sible to Co-operate

EDMONTON, Jan. 26:—John Hargrave, British Social Credit leader, left Edmonton suddenly yesterday for home.

"I find it impossible to co-operate with Premier Aberhart and his cabinet," said Hargrave. "I feel this government is not publicly committed to the principles of Social Credit."

Premier Aberhart struck back at his adviser, terming him a "faithless man" and "an ambitious egotist even though he be a self-styled advocate of Douglas Social Credit."

Both Mr. Hargrave and Premier Aberhart made conflicting press statements following the parting of their ways.

## Ed. Johnson, Former City Treasurer, Is Dead in Vancouver

VICTORIA, Jan. 26: (CP)—Ernest Dimery Johnson, former deputy minister of finance in the provincial government and for many years city treasurer at Prince Rupert, died here Sunday night. He had been ill for the past few years. His widow survives.

Mr. Johnson was born in Cheltenham, Eng., and was 59 years of age. He moved from Prince Rupert in 1919 to become deputy minister of finance.

## Subsidizing Of Pacific Ships

Dominions Concerned Expected To  
Co-operate in New Policy Of  
British Government

LONDON, Jan. 26:—The British government, it was reported yesterday, has agreed to the policy of subsidizing ships operating in Pacific waters. The ships must be modern and it is anticipated that the Dominions concerned may co-operate.

## Reichstag Called Into Session For Coming Saturday

BERLIN, Jan. 26:—The Reichstag was officially summoned yesterday to go into session on Saturday. Important pronouncements by Chancellor Adolf Hitler in regard to future domestic and foreign policy are expected.

## DISPUTE SETTLED

France and Turkey Come to Accord  
Over Future Status of Alex-  
andretta in Syria

GENEVA, Jan. 26: (CP)—The Franco-Turkish dispute over the status of Alexandretta has been settled with an official agreement between the two powers. Under the terms of the accord Alexandretta, the region on the border of Turkey and French-mandated Syria, is raised to the rank of an independent administrative entity but will still owe allegiance to Syria when France yields up its Syrian mandate three years from now.

## Radio Brief Is Given Approval

Final Approval Is Given to Hugo  
Kraupner's Memorandum

At a meeting of the joint radio committees of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce and the Junior Section held last night, with Felix Batt representing Station CFPR also in attendance, final approval was given the brief prepared by Hugo Kraupner in the interests of improved radio reception in this district and plans were laid for placing the whole proposition before the public for endorsement in the near future. To this end, a public meeting will be called next week, the date to be announced in a few days.

## MAKE HOSPITAL ALL NOISELESS

New Institution At White Plains,  
New York, to be Up-to-Date

WHITE PLAINS, N.Y., Jan. 26: (CP)—The new hospital here, plans for which have just been announced, will be as nearly noiseless as a hospital can be. One of the noise-reducing features calls for all wards to be built on the south side of the building overlooking gardens, all automobile traffic and parking being eliminated from that side.

## Warnings of Higher Water Yet Issued; Death Toll Eighty

Rampaging Ohio River Pouring Great Tide Into Missis-  
sippi—Ten Feet Above Record Mark of 1927  
Is Being Predicted

CINCINNATI, Jan. 26: (CP)—Ominous warning of a "super flood" in the vast Mississippi River valley added to the fury of the rampaging Ohio River as it continued to cut a wide path of devastation through the Middle West. Danger to the lower Mississippi, where six hundred thousand were homeless in 1927, developed today as the rain swollen Ohio began pouring a great tide of water into the Father of Waters at Cairo, Illinois.

United States Army engineers predict that the general states along the Mississippi may expect a height of water some ten feet above the records set in 1927.

Panic, famine, pestilence and fire continue to constantly menace cities and towns in the eleven-state flood area.

Property damage in Cincinnati is already estimated at \$10,000,000 and the city is on strict water rations. With its own power services gone, Cincinnati is now depending on Indianapolis and Dayton for its electrical supply. Transmission lines are threatened by the flood waters and, if they should go, the city will be in darkness to further add to the misery which approaches a condition of terror.

At Paducah, Kentucky, fourteen persons were drowned when a rescue barge capsized in the muddy flood waters covering the city streets.

Governor Albert B. Chandler declared martial law at Frankfort, Kentucky, where there was serious and fatal rioting when the reformatory became inundated and had to be evacuated.

At least eighty are now known to be dead as a result of the floods.

## Vancouver Cold Snap is Ended

Mild Rain Yesterday Followed  
Week-End of Fog, Sleet  
And Snow

VANCOUVER, Jan. 26:—The prolonged cold snap broke in Vancouver yesterday with a mild rain following fog, sleet and snow at the week-end. The end of the cold snap is welcomed by health authorities who see in it an amelioration of the influenza epidemic.

## River Thames Is Over Its Banks

Recent Torrential Rains in England  
Cause it to Overflow

LONDON, Jan. 26:—The River Thames, as a result of recent torrential rains, was in flood yesterday. Windsor road was under water as were Eton playing fields. The situation is not considered alarming.

## Improved Radio Station

The new radio station at Vancouver operated by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation was on the air Sunday and yesterday and proved to be a great improvement so far as local fans were concerned. A number of Prince Rupert people kept the dial on 1100 kilocycles throughout the evening. Reception was clearer than from the Seattle stations and there were none of the objectionable advertising interruptions which make so many stations unpopular. Many who listened remarked on the excellence of the programs.

This increase in power of CRCV is one of the improvements we have been asking for during the past several years. It so far gives excellent results but it does not guarantee daylight reception. The next move should be to either construct another station for northern and central British Columbia or make arrangements with the local station so that programs may be broadcast from Prince Rupert or some other point in northern or central B.C. that may be heard during the day at any point within a thousand miles. At present local programs seldom can be picked up at Portland Canal points, at Terrace, Hazelton or other interior points. Queen Charlotte Islands usually get the noon broadcast but in the evening, particularly during the winter, it is apt to be drowned out by other stations.

Broadcasting is a national business. It should be carried out either directly by the Radio Corporation of Canada or under close supervision by them and should be designed to give the best possible service to the audience it is designed to reach. We need a service that will reach every mining camp, logging camp and railway town so that all may learn to appreciate what it means to live in Canada and be a Canadian.

Recently a few local men put up a brave fight against being compelled to pay a radio licence when they received so little benefit from the Canadian government in the way of programs or keeping the air free from disturbance. One of these objections has now been removed and, doubtless, others will follow in due course. No one objects to paying a licence fee if they get something for their money. Evidently the new governing body of radio in Canada is realizing the situation and making an effort to improve conditions.

## SPORT CHAT

Frederick John Perry, the paddle-footed, pipe-smoking British player is worth money to pro tennis. Whether he is worth a top price of \$9.90 against Ellsworth Vines in the alternating hush and hand-clapping of Madison Square Garden is something else again. But the recently-turned pro, immaculately turned out tennis titan is a natural showman—the answer to the pro tennis troupe's prayer for color.

Even the experts who led off on their wrong-guessing for 1937 by picking Vines over Perry in the Briton's pro debut agreed that a sorely-needed personality had come to the ranks of the tennis mercenaries. Not forgetting that Bill Tilden with his enormous ego and constant carping was the greatest box-office draw once upon a time, they hailed the advent of Perry as the lift that would keep the pros from handing the game back to the amateurs for a time, at least.

From the moment when he stood at attention under a spotlight while the band played "God Save the King" (and the ring-worms who infest the place ordinarily wondered why they were playing "My Country 'Tis of Thee") until Vines eventually folded, Perry was a showman. Whenever he passed a linesman Perry ruffled that gent's hair. He mimed all over the court on oversize feet that do a duck-waddle—with never an extra step.

The befuddled critics, who found some solace in the fact that Vines was a bit sicker with influenza than Perry was, were pulling for the Englishman before it was over. You cannot hate a man who is totally unperturbed by the biggest crowd that ever saw a tennis match—at \$9.90 top. At set point, a galleryite let out a loud, complimentary sound as Perry tossed up the ball at service. Perry echoed the sound as he let the ball fall to the court without serving. Nothing ruffles him.

In fact, Perry is at his best when the fury is at its height—and in the past he has been at his worst when the going was easiest. Bill Tilden once sized him up as "the best-worst or worst-best tennis player I ever saw." After their first pro match Vines confided that Perry's earnings prior to his professional venture which stands to net him something between \$75,000 and \$100,000 in his "honeymoon year" was \$10,000 for some movie work in England. This payoff was not exactly cricket when Perry was ranked as an amateur, but it lightened the burden of those who sent him around the world as a tennis player.

### RUBBING IT IN

BIRMINGHAM, Jan. 26: (CP)—Aston Villa, erstwhile first division English football team, is finding the going pretty tough in the second league. Recently the team was delayed in its travels and a Rupert Butchers 8 16 wag wired the club secretary: "Understand Villa team lost in fog. Congratulations."

## Skiers Will Try For New Record

Biggest Jump in World Being Erected in Italian Alps

ROME, Jan. 26: (CP)—The biggest ski jump in the world is nearing completion at Sestriere, north of Turin in the southern Alps. Skiers will try this winter to better the world record held by Reidar Andersen, who cleared 311.60 feet at Planica, Yugoslavia, last year.

The ski run is on a slope of Mount Banchetta. The initial run is 360 feet long, followed by the spring run of 40 feet, then the landing run of 450 feet, completed by a level field 200 feet long. Alongside this gigantic leap another ski run of average dimensions is being constructed.

## BURNS IS HONORED

Stirring Address by Inspector Hall On "Immortal Memory" Last Night

The Burns Concert given by the Women's Auxiliary of the First Presbyterian Church last evening was one of the outstanding musical and literary events of the season.

The songs and airs of Scotland, so admirably sung and played stirred the hearts of the audience as did the address of Inspector T. W. Hall. The speaker, dispensing with any biography of the poet, treated the subject from the point of view of "Burns as a man." He said that the birthday of Burns was this night being commemorated in every community, not only from coast to coast in Canada and the United States, but in every country in the world where the English language is spoken. Burns was born in Scotland but he did not belong to Scotland alone, he belonged to the whole English-speaking people. With apt quotations he showed Burns as a humorist, a patriot, a lover of nature, a satirist and a writer of songs, his love songs being among the finest in any language. It was not these qualities alone, although they all helped, that enshrined Burns in the hearts of the people. It was the humanity of Burns, his love for his fellowman and his hatred and scorn of cant and hypocrisy that endeared him to the world. He dined with the noble and great but he never lost touch with the common people and it was of their joys and sorrows he wrote with inspired hand. The speaker advised the study of Burns from a literary viewpoint and claimed that there were no finer lines in poetic literature than the two from the song "Green Grow the Rashes O'."

"Her pretence han' she tried on man

"And then she made the lasses O'."

The musical part of the program was in keeping with the address and the excellent rendering of "Loch Lomond" by Mrs. J. H. Carson, "Callie Herrin" and "Comin' thro' the Rye" by Mrs. J. H. McLeod, "The Star of Robbie Burns" and "The Auld Scotch Sings" by Dr. R. G. Large, "Lassie O' Mine" and "Afton Water" by J. E. Davey, "Mary of Argyll" and "Ye Banks and Braes" by J. A. Teng and the instrumental "Echoes of Scotland" by the Misses Lawrence were all mixed by the humorous dialogue "Insulin' her Life" by Mrs. Robert Cameron and J. A. Teng.

The committee in charge consisted of Mrs. Robert Cameron, Mrs. E. J. Smith and Mrs. D. C. Stuart. Mrs. W. L. Sandison and Mrs. J. G. Steen presided at the door and Mrs. H. M. ## Timely Recipes

### LEFT-OVER MEATS

The housewife is often faced with left-overs of meat and poultry. These left-overs need not be wasted as they can be made into a great variety of dishes with the expenditure of a little time and house. Bones from roast and steaks should be utilized in making soup and stock. Surplus gravy and the liquid from stews may also be used for soups. A few of the uses which may be made of left-overs are:

Croquettes—Any kind of ground beef or poultry, one part mashed potato, or rice and egg, mixed with gravy, stock or white sauce, and fried in deep fat.

Hash—Two parts of any kind of ground beef and one part of mashed or chopped potatoes.

Stew—Cold roast beef, steak, or cetera, may be used in stews instead of fresh meat. Or the left-over may be cubed and reheated in gravy or white sauce.

Beef Pie—With stew as a basis put in baking dish and cover with baking powder biscuits, cut about one inch in diameter.

Minced Beef on Toast—Chop cold beef, heat in gravy, and serve on toast.

Escalloped Beef—Cut beef in cubes, mix with gravy, and place in baking dish with alternate layers of boiled rice or dressing. Cover with bread crumbs, and brown.

Shepherd's Pie—Same as for beef pie, except that cover is of mashed potatoes.

Jellied Meat—Cold roast steak, tongue, or tripe, cut in cubes and added to highly flavored gelatin stock. Mould, cool, and slice.

Beef Sandwiches—Finely-ground cold beef, seasoned and mixed with salad dressing, and Worcester-shire sauce.
