MONTS, France, May 19: (CP)-In announcing yesterday that e Duke of Windsor had chosen Thursday, June 3, the birthday of his father, the late King George, for his marriage to Mrs. Wallis Warfield, Herman Rogers, the Duke's spokesman, said that the wedding party would be confined to "those who have been with them (the Duke and Mrs. Warfield) during the past months."

Many had supposed that the Duke of Kent would be the best man but the announcement handed to the press by Rogers said tersely: "There will be no members of the Royal Family present." 




