# Invaders Are Encircling Shanghai

## Deficit Now Converted Into Surplus

### Financial Position Of Canada Shows Big Improvement

Turnover of \$100,000,000 Increases Hopes That Finance Minister Dunning May Be Able to Show Balanced Budget

OTTAWA, Nov. 6: (CP)—The Canadian government has a surplus of \$33,372,600 for the first seven months of the present fiscal year, it was reported today by Watson Sellar, Comptroller of the Treasury. From April 1 to October 31 receipts totalled \$319,757,177 and disbursements \$286,384,577. At the same time last year Finance Minister Charles A. Dunning faced a deficit of \$64,003,380. The difference this year represents a turnover of \$100,000,000 and increases of treasury officials that a balanced budget may be reported at the end of the fiscal year next March.

### Explains His Plans

Homey General Wismer Tells Legislature How He Intends To Amend Securities Act

VICTORIA, Nov. 6: (CP)—Proposed amendments to the Securities Act, which Attorney General Gordon Wismer outlined to the Legislature prior to their presentation, would make companies and executives liable to offence if they make false statements and if they fail to disclose to the government any material fact about their operations, would void contracts between brokers and customers if the customers signed an unreasonable blanket agreement, would stop advertising for capital with promise of employment, would permit the government to publish corrections of any misleading information distributed by any company providing use of the name of the officers of any company about which the promotional matter appears in the newspaper, and would call for the registration of investment counsel as brokers.

### Radio Equipment For Search Ship

W. R. Wilson, Wilkins' Chief Radio Operator, in Winnipeg From Toronto

WINNIPEG, Nov. 6: (CP)—W. R. Wilson, chief radio operator of the Wilkins expedition to the Arctic regions to search for the missing Russian transpolar fliers, arrived here yesterday from Toronto to install special equipment in the Wilkins plane which is in Winnipeg on its way north from New York.

### BRITAIN IS LOOKING UP

Uneasiness About War Not Very General—On the Other Hand, Confidence Widespread

### Hungerford Home

Re-Armament Not Principal Factor in Prosperity—Intense Interest In Canada

MONTREAL, Nov. 6: — "Of the scores of industrial leaders and other prominent men I saw in Great Britain and in the several European countries I was able to visit, I met only two who expressed any uneasiness at the prospect of a war," S. J. Hungerford, chairman and president of the Canadian National Railways and president of the Trans-Canada Airlines, said in an interview yesterday on his return to Montreal after six weeks abroad. Accompanied by M. A. Metcalf, assistant to the president, Mr. Hungerford left New York on the Queen Mary September 22 and sailed from Southampton on the Empress of Britain October 30 on his return to Canada.

On the contrary, Mr. Hungerford said, he found widespread confidence in the future and immense business activity. "This was particularly noticeable in Britain," he remarked. "If there is any fear of war it is not interfering with business nor with the normal lives of the people."

In answer to a question, Mr. Hungerford said he was assured that the British re-armament program was only a minor factor in the rapidly increasing business prosperity. Business was on a decided upward trend before this development. Particularly impressive was the changing aspect to the country due to housing improvements and he said: "I was told on good authority that one of the chief factors, if not the most important, in the great improvement in British business is this extensive building of dwellings for people. Enormous modern residential flats are going up all over London for example."

Much Shipbuilding  
Mr. Hungerford was also impressed, he said, with the amount of shipbuilding that was proceeding in Britain and with the developments in the four great railways. As faster trains were put into service, a great deal of fine new passenger equipment was being built.

"Throughout Great Britain I found the most intensive interest in Canada," the railway president continued, "and I received assurances of the greatest confidence in the future of the Dominion. The formation of the Trans-Canada Airlines has attracted wide attention."

It was his impression, Mr. Hungerford told the press, that the inauguration of trans-Atlantic mail service would not be long delayed. Air authorities in Britain were apparently well satisfied with the test.

### Anti-Communist Pact Signed Today In Rome By Germany, Italy and Japan, Announced

ROME, Nov. 6: (CP)—Representatives of Japan, Germany and Italy today signed an anti-communism pact here. Count Galeazzo Ciano, Italian foreign minister; Joachim von Ribbentrop, German ambassador to London, and Masaaki Hotta, Japanese ambassador to Rome, signed on behalf of their respective governments. An official communique said: This morning a protocol has been signed by which Italy enters into an agreement against the Communist Internationale as already agreed upon by Germany and Japan on November 25, 1936.

It had been believed in official quarters here that Premier Benito Mussolini might withhold Italy's signature from an anti-Communist pact between Japan, Germany and Italy until the Brussels nine-power treaty conference on the Sino-Japanese conflict but this did not turn out to be the case.

**FORBES-ROBERTSON DIES**  
LONDON—Sir Johnston Forbes-Robertson, for a generation one of the greatest figures on the British stage, died today at his home at St. Margaret's Bay near Dover. The actor was 84 years of age.

**EYSTON SPEEDIER STILL**  
BONNEVILLE SALT FLATS, Utah—Capt. George Eyston, British auto racer, sped his ponderous "Thunderbolt" through a measured mile at approximately 310 miles per hour today but mechanical trouble one more broke up his assault on the world's land speed record of 301 miles per hour.

**END OF STRIKE**  
DRUMHELLER, Alberta—Striking miners here voted unanimously yesterday to open negotiations with employers with a view to re-opening four local collieries following a two-day strike of six hundred miners in demand for higher wages and improved timber conditions in the mines. It is possible the four mines closed by the strike may re-open Monday.

**BUDGET ON WEDNESDAY**  
VICTORIA—The session of the Legislature, on rising for the day yesterday afternoon, was declared adjourned until Monday. The budget may be introduced next Wednesday by Hon. John Hart, minister of finance.

**LIBERAL IN FIELD**  
VICTORIA—Robert W. Mayhew, prominent Victoria industrialist, was yesterday nominated Liberal candidate to contest Victoria in the forthcoming federal by-election to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Dr. S. F. Tolmie. Prof. J. King Gordon is already in the field as C.C.F. candidate. There has been no Conservative nomination as yet.

### WILL ASK VANCOUVER FOR HELP

Local Chamber of Commerce Passes Resolution at Dinner Meeting Last Evening

The Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce, at its dinner meeting last night, decided to request the Vancouver Board of Trade to help the building up of the northern part of the province by supporting the local Chamber in its efforts to connect with the main line of the Canadian National Railways at some suitable point so that the grain from the Peace might reach tidewater by the most direct and economical route to an established port and that the mining and other natural resources of Northern British Columbia be best served.

The vote stood fifteen for the resolution and five against, with a number of members not voting. The resolution had been before the previous meeting and had been referred back to the committee for redrafting. An effort was made to ridicule the idea of asking help from Vancouver in this respect and considerable discussion took place in regard to it, the vote finally taken being as shown.

### Soldiers Slain In Jerusalem

JERUSALEM, Nov. 6: (CP)—Two British soldiers, Thomas Hutchinson and Albert Milton, were shot dead by snipers from ambush yesterday. Three Arabs, believed to be now in hiding in the village of Siloh, are blamed. There have been other similar activities during the past day or so elsewhere in Palestine. As a result, the situation is becoming more tense again. The iron gates leading into Jerusalem have been closed and locked.

### TELLS OF CONVENTION

Vice-President of Chamber of Commerce Gives Report of Convention He Attended at Vancouver

### Was Eye-Opener

Sir Edward Beatty Expressed Great Interest in Prince Rupert When Seen by Delegate

F. A. MacCallum, vice-president of the Chamber of Commerce met Sir Edward Beatty K. C., President of the Canadian Pacific Railway when attending the annual gathering of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce at Vancouver recently. Sir Edward expressed great interest in Prince Rupert and remarked that they all had their eyes on the place and expected to see developments there in the near future. He also met a number of other prominent Canadians and all seemed to take a great interest in Prince Rupert.

Mr. MacCallum was the official delegate to the convention from the local chamber and he gave a report of what he saw and heard at the monthly dinner meeting of the organization last evening, J. J. Little presiding. There were about thirty present at the dinner and Mr. MacCallum's account of his visit in the south proved very interesting.

One of the features of the convention which impressed the local delegate was that the outstanding members were always anxious to hear from the smaller and outlying sections of the country. He urged that the local chamber express its views and, when occasion demanded, send in resolutions for the consideration of such bodies as the one he had attended. Suggestions were always heartily welcomed.

Mr. MacCallum was also impressed with the amount of work these outstanding men were willing to put in on these occasions. It seemed nothing for them to sit in on committees until midnight. Many people thought that conventions were just occasions for a holiday for the delegates but this was not the case with a great many. They did real work.

### Chief Plank

The chief plank of the convention this year was the effort to have more business in politics. Mr. MacCallum said. There should be an effort to elect men with business experience. Hon. R. C. Mathews asked that there should be better men in politics and that more attention should be given to young men. The question of population was an important one and this was dealt with by Senator J. W. deB. Farris and others. Senator Farris' speech was the outstanding event of the gathering. He was a splendid speaker and he had a definite message. Mr. Beatty read his speech. He always did that so that he would always have on file a record of what he said. Mr. Beatty was among those who impressed the need of immigration. He said that Canada could not expect to hold the country if it was not populated with the right kind of people.

Mr. MacCallum told of addresses by a number of other outstanding speakers which he heard and he said the gathering had been an eye-opener to him. It was a great thing to meet the big men who were really doing things in Canada. He thanked the local Chamber for giving him the opportunity of appointing him as delegate.

### JAPS ON ADVANCE IN CHINA

Further Successes Around Shanghai and in North—China Denies Hitler Suggestion

### Capital Falls

Walled City of Taiyuanfu in Shansi Province, A Military Stronghold, is Entered

SHANGHAI, Nov. 6: (CP)—Further successes have been scored by the Japanese in their military operations both around Shanghai and in North China. A surprise attack ousted Chinese from four more villages on Soochow Creek. Jap headquarters at Tientsin announced today that their forces had entered Taiyuanfu, capital of Shansi Province. This walled city has been one of the principal Chinese military strongholds in the north.

China's main defenses west of Shanghai were put in serious jeopardy today by the landing of a formidable Japanese force on the north shore of Hangchow Bay, foreign military experts declared. The Japanese said that large army units aimed at encircling Shanghai. A Japanese army spokesman said that a new unit had reached the south bank of Whangpoo River but did not disclose the exact location.

### Don't Want Hitler

BRUSSELS, Nov. 6: (CP)—The Chinese delegation to the nine-power conference yesterday unequivocally denied the report that their country had suggested Chancellor Adolf Hitler as a mediator in the Sino-Japanese conference. The report, the Chinese suggested, had been designed deliberately to impede the work of the nine-power conference. China had in no way suggested Hitler as umpire and would certainly not accept him.

The draft of an invitation to Japan to peace conversations with China was passed upon by the subcommittee last night and was to be presented a plenary session of the conference today. If accepted, it will be forwarded to Tokyo whose reply will then be awaited before the conference takes any more steps.

### Counsel Of Dominion In References

OTTAWA, Nov. 6: (CP)—Hon. Ernest Lapointe, minister of justice, yesterday announced appointment of Arne Geoffrion K.C. of Montreal as chief counsel for the Dominion government to the Supreme Court of Canada in connection with the reference on three Alberta bills assent of which is being withheld as well as on the question of federal disallowance powers. J. Boyd McBride K.C. of Edmonton will be associate counsel.

### Minority Rights In Germany And Poland Agreed

BERLIN, Nov. 6: (CP)—Announcement was made simultaneously in Berlin and Warsaw yesterday of an agreement whereby minority rights of Poles in Germany and Germans in Poland will be guaranteed.

### OUR PRINCIPLES

When you find a person or group talking a great deal about their principles, you may be quite sure that they are ready to change those principles once their personal interests are affected. The people who have strongly defined principles and are ready to stick to them through thick or thin are people who never talk about them if they can help it.

### WORKS BOTH WAYS

Among the first peoples to realize the value of radio propaganda were the dictators of various European countries. They were on the air a great deal telling the countries of the world about their particular countries and the evils of the systems to which they were opposed. Then came the natural reaction. Other countries took it up and began to tell the people of the dictator countries some truths and told them in their own language in such a way that the dictators became fearful of the effect. Now there is a tendency for the nations to get together in the matter of radio propaganda and prevent any broadcasts which might be objectionable to neighbors.

### PEACE ADVOCATES

There are in the world today a lot of peace advocates who talk a great deal but who are the first to advocate war in defense of their system of peace. In Canada there is an effort made to prevent Canada having a voice in world affairs because it may be dangerous to peace.

We wonder how the peace at any price movement appeals to China just now or even to Spain. If Canada is attacked, will she be so keen as she is today to preserve world peace at any price?

Let it be granted that most of the world wants peace and that there may be efforts made occasionally by argument concerns to develop a war spirit. Even granting this, it does not mean that all defensive efforts are wrong and that the making of guns and battleships by peaceful nations is an act liable to lead to war.

It is part of the ethical education of the Chinese people that war is wrong and that peace is greatly to be desired, just as our understanding of the Christian religion is that it is opposed to war. That does not prevent attacks by handi countries.

If Canada is to do her duty to the world, she must be in a position to make her influence felt. She must also be able and ready to defend herself in case of attack. Hideous as is war, it is more hideous to have to be bullied by stronger and unscrupulous nations.

### CATERING TO PEOPLE'S NEEDS

During the past week we have published a number of small advertisements offering used goods for sale. Some of these have not been sold because nobody wanted them or did not want them at the price offered. Other articles have been eagerly grabbed by buyers who were looking for just that sort of thing. All depends upon the needs of the public at the time. As a rule there is not much demand for articles such as radios and washing machines which are sold on very easy terms. People seem to prefer new ones unless they get the used articles at ridiculously low prices. Used furniture can usually be sold. And yet there are sometimes buyers for used radios or other used machines if the advertisement appears just at the opportune time. We have known baby buggies offered and not a reply received to the advertisement. Two weeks later the same advertisement brought several buyers. Evidently most readers of the paper read the classified advertisements.

## Synopsis of Land Act

VACANT, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by any subject over 18 years of age, and British subjects, by declaration of intention to acquire, conditional upon residence, occupation and improvement.

Full information concerning Pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land" copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands and Surveys, Bureau of Provincial Information, Victoria, or the Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering land suitable for agricultural purposes within reasonable distance of road, school and marketing facilities and which will be further developed. The carrying over 3000 feet per acre east of Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre west of that range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner at the Land Recording Division in which the land applied for is situated, or to the forms obtained from the Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for one year and improvement made in each year. The minimum price of the land is \$10 per acre, including clearing and grubbing. Further information is given in Bulletin No. 15, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Land."

As a partial relief measure, vacant lands may be acquired by purchase in equal instalments with the first payment suspended for two years, provided the land is improved during the first two years of the term. The balance of the purchase price is payable in 10% of the purchase price.

Mill, factory or industrial use on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the section including payment of stumpage.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 100 acres, may be leased as homesteads and title upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtained after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 400 acres may be leased by one person or a company. Under the Grazing Act, the Province is divided into grazing districts and a range administered under grazing regulations suspended from time to time to meet varying conditions. Annual grazing permits are issued based on certain quality rules per head of stock. From grazing permits, stock-owners may form associations for range management and partially free permits available for stock campers and travellers, up to 500 head.

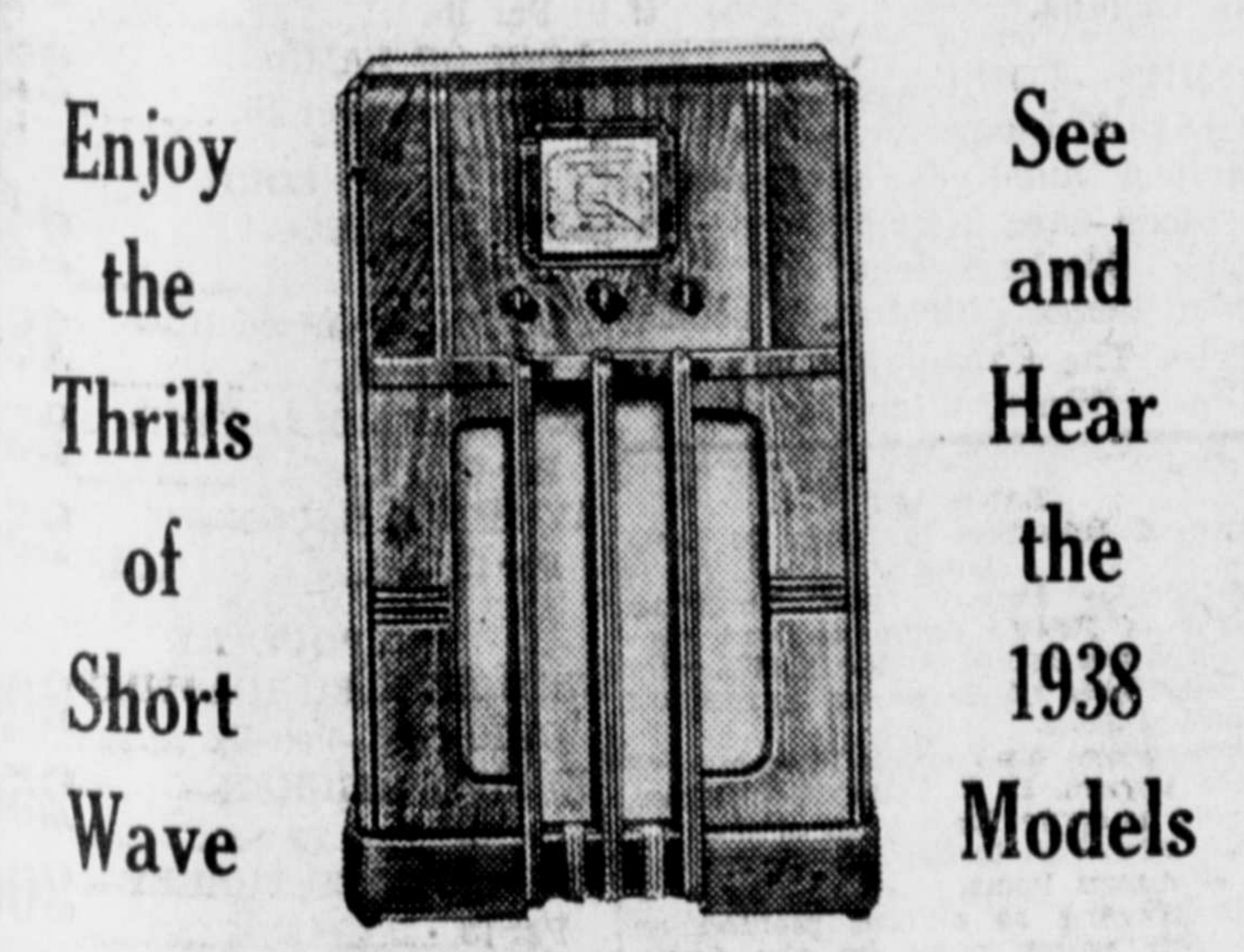

flights conducted this past summer. As in the case of the Trans-Canada, mails would be flown before passengers.

In answer to a question regarding British emigration to Canada, Mr. Hungerford said he had made it clear, in expressing his personal view, that there was no likelihood of regulations being relaxed until Canadian business improved sufficiently to make immigration desirable. Then it would have to be highly selective. This attitude had been well understood he felt. In the meantime, with business so much improved, there was not the same disposition to emigrate. It was true, however, that certain areas and industries were still depressed. The question was one for the future.

**Waterfront Whiffs**

Canned Salmon Pack Holds Up Well With This District Principal Producer—Fifteen at Navigation School—Masset Boat Salvaged

The total salmon pack for all districts on this coast this year, according to official figures so far available, is 1,461,228 cases as compared with 1,804,181 cases in 1936, 1,484,862 cases in 1935, 1,534,093 cases in 1934, 1,221,770 cases in 1933 and 1,040,977 cases in 1932. The total pack for the coast is made up of 574,609 cases pinks, 418,257 cases chums, 321,060 cases sockeye, 111,850 cases cohoes, 15,483 cases springs, 19,218 cases bluebacks and 751 cases steelheads. As usual, Prince Rupert district is the principal canned salmon producer.

**Pension Changes Are Agreed Upon**

But No Announcement of Conference Agreement Will Be Made Until Adopted by Government Concerned

OTTAWA, Nov. 6: (CP)—After a four day session, the Dominion-provincial conference on old age pensions came to a close yesterday. New regulations and amendments were agreed upon in the interests of uniformity and efficiency but these will not be announced until they have been approved by the governments concerned. It is understood that the clause necessitating five years' residence in the province where the pension is granted will be dropped and that children who are in a financial position to take care of their aged parents will be required to do so.

**WILL TEST MOTORISTS**

All Drivers in British Columbia To Be Required to Prove Their Ability

VICTORIA, Nov. 6: (CP)—The British Columbia government, it was announced in the Legislature yesterday, will present a bill at the present session empowering it to test the driving ability and traffic law knowledge of all B.C.'s 150,000 automobile drivers. A charge of \$1 each would be made for the tests.

Special robot machines will be used to test the physical capability and alertness of the drivers. These machines will be operated at Vancouver and Victoria. The robot machines, in which the motorists will be tested, will be set up in government examination stations.

In making the announcement Attorney General Gordon Wismer said it would take two years to test all the drivers. After that only persons applying for licences would have to submit to examinations. The first examination stations would be established in Vancouver and Victoria.
