

When the map of Europe was recast after the World War and Czecho - Slovakia, among other small nations, was granted national independence, a boyhood ambition of Masaryk was achiev-

In the course of his early disastrous Thirty Years' War his countrymen had been reduced to political, cultural, social and religious impotence. It was then that young Masaryk became imbued with the desire and hope of some day being able to free his

That having come to pass, the people of Czecho-Slovakia recog inized the efforts he had exerted in their behalf and when the republic was finally recognized as an independent nation, Dr. Masaryk was chosen as its first president.

He was looked upon as one of the great awakeners of the Bohemian Slovak people; he was called their liberator. After he had been in office a little more than a year, the National Assembly of Czecho-Slovakia, desiring that he should be honored as long as he lived, voted him the privi lege of remaining president for

The parents of Masaryk planned a teaching career for him that he might have a hard in enlightening the people of the virtual cessation of cargo handling country. 
