LONDON - London busmen have voted to strike at midnight tonight. The threatened walk-out by 145,000 men, which would paralyze the city's main public transport system, became a virtual certainty when union delegates decided today to instruct their men to quit.

YUKON COUNCIL OPPOSED DAWSON, Y.T.-The Yukon council has passed a resolution "firmly and emphatically" protesting the proposed addition of this northern territory to British Columbia province. A plebiscite of the people of the Yukon should be taken, the council urges, before any action is taken. The council said it had knowledge that "sentiment in the territory was overwhelmingly opposed to any change." The governing body of the Yukon decided to send the Governor General-in-Council a memorial setting forth the opposition to placing the territory under administration of the province. The council in its first official comment "respectfully prays that no action be taken to carry out the proposal without approval of the majority of the people of the Yukon being given by a plebiscite."

Late Telegraphs Will Continue Search Off Coast of Alaska In Spite of Protest

Alaskan and Canadian Waters to be Re-visited Again In Course of Three-Year Plan Begun Last Year

TOKYO, April 30: (CP)-Japan will continue fishing surveys off the Alaskan coast in spite of opposition by the Canadian and United States fishing interests, the ministry of agriculture and forestry has made it clear. Fisheries and nautical experts are expected shortly to revisit Alaskan and Canadian waters in continuation of a search for new fishing grounds begun last year under a threevear plan. Canadian fisheries companies have protested that such experimentation indicated Japanese plans for encroachment of North American continental waters.

Canada's Lumber, Needles, Pins To Boost Nation's Imports To Mother Country in Bumper Year

LONDON, April 30: (CP) anada is well up in the list British Dominions and colonies showing increase in imports to England directly as the result of e Coronation with its festivities and great influx of tourist traf-

It is estimated 90,000 coronaon visitors will view the procession from stands with plankand seats of British Columbia ir. About 4,500 tons of timber were imported for this purpose n three-inch planks. If laid end o end that would be 800 miles of timber-240 miles for seats alone.

Imports of needles and pins from Canada have also increased England bought \$500,000 worth ast year when dressmakers first ot in their stocks for coronaon dressmaking. Silk stockings, spark plugs, tennis shoes and canned lobster, to say nothing of \$1,700,000 worth of camera films! are on the list of increased imorts from Canada to a land preparing for holiday making.

There is also a big up-trend importation of Canadian foodtuffs to feed the multitude, an nerease stimulated by the "Canada Calling" campaign in British cities. The Dominion is doing well n coronation business to boost ts growing trade. In 1931 exports to Great Britain totalled! \$107,500,000; in 1936, \$399,800,-100 according to the trade commissioner's figures. Other Dominions report trade increases.

Greater demand for wool than had been expected is reported by the Australian trade commis sioner's office. Much of this will be woven into material for large lags and into the new wool laces and wool and silk fabrics that are recognized "coronation fashions' All available dried fruits and tinned fruits are being shipped from Australia to fill Britain's extra orders, arriving in ships acked to capacity with tourists

TO THE ELECTORS OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

VOUR present Provincial Administration has been in office some three and a half years. During that time, I think that we have made clear our purposes upon your behalf and it now seems fitting to secure from you an expression of your desires for the immediate future.

The Legislature has therefore been dissolved, nomination day will be held May 11th, and polling day June 1st.

May I recall to your mind in broad general outline some of the things which have been accomplished:

A Commission is to study the all important question of the mutual relationships of the Provinces and the Dominion with a view to amending the constitution to meet existing requirements.

Your Provincial Government has pursued this matter from the day of its taking office, and pending adjustment of the larger issue, secured an annual interim payment of \$750,000, over and above what had previously been paid to the Province. The credit of our Province has been reestablished and a recent sale of bonds was made at the lowest rate of interest in the history of the Province.

In addition to public works carried out solely on our own account, a joint programme was arranged with the Dominion Government for main highway construction and other functions of beneficial character.

The Municipalities have been relieved of social service costs to the extent of more than \$700,000 per annum and, in addition, the Government has assumed a larger percentage of relief costs.

The position of the workers of the Province has been greatly improved and millions of dollars have been added to the industrial pay-roll.

Industry has been encouraged and assisted through governmental co-operation.

Action has been taken under exceptionally difficult conditions of legal and economic character to enable the producer of natural products to market these products to the advantage of both producer and consumer.

Prospecting and the development of the mining industry has been encouraged through the construction of roads and trails.

Definite action has been taken and foundation laid of far reaching character in the sphere of education, including recreational training.

Health and welfare problems have been aggressively attacked. Remarkable progress has been made and benefits extended.

No part of Canada has had better administration of unemp oyment relief under very trying conditions.

The integrity of our credit, the good name of our Province and provincial institutions generally have been maintained, and our position established upon a solid and progressive basis.

Not only has all of the foregoing been accomplished without any increase in taxation, but there have been decreases in taxation, notably the abolition of the one per cent tax on wages in the lower brackets.

NOW, WHAT OF THE FUTURE? We shall exert unbending effort towards the amendment of our consitution for the mutual advantage of the Provinces and the Dominion, and for the placing of this Province in a position of equality with the other Provinces in the Confederation of Canada.

This question is vital to the welfare and prosperity of all of us. No other question before us is of so transcendent importance because our activities in all matters depend so largely upon it.

Institutional and other buildings essential to the public service will be constructed.


The position of the Municipalities will be further reviewed and definite action taken as carly as possible.


