

There is to be a National Congress during the coming autumn, it is announced, but only those who support Stalin in his policies will be taking part in it. The political bureau of ten men, who are the most powerful in the country, see to it that any men who show the slightest tendency toward freedom of thought or expression are sifted out and replaced by younger and more conformable persons. It is stated by one writer that, since the last National Congress, half the members of the party have been removed. The group that is left is compared with the Fascist group in Italy or the Nazi group in Germany. It holds a political monopoly and no others have any rights in the country except the rights given them by the few members of the party. The huge number of expulsions from the party indicates how widespread is the Trotsky tendency there.




