CRUCIFYING SAVIOURS

It is not denied by us that saviours have been crucified but classifying Leon Trotsky as a savlour is, in my opinion, a little far-fetched.

On the eve of the revolution in the autumn of 1917 Trotsky arrived in Russia from the United States. He joined the Bolcheviks in July of the same year and, by virtue of his oratorial talents, he was utilized by the revolutionary leaders. Trotsky had a pet theory which he named "Parmanent Revolution." This theory advocated exporting revolution into foreign countries. This theory was entirely incompatible with Bolshevik tactics. 




