Japs Shoot British Ambassador

SCHOOL BECKONS SOME TWO MILLION YOUTHS IN CANADA THIS YEAR

More Work Lessens Population in Institutions of Learning; Birth-rate Decline of Seven Years Ago Takes Its Toll

One-fifth or more of Canada's population returns to school rooms in September. The total of scholars is appreciably lower than three years ago, and is again coming close to the figures of 1929, when school attendance was 24.4 per cent of population. On the whole depression increased school population; recovery reduced it.

No accurate estimate can yet be made of the school enrolment for the new term, but a rough approximation gives 2,200,000 scholars. In 1934 attendance was 2,265,000, but three years ago Canada's school population had risen to 2,527,000.

The depression was undoubtedly the principal cause of the increase from 1930 to 1934 in the number of high school students, and greater opportunities for the young people in economic life has accounted for a gradual decline in this bracket since.

High school enrolment in Nova Scotia next term will decrease slightly or at best remain stationary. New Brunswick, however, expects a slight increase in high school attendance due to ordinary natural increase in population. Recovery is reducing enrolment in Prince Edward Island.

Quebec, figuring on a slight increase in total enrolment, finds it too early yet to estimate how recovery is affecting school population of the province. Pupils attending school in Quebec tend to decline in numbers in the lower grades probably because families were restricted during the depression.

Ontario education authorities decline to draw any general conclusions from the school figures for the province. There is a gradual increase, however, in secondary school enrolment in Ontario, and an apparent increase in elementary schools, although the changes are slight in the last year or two. Average daily attendance in Ontario in 1929 was 535,691; in 1934, 675,000 and the latter will probably remain the approximate figure for 1937-38.

Varies in West
In Manitoba total enrolment has lately consistently declined, elementary school attendance last year being 13,000 below 1926. But secondary schools are gradually increasing again. Pupils in Alberta high schools have doubled in the past 10 years but elementary pupils remain about the same.

In Saskatchewan, primary school attendance has decreased sharply from 1931 and is still below the figures for 1926. Decline in the birthrate is held generally responsible. But in the secondary schools, Saskatchewan has more scholars than ever before. Last season's enrolment was 14,000 more than 1931, an echo of lack of crops and harvesting, probably.

In British Columbia, total school is going up, with an increase of nearly 15,000 over 1927, but the increase has been very gradual in late years and confined almost wholly to high schools, with a consistent decline in elementary schools.

A slight decline in enrolment of lower grades in Nova Scotia is attributed to migration of young married couples or people of marriageable age in the late 20's. "More work available" is frankly given as the reason for the decline in attendance in Prince Edward Island.

The depression had little effect on Catholic schools in Quebec, which consistently reported an increase, but there was a setback in the Protestant schools.

CHECK UP ON LEWIS

Counter - Political Movement In Labor Ranks Now Contemplated

ATLANTIC CITY, August 26:—Recent talk of a John L. Lewis labor party for the 1940 campaign led American Federation of Labor leaders today to extend their anti-Lewis battle to the political field. The federation's executive council ordered President William Green to find out whether Lewis had converted labor's non-partisan league into the C.I.O. political agency as reports from Washington said he intended to do.

Works Administrator Harry Hopkins to Make Study

WASHINGTON, D.C., August 26:—Administrator Harry L. Hopkins told a workers' alliance delegation he planned a thorough study of Works Progress Administration labor relations. "Labor relations are one of the most serious and important problems we have to deal with," he told delegates representing a march of the Relief Workers' Union.

AUTOCRACY IS CHARGED

Aberhart Attacked by One of His Former Ministers Following Debt Moratorium

EDMONTON, August 26: (Canadian Press)—Charging the Alberta government with adopting autocratic methods, W. N. Chant, former minister of agriculture in the Aberhart Social Credit cabinet, said in a statement yesterday that he no longer could support the government and must take up a position with the freedom that goes with a private member.

Chant's statement came shortly after the moratorium postponing for six months payment of debts owing all corporations went into effect in Alberta. The moratorium covers all debts contracted before July 1 of last year. The moratorium further prohibits court action and suspends all actions before the courts to enforce collection of debts owing machinery companies and all such corporations. It does not cover debts owed by companies.

NEW SUB LAUNCHED

Latest Undersea Craft Takes to Water at Portsmouth, New Hampshire

PORTSMOUTH, N.H., August 26:—Uncle Sam's newest submarine the "299," with a total 1445-ton displacement, was launched at the navy yard here yesterday. It was authorized to be built by the Naval Appropriation Act for the fiscal year 1936. It will be completed about next March first.

Plane Raised At San Diego

Navel Inquiry to be Held Into Crash Which Took Six Lives

SAN DIEGO, Cal., August 26:—The fourteen-ton patrol plane, in which six naval airmen were killed and two injured, was raised from the bottom of the harbor into which it crashed, and towed to the naval air station where a board of inquiry was in session.

Two Fliers In Texas Killed

Instructor and Cadet Lose Their Lives in Crash of Plane

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., August 26:—Two Randolph Field fliers, an instructor and a cadet, were killed when their plane crashed and burned in a field two miles north of Schertz.

Attack Upon Diplomat Near Shanghai Makes Situation In Orient Appear Critical

BLOCKADE SHIPPING

Japanese Endeavoring to Hold up Chinese Along Coast—Battle Tide Goes Back and Forth

Japan Defiant

May Stop Foreign Shipping—Premier Scoffs at Peace Efforts

TOKYO, August 26: (Canadian Press)—Japan has ordered a blockade of all Chinese official and private shipping on the Chinese coast, the Domei News Agency said yesterday. The blockade, it was stated, this morning by Japanese naval authorities may include foreign shipping along 800 miles of the Chinese coastline.

Premier Fumimaro Konoye declared today that Japan considered British and United States efforts to halt fighting in the Shanghai area of little importance.

Apparently furious over setbacks earlier in the day when landing parties were halted by explosions from hidden Chinese mines and fire from secret machine gun nests, the Japanese demolished Chinese villages along the Yangtze River with naval and aerial fire.

The Chinese announced that a counter-attack in the Woosung sector north of Shanghai had swept Japanese from four strategic towns.

The Chinese are resisting fresh Japanese attacks stubbornly on all fronts.

A new estimate of casualties as a result of the thirteen-day-old war was made last night, placing the dead at 14,000 with more than twice that number wounded. More than four thousand have been killed in Shanghai alone.

WASHINGTON, D.C., August 26:—William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, told the Maritime Commission it should frankly and courageously support the International Seamen's Union in preference to labor groups which advocate and practice sit-down strikes.

WARSHIP TROUBLE

Incident Recently Aboard Warspite Revealed After Naval Court Probe

LONDON, August 26: (Canadian Press)—That there had been trouble aboard the battleship Warspite on June 30 was revealed last night for the first time when a naval court returned its findings. It is said the trouble arose over a misunderstanding regarding weekend leave.

Sir Hughe Knatchbull-Hugessen Seriously Injured When Two Bombers Spray Car With Machine Gun Bullets Between Nanking and Shanghai

LONDON, August 26: (Canadian Press)—The British Government announced today that it will take appropriate action in connection with the wounding of the ambassador to China by Japanese planes after making a thorough investigation of the incident.

SHANGHAI, August 26: (Canadian Press)—The Sino-Japanese war took a grave international turn today when Sir Hughe Knatchbull-Hugessen, British ambassador to China, was seriously wounded by an attack from Japanese airplanes. The automobile in which the ambassador was riding from Nanking to Shanghai was attacked by two Japanese bombers near Shanghai.

The ambassador was seriously wounded by spraying machine gun bullets and sent to hospital. One bullet was lodged near the spine but it was believed he might recover.

Sir Hughe, who has been working to forestall the spread of Sino-Japanese hostilities, is the first cousin of Senator Adrian Knatchbull-Hugessen K.C. of Montreal.

"G.O.P." IN SESSION

United States Republicans Believe Roosevelt is Slipping

WASHINGTON, August 26:—President Roosevelt is "slipping politically," seventy Republican state chairmen in conference have agreed here. With John D. A. Hamilton, Republican national chairman, the state leaders, behind closed doors at G.O.P. headquarters overlooking the White House, mapped plans which they hope will result in Republican gains in the national and state elections next year.

Postmaster General James M. Farley denied yesterday that there was any breakdown in President Roosevelt's leadership of the Democratic party. There would be no reprisals against any Democrats who had bolted the New Deal, he said.

DESTROYER IS IN PORT

H.M.C.S. Fraser Arrives With Hon. Ian Mackenzie and Premier Pattullo on Board

Having on board Hon. Ian Mackenzie, minister of national defence, and Premier T. D. Pattullo of British Columbia, H.M.C.S. Fraser, one of two new destroyers recently brought to Canada from England, arrived here at 2:30 this afternoon from the south.

Capt. Mackenzie will proceed to Ottawa on tomorrow morning's train.

Mr. Pattullo, here in connection with the welcoming of Lord Tweedsmuir, Governor General, to this coast, will be here until the first of next week when he will proceed to Prince George.

CITY BOND BIDS GAIN

Price Obtained Today is More Than Double What it Was Four Years Ago

In the space of the last four years, Prince Rupert city bonds have more than doubled in value on the security market, it was learned at the City Hall this morning. In 1933 \$10,000 of city bonds were sold at \$33. Yesterday a local broker received an inquiry from an investor who wished to purchase \$6000 worth at \$75.

The improvement in the value of city bonds has been quite gradual. In 1935 the price had advanced from \$33 to \$55, in 1936 to between \$60 and \$62 and in 1937 to between \$65 and \$66.

BOAT WAS BLOWN UP

Three Indian Fishermen at Mill Bay Have Narrow Escape—Cannery is Shaken

At 11 o'clock on Monday night of this week Mill Bay Cannery at the mouth of the Naas River was rocked by an explosion which demolished the new 32-foot net boat of an Indian fisherman, Sam Hygms, who, with two companions, Philip Clark and Henry Azak jr., were blown clean out of the vessel but miraculously escaped with injuries no more serious than a few burns about their faces.

The boat, which had been built early this year at Mill Bay and had been operated only this season, was lying on the tide flats at the time. The three men were lighting a lantern in the engine room where there were gas fumes when the explosion occurred. The cabin was lifted into the air, the boat was blown apart and the men thrown onto the flats. The whole cannery was shaken and the residents aroused.

After the explosion what was left of the boat burst into flames. All available fire extinguishers were used before the fire was put out. A nearby boat, another gillnetter belonging to Frank Calder, was partly burned.

The Hygms boat was equipped with a 5 h.p. Vivian gasoline engine.

POSSIBLE BUILDING BOOM

The American continent is due for a building boom. It is about a quarter of a century since the last building and land boom caused a number of busy years in Canada and the United States and since that comparatively little has been done to provide proper housing for the people except in a few scattered localities. In 1912 land values were very high, much too high. New subdivisions were being put on the market in almost every town or city and new homes and business buildings were being erected. The movement had commenced several years prior to that and it continued to about the year war broke out in 1914. Then followed a slump.

Today there is a lack of housing facilities almost everywhere. Even in Prince Rupert there are very few homes that can be rented or even purchased. Almost all are occupied. Many of the old buildings need new foundations and other renovations. When work commences on the pulp mill, hundreds of houses will be needed, a good road will have to be built connecting the city with Seal Cove or wherever the mill is located. In fact an alternative route may be required. Water mains will have to be laid, sewers constructed and much other work done. New businesses will open and new business blocks will be erected. It is difficult to imagine what the city will be like, once work is commenced.

Any local activity will have nothing to do with the general real estate and building activity that seems likely to spread over the country before long. Once it gets going there will be general activity in the building trades. Real estate offices will open and accommodation will be needed for them as well as for expansion of other businesses. History repeats itself. That was what happened at the beginning of the century and is likely to happen any time now. It is being forecast in many quarters and everything seems to be working in that direction. Those who expected another slump next year will be grievously disappointed but let us look forward with pleasure rather than with dread to the general improvement that seems to be in store for us.

JOE LOUIS FAVORITE

Three to One That World's Heavyweight Champion Will Win—
Fight Postponed

NEW YORK, August 26: (Canadian Press) — Betting today is around three to one that Joe Louis, youngest heavyweight champion ever, will win his first title defense here Monday by knocking out Tommy Farr, the English challenger.

The fight was postponed from tonight until Monday owing to threatening weather.

Farr himself and one British news writer are the only two who pick the challenger to lift the crown.

The bout starts at 6 p.m. Pacific Standard Time if it does not rain and thirty thousand customers will pay about \$250,000 to see it.

Both fighters are twenty-three years old. Farr, weighing 204, has a six pound advantage and has a five-inch longer reach than Louis.

SPORT CHAT

For a long time the eastern team of Canadian professional golf players have been matching themselves—in a purely conversational way, of course—against the best money players in the United States. And they have been giving themselves none the worst of it, either. They have spoken confidently of what they would do to an American team, especially in a battle on Canadian territory. In an international contest along the lines of the British-U. S. Ryder Cup matches, they would do all right. They just needed the opportunity.

It's all arranged now, the Canadian team has been picked and the United States Professional Golfers Association will name a group of ten for the match at St. Andrew's, Toronto, September 8. The U. S. team will likely include such players as Harry Cooper, Lawson Little, Jimmy Thomson, Paul Runyan, Byron Nelson, Ralph Guldahl, Ed Dudley, Tony Manero, Sam Snead and Denny Shute. As Cooper, Thomson and Little were ineligible for the Ryder Cup team which defeated Great Britain in July—Cooper and Thomson because they were born abroad—the team that plays Canada may conceivably be stronger than that which whipped the British.

The question is squarely up to the home pros now and they will be the first to admit that the job ahead is formidable. Who is going to knock off the par-beating Cooper? Is there any assurance a Canadian can make Guldahl, the U. S. open champion, say "Uncle?" No, there's no assurance, but there is a chance. For one thing the five foursomes and 10 singles are 18-hole events and over the short distance anything can happen. There will be a great deal of elbow room for upsets. Any of these surprise results will favor the home side, because man-for-man the invaders are better scorers, more experienced campaigners.

This eastern campaign has produced two outstanding Canadian players — 25-year old Stanley Horne of Ottawa, P. G. A. champion in 1936 and 1937, and the tiny veteran from Quebec, Jules Huot. A few days before his P. G. A. triumph this month, Horne won the Quebec open. Huot captured the Quebec open. Huot captured the third top-flight in Bob Gray Jr., of Windsor, leading Canadian in last year's national open, when he finished with a pair of 69's right under the nose of the then little-known Guldahl. Gray is capable of lower scoring than any home player with the exception of Huot.

The three—Horne, Jules Huot and Gray—head the Dominion forces. Other members of the team are Bobby Alston and Ernie Wakelam of Ottawa; Roland Hu-

Two squares unsweetened chocolate, 1 1/3 cups (1 can) sweetened condensed milk, 1 cup toasted bread crumbs, few grains salt, 1/2 cup walnut or pecan nut meats, 24 walnut or pecan halves (optional).

Melt chocolate in top of double boiler. Add sweetened condensed milk and stir over boiling water 5 minutes or until mixture thickens. Add toasted bread crumbs, salt and nut meats which have been chopped. Blend thoroughly. Drop by spoonfuls on buttered baking sheet. Press half a nut meat into each cookie, if desired. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 10 minutes, or until brown. Remove from pan at once. Makes about 24.

SHOOTING IS DUTY

Not Only Good Sport But Valuable
Asset in Time of Stress—Gyro
Club Has Champion at
Luncheon

Rifle or revolver shooting is not only a good, clean sport, to have proficiency in which one must live cleanly, indulge in no excesses, be in possession of all the faculties and have self-control, patience and steadiness, but it is also a valuable defence asset from a military standpoint, declared Robert G. Pickrell, sergeant of the Canadian National Railways police from Winnipeg and world's champion revolver shot, in the course of addressing the Prince Rupert Gyro Club at luncheon yesterday. Indeed, Sergeant Pickrell expressed the opinion that it was every man's patriotic duty to learn proficiency in marksmanship. "One nation which contemplated attacking another might hesitate in doing so if it was known that every man and woman in the nation to be attacked was an accurate rifle or revolver shot," said the interesting speaker. "It might even be the means of preventing an attack." Sergeant Pickrell recommended rifle or revolver shooting as a means of making better citizens out of boys and girls. One who would be a good shot could not drink or smoke heavily, said the speaker.

It took about six weeks to learn the rudiments of revolver shooting, said Sergeant Pickrell who told of some of the elements which entered into match shooting. Among important things were the time of day and the weather. Early in the morning or late in the evening there was not usually the wind to contend with such as there was in midday. It was difficult to shoot in rain. The ideal time was just after a rain. Therefore, the element of luck entered into the winning of a championship in marksmanship and the "breaks" counter when one was in competition with several hundred crack shots.

Describes Technique

Sergeant Pickrell briefly reviewed the history of shooting from the time of crude slingshots and later boys and arrows, pistols, rifles and machine guns. Some of the intricacies of pistol shooting technique were described by the speaker who gave an interesting demonstration of his own prowess, showing amazing skill in the use of a .38-calibre pistol at a range of about ten yards. He fired fifteen rounds at targets placed against a cubic foot box stuffed with cotton waste and with a steel back.

Dr. H. N. Brocklesby, president of the club, was in the chair and expressed the appreciation of members and guests to Sergeant Pickrell for his talk and demonstration. The guests included Dr. A. L. Pritchard, past president of the Nanaimo Gyro Club, L. H. Haworth, John Bulger, Ted Mills, Joe Scott, J. T. Harvey, J. H. Norden and Alex McRae.

Sergeant Pickrell, who is here with the special train of the Governor General, is the holder of many records including all Canadian and American pistol and revolver titles as well as the Scottish, British and world championships. He is also the only Canadian ever to qualify as master shooter of the world and holds three world's records—one for pistol shooting and two for revolver shooting.

From the Waterfront

The Prince Rupert Fishermen's Co-operative has increased the advance price for cohoes, those marketed today receiving 9½¢. Packer Ogden brought in 5,000 pounds from Squadaree, 13,000 from Macaulay Island and 2,600 pounds from Freeman Pass. Troller Nordic, Capt. Gus Normann, delivered 1800 pounds.

The tourist season is now about over and, with the end of August, steamship and train services here will be reverting to fall schedule. Already there is a sharp falling off in Alaska travel. The steamer Prince Rupert, which was here from 10 o'clock yesterday morning to 1 o'clock in the afternoon on the last voyage of Canadian National Steamships Alaska sailings, had only 108 round trippers on board. The Prince Rupert will be back here next Monday southbound.

C.N.R. steamer Prince Charles, Capt. James Watt, is due in port at 5 o'clock this afternoon from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands. The vessel sails at 10 o'clock Saturday night on her return south over the same route.

RAILWAY TO THE COAST FROM PEACE

Support of Vancouver and Prince
Rupert Asked and Suggestion
Made They Should Agree
On One Project

Hon. James Gardiner, minister of agriculture in the Mackenzie King government, accompanied by James A. McKinnon, Member of Parliament for West Edmonton, and J. H. Tremblay, Federal member for Grouard recently visited the Peace River district and, at a complimentary dinner given them, Page Rideout presided and C. W. Frederick was also a speaker. The Peace River Record in reporting the proceedings, said in part:

"Mr. Rideout was in his best form in presenting an eloquent appeal for a coast outlet for the Peace River Country. He recalled the program of development of the north with a port at Prince Rupert which has been envisioned and inaugurated by the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and after showing the neglect of this project that has been witnessed in recent years, he regretted that so great and vital a program had been allowed to disintegrate, and wondered how the present prime minister of Canada would square himself with Laurier were the two to meet on the other side of the pearly gates.

"There is a vast wealth awaiting development by transportation throughout all the country between here and the coast, said Mr. Rideout, and a vast area suitable and waiting the development that would follow the provision of that transportation to provide homes for many hundreds of families from drought areas who would find here fertile lands on which to establish new homes.

Lack of Interest

"Delay in providing a coast outlet must be charged to lack of interest rather than lack of capital, said the speaker, since it was evident that there is plenty of capital for all other projects in all parts of Canada, and he cited a long list of expenditures in millions extending all the way from Halifax to Victoria. In the face of these vast sums that are voted annually for all sorts of purposes, it could not honestly be urged that lack of funds was the reason for not providing the Peace River country with its natural outlet to the sea. We could be made to believe many things, but when Canada had been supplied with hand-picked immigration, not all the nuts had been placed in Alberta, and we cannot believe a coast outlet is impossible except through disinterestedness on the part of the Dominion as a whole."

possible except through disinterestedness on the part of the Dominion as a whole."

At a Liberal rally in Peace River in which the same speakers took part, Mr. McKinnon, Liberal member for Edmonton West, stressed his continued support for the Peace outlet but suggested that the active co-operation of Vancouver and Prince Rupert should be obtained in the campaign and he asked that all agree on one project.


