Russia Is Recalling Its Envoys

Fascist Dictatorship Is Set Up In Brazil; Bloodless Coup In Rio

All Legislative Bodies Dissolved and Payments on Foreign Obligations Dissolved—Army and Politicians Behind Vargas But All Civilians Not in Accord

RIO DE JANEIRO, Nov. 12:—A virtual dictatorship has been set up in Brazil by President Getulio Vargas who has closed the national congress, state legislatures and municipal councils, decreeing a new and absolute constitution. The President is supported by army and many political leaders but there is considerable civilian opposition. Military commanders have been established as governors. A tight censorship has been imposed. It was a bloodless coup.
The new form of government in Brazil under which President Vargas has set himself up as dictator is modelled in many respects after the corporate system employed by totalitarian European nations.
President Vargas announces that pending reorganization of the country's economic system, payment of interest on foreign debts is suspended. In view of this the New York Stock Exchange on Thursday decided to suspend provisionally all transactions in Brazilian securities. Italian officials at Rome are reported to hail the change as "another nation going Fascist."

HELPING FARMERS

Agricultural Authority Would Increase Mineral and Timber Exports in Order to Make Better Domestic Market
OTTAWA, Nov. 12: (CP)—Dr. Latimer of Guelph Agricultural College told the federal Royal Commission on grain and grain marketing that Canada should depend more for her exports on minerals and forest products than on agricultural products. If more minerals and timber were exported, the domestic market for farm products would be effectively increased and better prices would be obtained for the producers. The necessity of lessening the cost of farm production was stressed by Dr. Latimer.

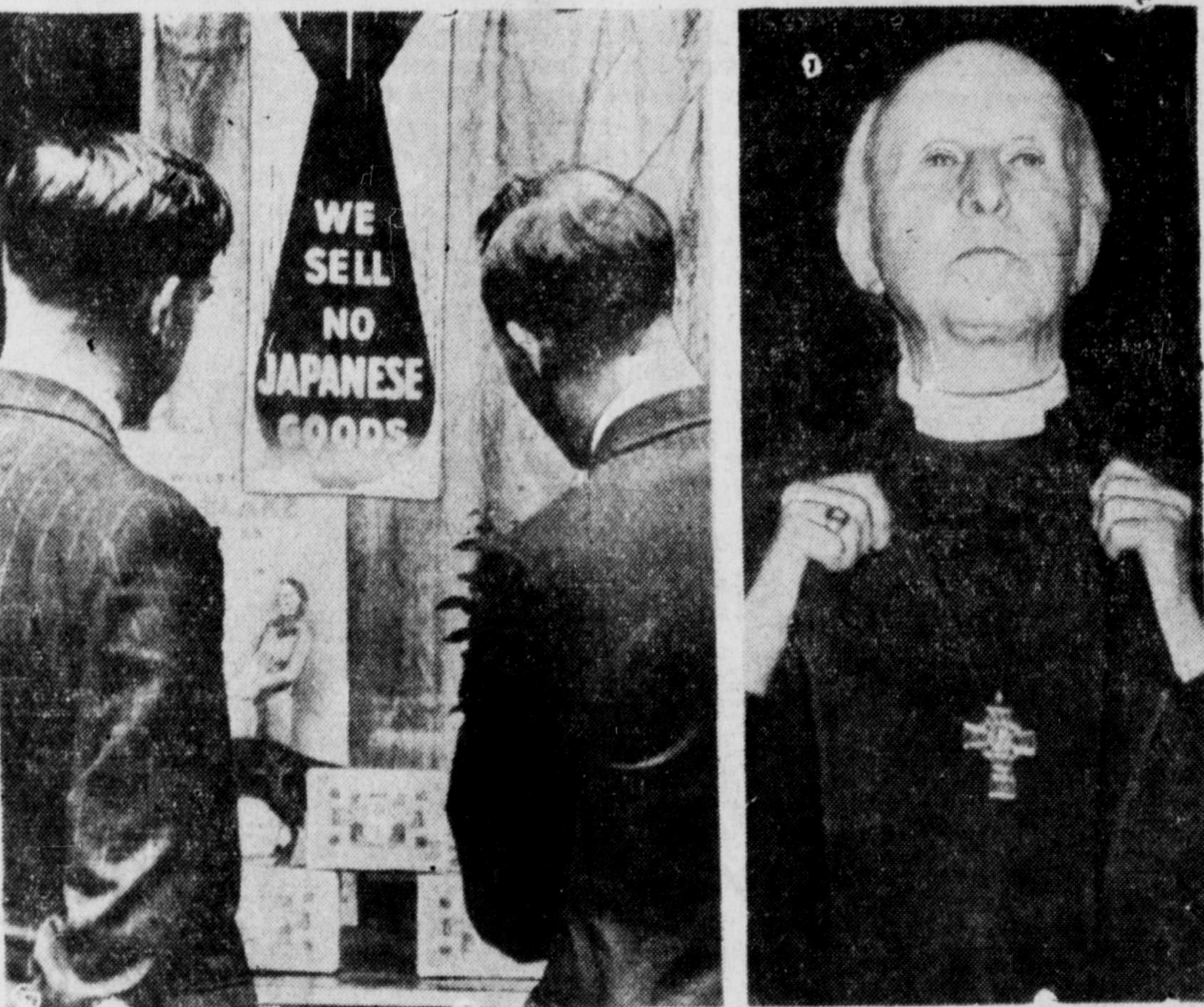
Martial Courts For Palestine

Will Have Authority to Impose Sentences of up to Death in Effort to Prevent Terrorism
JERUSALEM, Nov. 12: (CP)—Martial courts will commence functioning in Palestine next week in the effort to prevent rioting and terrorism. The courts will be clothed with authority to impose sentences up to death for acts of terrorism, carrying firearms and other offences.
Jerusalem is now under strict curfew law.

LONDON MERCHANTS USE "COMMERCIAL BOMBS" IN BOYCOTT



Brought to realize how easily London and other English cities could be bombed, following the merciless bombardment of Chinese cities by the Japanese invaders, Britishers, headed by labor leaders, have begun an unofficial boycott of all Japanese goods. Storekeepers in London, following public opinion, are pasting "commercial bombs" on their windows, as a protest against the mass murder of Chinese civilians as shown in the photograph at the left. Remembrance Day Observed In Prince Rupert With Fitting Ceremony And Large Turn-Out

Fine clear weather, if chilly, favored Prince Rupert's observance of Remembrance Day. On the nineteenth anniversary of the Armistice which brought the Great War to a close, there was a large turn-out to honor the memory of those who fell during the conflict in the service of their country. Never was there finer weather for an Armistice Day here and this permitted the full ceremony of Remembrance being conducted at the cenotaph. There was a parade from Third Avenue and Third Street, along Third Avenue, down Sixth Street and along Second to the stone at the Court House grounds. Ex-service persons, naval and militia units, Prince Rupert Boys' Band Sea Cadets, Boy Scouts, Canadian Legion Women's Auxiliary, Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire and members of other organizations participated in the parade. An impressive address by Bishop G. A. Rix was the feature of the service at the cenotaph. Wreaths were laid by various organizations. Thus Prince Rupert joined with the rest of Canada from Pacific to Atlantic and from international border to the Arctic Ocean, metropolis and hamlet alike, in honoring the memory of 60,000 soldiers from this Dominion who gave their lives in the conflict.

The parade of veterans was the largest since the cenotaph was established here. There were some seventy-five in the march with J. S. Wilson, secretary of the Canadian Legion, in charge. Having served overseas, Mrs. Alex McRae and Mrs. F. A. MacCallum, fell in at the head of the Legion members. Then came a detachment of the Royal Canadian Naval Reserve in charge of Lieut. Orme Stuart; detachment of the 102nd Battery, Royal Canadian Artillery, under Capt. A. G. Rix; Boys' Band, under Bandmaster Robert Greenfield; Sea Cadets, under Sub. Lieut. Joe Landry; Canadian Legion Women's Auxiliary; Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, and Loyal Order of Moose. The parade was in charge of

WOULD ASK AMENDMENT

London Would Have to Change B. N. A. Act Before Unemployment Insurance Could be Enacted
OTTAWA, Nov. 12: (CP)—The necessary agreement on the scheme of national unemployment insurance for Canada as proposed to the provinces by Premier William Lyon Mackenzie King is forthcoming, the federal government proposes to seek a constitutional amendment by joint resolution of the Dominion and provinces addressed to Parliament at Westminster.
The details of the new unemployment insurance plan as proposed by Premier King have not as yet been made public.

Ambassadors To Three Countries Under Fire, Two Being Arrested

Soviet Government's Purge of Suspected Enemies Within its Own Ranks Reaching Into Germany, Tokyo and Poland

MOSCOW, Nov. 12: (CP)—Soviet Russia's ambassadors to Germany, Tokyo and Poland were reported by diplomatic sources today to have been recalled and there were unconfirmed reports that two had been arrested. The same sources said that Rudolph Sommer, German consul general at Leningrad, had been recalled by the Berlin government at request of Moscow. Rumors are that Dr. Constantin Youreneff, envoy to Berlin, and Michael Karski, ambassador to Turkey, have been arrested, their names being linked with a government purge of suspected enemies within Soviet ranks.

AMONG HIS "AIN FOLK"

Ramsay MacDonald's Remains To Be Interred in Tiny Cemetery Alongside Moray Firth
LOSSIEMOUTH, Scotl'd, Nov. 12: (CP)—Rt. Hon. J. Ramsay MacDonald, thrice Prime Minister of Great Britain, who passed away peacefully at sea Tuesday night while on a trip towards South America which he had hoped might help him in regaining failing health, will be brought home to his beloved Lossiemouth and windswept Moray Firth where, in the tiny cemetery of Soynie Kirk, his remains will be laid beside those of his wife, Margaret, who he often said "guided and inspired me at all times." The body of the statesman will be buried among his "ain folk" by whom he was called "Jim" and not "Ramsay."
The former Premier's family yesterday declined an offer that he be buried in Westminster Abbey. The sub-dean of the Abbey, Canon Vernon Storr, said that the family had expressed appreciation of the Abbey authorities' offer but they felt they must refuse because it was wished that the burial take place in native Lossiemouth.
The body is to be taken off the ship Reina del Pacifico at Bermuda and returned to England.

BULLETINS

MEMBER TO JAIL
EDMONTON—Joseph H. Uwin, Social Credit member of the Alberta Legislature for Edson, was today sentenced to three months imprisonment with hard labor at the Edmonton Jail by Mr. Justice Ives in Alberta Supreme Court following conviction on a charge of delamatory libel.

SCENE AT WHITEHALL
LONDON—A man struggled through a naval guard surrounding King George Thursday at Whitehall and broke the solemn two minute armistice silence with a shout: "All this is hypocrisy. You're deliberately preparing for war." He was later identified as Stanley Storey who had escaped September 1 from Cane Hill asylum in Surrey. The King did not reveal a particle of emotion at the outbreak but women screamed.

WINDSOR IS SNUBBED
PARIS—The Duke of Windsor shunned the Armistice Day service in St. George's Anglican Church because his presence had been declared unwelcome. The rector, Rev. J. L. C. Dart, apologized publicly just before the service for the "insult" to a man who could not defend himself but the Duke refused to attend.

VANCOUVER TRAGEDY
VANCOUVER—Mrs. Rose Barratt, 28, and her eleven year old son were found dead in a gas-filled West End room early today. Five hours later the rooming house proprietor, believed to have been deeply affected by the other two deaths, was discovered unconscious near an open gas jet in his room. He is in a serious condition.

Still Stormy Around Nome

NOME, Nov. 12:—At Nome, which was visited by a devastating wind-storm Wednesday, a 45-mile gale continued yesterday. Buildings and dwellings on Front Street as well as a major portion of the waterfront were carried away by the mountainous seas sweeping on to the shore. Tractors were pressed into service to remove some of the buildings to higher ground. Several families have been rendered homeless but there have been no casualties, so far as reported to date, among the 1200 population of the historic far northern gold town.

BELIEVED KIDNAPPER

Arrest Made in Los Angeles of Man Who is Believed to Have Been in on New York Snatch
LOS ANGELES, Nov. 12:—James Sweeney alias Saunders was arrested in Los Angeles Wednesday night on a charge of theft. He is suspected of having been a member of a gang which kidnaped John J. O'Connell in New York four years ago. After being held for twenty-three days, O'Connell was released following the payment of \$45,000 ransom. Several men were arrested and sent to prison and Sweeney is believed to be the last member of the gang. He is said by police to have a criminal record involving penitentiary terms both in New York and New Jersey. Eight months ago he came to Los Angeles, professing to be an automobile dealer.

SHIP IS STRANDED

British Steamer Kenilworth Blown Ashore on Philippines in Typhoon—Impossible To Help Her
MANILA, Nov. 12: (CP)—The British steamer Kenilworth has been blown ashore on the north of Luzon Island in the Philippines by a typhoon. Rescue vessels have been standing by but, on account of the intensity of the storm, have been unable to render assistance to the stricken vessel which has an unknown number of passengers on board in addition to her crew. The Kenilworth is said to be in no immediate danger.
Five Philippine provinces were struck by the typhoon and many are known to be dead and injured. Wide areas of the country are under a depth of as much as two feet of water.

NEW YORK: (CP)—Rare silver was unchanged at 44 3/4 per fine ounce on the New York metal market today.

MAYOR OF EDMONTON

Ald. J. W. Fry Elected, Ending Three Year Incumbency of Joseph Clarke
EDMONTON, Nov. 12—Ald. J. W. Fry, who resigned from the city council to contest the mayoralty, was elected chief magistrate of Edmonton at the civic election on Wednesday, defeating Mayor Joseph A. Clarke, incumbent for the past three years. There was wintry weather for election day with the first heavy snowfall of the season on icy streets.

British Columbia Solons at New Westminster Today for Bridge Opening

THE HART BUDGET

Hon. John Hart, minister of finance in the Pattullo government, is getting nearer to the accomplishment of his purpose, that of making the government pay its way. So far it has been unable to do this but it is confidently expected that by next year the province will be "out of the hole" or very nearly out.

The present budget does not provide for unemployment relief although it is hinted that this may be paid out of increased revenue always provided that the revenue continues to increase. There is also a matter of twelve million dollars lacking in the sinking fund. This amount was not taken out this year or last but is an accumulated deficit in that department. Before we can be said to be once more on solid ground this sinking fund deficit must be replaced.

Mr. Hart is acknowledged to be a good financier. Much of the credit for the improved condition goes to him but it must be remembered that Mr. Pattullo is head of the government and he has the last word in all expenditures. For that reason the credit belongs at least as much to the Premier as to the minister of finance.

J. RAMSAY MACDONALD

Right Hon. J. Ramsay MacDonald died Tuesday closing a long and eventful life. It would be foolish to suggest that his death is a loss to the Empire because his work was finished and he was ready for the step forward.

Labor in Great Britain and to a certain extent in this country felt that Mr. MacDonald had deserted them, going over to the enemy when he joined the National Government now led by Right Hon. Neville Chamberlain. And yet we are ready to give the late Premier credit for believing that he felt he could be of more service to his country by heading a government consisting chiefly of Tories than by joining the rather feeble opposition, an opposition which was rather inclined to toy with the Communism which he abhorred.

Mr. MacDonald in his day was one of the world's big men.

AGAINST RETURN OF COLONIES

An interesting argument against the return of the African colonies to Germany is given in the "Mining World," published in London, England. It says:

"Vast tracts of territory in Africa—Dominion, Colonial, Protectorate and Mandated—are attached to the British Empire. In these territories there is peace and contentment. Naturally, here and there, disquiet is in evidence at times; but that does not alter the main proposition. Peace and contentment rule; otherwise prosperity could not continue. British Africa knows no huge armies; its protectors are splendid forces of mounted and other police, whose duties are mainly patrolling, and certainly not fighting. This kind of thing is likely to continue until a military power arrives upon the scene. Then, farewell to tranquillity! Guns, bombs, poison gas, and all other such horrors will be imported wholesale into Africa, with the result that, in self-defense, the existing governments will have to make similar provision, at colossal expense. It is not surprising, therefore, that any suggestion as to the surrender of the Mandates is viewed with alarm and dismay by British subjects in Africa. Oh! say the pacifists, but surely the incoming power would promise not to import war material. Alas! for promises; have these people forgotten the scrap of paper incident?"

WINTER IN SMITHERS Passes Away

SMITHERS, Nov. 12:—The arrival of snow and winter here on Saturday night and Sunday caught many week-end motorists out on Sunday without chains and caused more or less inconvenience and near accidents in many places.

On Sunday afternoon at one time there were four cars in the ditch on the Bulkley hill right in town and all in a huddle. The car skidded and turned completely round and headed up the hill, then slid backwards into a heavy truck that was stalled on the hill and pushed it into the ditch.
