Arriving at Hazelton it will be taken off the railway tracks and will be driven by highway east.

It is the first time that such a "stunt" has ever been attempted through Prince Rupert and will, undoubtedly, attract a lot of attention to this port.

As a result of the efforts of S. C. Thompson of this city, the Bulkley Valley will be represented in the shipment, arrangements having been made to load on the truck a sack of potatoes from the farm of Mrs. A. Murray at Doughty.



## Prince George Is Making Eleven Hundredth Voyage

Here today on the way from Vancouver to Stewart, the veteran and ever popular coast liner Prince George of Canadian National Steamships is making her eleven hundredth voyage since having been commissioned in service late in 1910. During her long career, the Prince George has covered 1,500,000 nautical miles which amounts to approximately sixty times around the world by sea by way of Panama and Suez Canals. In spite of her lengthy service, the Prince George seems to be just as good a boat as the day she was built.

\* It is interesting to note that Capt. H. E. Nedden, commodore skipper of the Canadian National Steamships fleet, came out from England with the Prince George when she arrived on this coast from her builders. He was third officer at the time. Had it not been for being held in Vancouver on account of Mrs. Nedden's illness, Captain Nedden would have been here as skipper of the Prince George today. As it is, Capt. While to some extent business activity throughout the country has recovered, no one can say that recovery is complete because the building trades are still somewnat in the doldrums. The forward movement is not without its setbacks. We all looked for a good autumn in 1937 terrupted by setbacks. Various factors have affected the condition of business on this continent and to some extent throughout the world. The unsettled international sitsituation, which seems to be more or less uncertain. Taken all in all, however, we are making progress.

### THE SPIRIT OF THE TIMES

The spirit of the times seems to be toward greater honesty, higher standards of business morality and greater human sympathy and tolerance. Many people seem to doubt this because they read of the uncovering of scandals of various kinds and at election times they are often hearing of charges made by members of one political party against another. Also there are many rash speeches made in regard to the immorality of business by those who object to business on any basis. Most of these are based on lack of correct information.

The spirit of the times makes it possible to uncover cases of graft and dishonesty. This is a step in the right direction. Once we get to a point where the general public refuses to condone offences we are well on the road to better administration of public affairs. The average person is opposed to graft. A few are opposed to graft unless they themselves are able to share in the booty. The public conscience is happily strongly in the direction of betterment and greater human justice. This is in accord with the spirit of the times.

### ALL-ROUND EDUCATION




