TOKYO, March 2: (CP)—Admiral Mitsumasa Yonai, Minister of the Navy, declared that, when Japan's rearmament program for the Navy and the Naval Air Force is completed, the Empire will not need to fear the United States for three years. Japan, the naval minister said, was ready to accept an invitation from a third power to discuss arms limitation with the United States but would not propose such a parley unless there seemed to be a definite prospect for an amicable settlement.
