LONDON, Sept. 20:—On the eve of the League of Nations at Geneva going into consideration of the Sino-Japanese conflict, there is a strong opinion in official quarters here that international mediation may bring an end to the war. Capt. Anthony Eden, British Foreign Secretary, is to address the League today. Moves are on foot to condemn Japan as the aggressor in China, to condemn the bombing of Chinese cities with their populations of defenceless civilians, to declare the Japanese naval blockade of China illegal and to provide for the shipment of international supplies to China.

After remaining in this state for five or six days they were packed into hogsheads. By the application of a powerful lever at the top of the hogshead, the oil was extracted and ran out the casks through holes made for the purpose. The pressing continued for about a fortnight. Free ! iners' Certificates Any person over the age of eighteen Joint Stock Company is entitled the Crown and its licensees (with specific reservations), for the purpose of prospect-ing for minerals, locating claims, and min-ing. The fee to an individual for a Free Miners' Certificate is \$5.00 for one year To a Joint Stock Company having a capital \$50.00: if capitalized beyond this the fee is \$100.00. The Free Miners' Certificares run from date of issue and expire on the 31st of May next ofter its date or some subsequent 31st of May. Certificates may be obtained for any part of . year terminating on 31st of May for a proportionately less fee. (Free Miners' Placer Mining Act.)

Mineral Claims Size: 51.65 acres.

Recording fee: \$2.50 per claim.
