Strong Praise For Pattullo

The Victoria Daily Times, which has shown its independence in the past by offering criticism when it deemed it advisable, has loud praise to give the Pattullo government. Following a radio speech by Mr. Pattullo last week, the Times said:

"It was not surprising that Premier Pattullo had not a very great deal new to tell the people of the province when he spoke to them over the air last night. The excellent record of his government really needs no special emphasis—even though there is to be a provincial election in a few weeks' time—for in the three and one-half years in which it has been in office it has accomplished much of which it may reasonably be proud and which has been of considerable benefit to British Columbia's citizens. From newspaper reports and by way of Mr. Pattullo's intimate talks over the radio, the public has been kept adequately posted on the manner in which their affairs have been conducted.

"Perhaps the most important points to be borne in mind at the present time is that provincial revenues, especially during the last twelve months, continue to increase and that the credit of the province stands high in the marts of finance, as the flotation of the recent loan at a little more than three percent strikingly indicates. Critics of the government, of course, are trying to be shocked at the amount of money that has to be spent, and yet those same critics are demanding that this and that commission be created without delay.

"This all boils down to the plain fact that you can not eat your cake and still expect to keep it. After all, the government gets its money from the people. It is the people, through the various delegations that come to Victoria, who implore the government to spend more and more money. It is commendable, indeed, that the Pattullo administration has had the courage to tell some delegations when it has considered requests for money have not been justified.

"In sum, Premier Pattullo has nothing for which to apologize. On the other hand, in all his public statements he has not attempted to cover anything up. He has been most thoroughly frank. If we may use the term, he is built that way. So, as he enters another campaign, he ought to be able to count upon the election at the polls of a sufficient following to enable him to form a government assured of legislative control."

The telegraphs are able to telegraph orders for flowers throughout the continent and overseas, wherever a member of the association is located, and flowers will be delivered speedily at the desire of the sender. According to officers of the telegraphs roses will again be the most favored gift but carnations and other flowers are growing in popularity.

Since the inauguration of Mother's Day in 1910, the anniversary has steadily grown in public favor and this year the telegraph companies anticipate that a new record will be set for the number of messages and floral tributes which will be sent throughout the country.

Bernice Palmer says . . .

You know this is National Fish year or something or other and Canada expects every housewife to do her duty. Fired with ideas and ambition, I have made the rounds of every chef, economics director and, last but not least, the Fish Dealers' Association with the intention of learning something about the food value and so forth of this part of our diet and have returned so full of information and recipes my head is in a whirl and I am full of resolutions to have fish oftener and "differenter." You know Prince Rupert is so dependent on fish for its existence, you really should eat more of it and, after you have tried out some of the recipes I am going to pass along, you will agree with me that fish is a very delicious food as well as a nutritive one. For instance, did you know that oyster is equal or excelled only by liver in the amounts of iron and copper which it may furnish to the diet in an average serving—an important point in the treatment of anemia? It would take too long and be too technical to go into vitamin content etc., but I will quote from "An Outline, Bureau of Fisheries, Document No. 1090" prepared by B. A. Ghio for the Central Pacific Wholesale Fish Dealers' Association: "It seems permissible to conclude that fish as a class are a safeguard against mineral deficiencies in the diet and that they deserve more attention than they have had from chemists and dietitians from this point of view."

And now for the King of all fish, fresh salmon, and served fit to please a King.

Salmon Aspic

Have ready three pounds of salmon, wrap in a clean piece of muslin and put in a kettle with two tablespoons of minced carrot, two tablespoonfuls each of onion and celery, a sprig each of thyme and parsley, two cloves, half a bay leaf and one-half lemon sliced. Pour over boiling water to cover, salt and let boil slowly until tender, when it will pierce with a fork, remove from kettle. Strain the liquid and measure. If you do not have enough for one quart, add boiling water to make that amount. Soak two envelopes of gelatine in one cupful of cold water ten minutes and dissolve in the hot stock, season highly with more salt if need be, pepper and a dash of cayenne. Now add the shell and white of an egg (the shell broken) and the

white beaten until frothy. Set on fire, bring to a boil then place where it will keep warm, but not cook, for twenty minutes, after which strain through double cheesecloth. The liquid will be clear. Pour half the liquid into a mold, put into refrigerator until it "sets." On it arrange the salmon (which should be cold and from which you have removed bones and skin), also slices of hard boiled eggs and strips of pimiento for a garnish, and add just enough of the cold liquid to hold the ingredients on the first layer of jelly. Put into refrigerator to chill and when it is "set" add the rest of the jelly. Let stand overnight when it will be ready to turn out and serve.

And for just two, this is easy to prepare and good to taste. Break one pound of fresh boiled salmon into small pieces and fold in one cupful of medium white sauce. Serve on a mound of steamed rice and garnish with parsley.

LOUISVILLE, April 30: (CP)—There will be something more at stake than the major portion of a \$50,000 purse when No Sir, owned and trained by Mary Hirsch, starts in the Kentucky Derby May 8—victory would make his owner the first woman ever to train a Derby winner.
