Unique Event Will be Arrival In Prince Rupert Harbor This Afternoon of Japanese Vessel

A sight unprecedented in Prince Rupert Harbor is promised about 4 o'clock this afternoon with the arrival of the Japanese training ship Kaiwo Maru direct from Tokyo, Japan, with fifty-three cadets and personnel of forty-three on board under command of Capt. Z. Hatano. The handsome sailing vessel, which, of course, will be under power of her diesel auxiliary engines on entering the harbor, will be accompanied into the harbor by some 150 salmon gill net boats from the Skeena River manned by Japanese. The fishing boats will accompany the Kaiwo Maru in from Kinahan Island.

The Kaiwo Maru arrived at noon today at Triple Island, there picking up her pilot, Capt. Dan Mc-Kinnon, who went out on the Algie this morning to meet her.

The Kaiwo Maru, which left Tokyo May 1, will be here until July 3 when she will sail on her return to Japan via Honolulu.

The visit of the Kaiwo Maru will be a unique event in local marine history.

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


