LONDON, Nov. 17: (CP) - Sir Robert Hodgson, for eight years British minister to Albania, has been appointed Great Britain's first consul to insurgent Spain following the establishment of trade relation. General Francisco Franco has not yet designated his representa-

According to advices received iet Russia has accepted unreservedly a resolution for the granting of limited belligerent rights to civil war combatants in Spain following substantial withdrawal of foreign Junteers supporting the rebels. Russia's refusal to recognize these belligerent rights had been one of concerted and effective non-intervention in the civil war. The deadlock has now been broken.


