## ABOLITION OF PATROL

France Puts Maintenance Of Non-Intervention in Spain Up to Britain

PARIS, July 10: (CP)-The French government today decided to abolish the international non-intervention control at the Franco-Spanish border as from next Tuesday providing Great Britain does not find a compromise non - intervention formula in the meantime. France would maintain the ban on arms shipments, however.

French officials will not tolerate control at their border while the Portuguese-Spanish border is unpatrolled, it is stated.


