# Japanese Are Defiant Of Warning

## SEARCH IS ABANDONED

United States Coastguard Vessel Withdrawn from Hunt For Endeavour I.

NEWPORT, Rhode Island, Sept. 22.—The United States Coastguard abandoned the search for the British racing sloop Endeavour I. today for a week since she broke away from the vessel which was being towed 200 miles off Nantucket yesterday. Four coastguard patrol vessels were ordered in from the search yesterday. There is still a possibility that the Endeavour I. may be continuing across the Atlantic on her own sail.

## WILKINS IS SAFE

Arctic Explorer Back at Aklavik—Flares Suggest New Clue To Missing Russians

NEW YORK, Sept. 22: (CP)—Hubert Wilkins' plane, from which nothing had been heard since Sunday when it was attempting to reach Aklavik after another search flight into the Arctic Ocean for Sigismand Leaneffsky, missing transpolar flier, and five companions, was safely back at Aklavik and is waiting for clearing weather to return to New York by easy stages. Subject to conditions, he is expected to leave today via Fort Smith, Edmonton, and Regina, to return to Aklavik. Wilkins, operating the Arctic Explorer, had been dogged by weather. Viljamar Stefansson, president of the Explorers' Club, while he believed Wilkins might have landed on a small island, had started organizing emergency equipment that could be used on quickly for assistance. Wilkins' radio died out as he was returning to Aklavik under adverse weather conditions Sunday. The next word was when he reported himself safe at Aklavik. Herbert Hollick-Kenyon, noted Canadian aviator, is Wilkins' pilot.

## AIR ROUTE VIA COAST

Vancouver Gets Busy and Secures Co-operation of Other Cities

VANCOUVER, Sept. 22.—Representatives of Vancouver, Victoria, Seattle, Portland and Spokane, in conference here yesterday, agreed to co-operate towards having a Yukon air mail route by way of the coast established. The move was instituted by the Vancouver Board of Trade which fears that the Edmonton-Whitehorse route will take business away from Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, Sept. 22.—Capt. John Dalton, well known master mariner identified with the Cliff Towing Co., died in Vancouver yesterday.

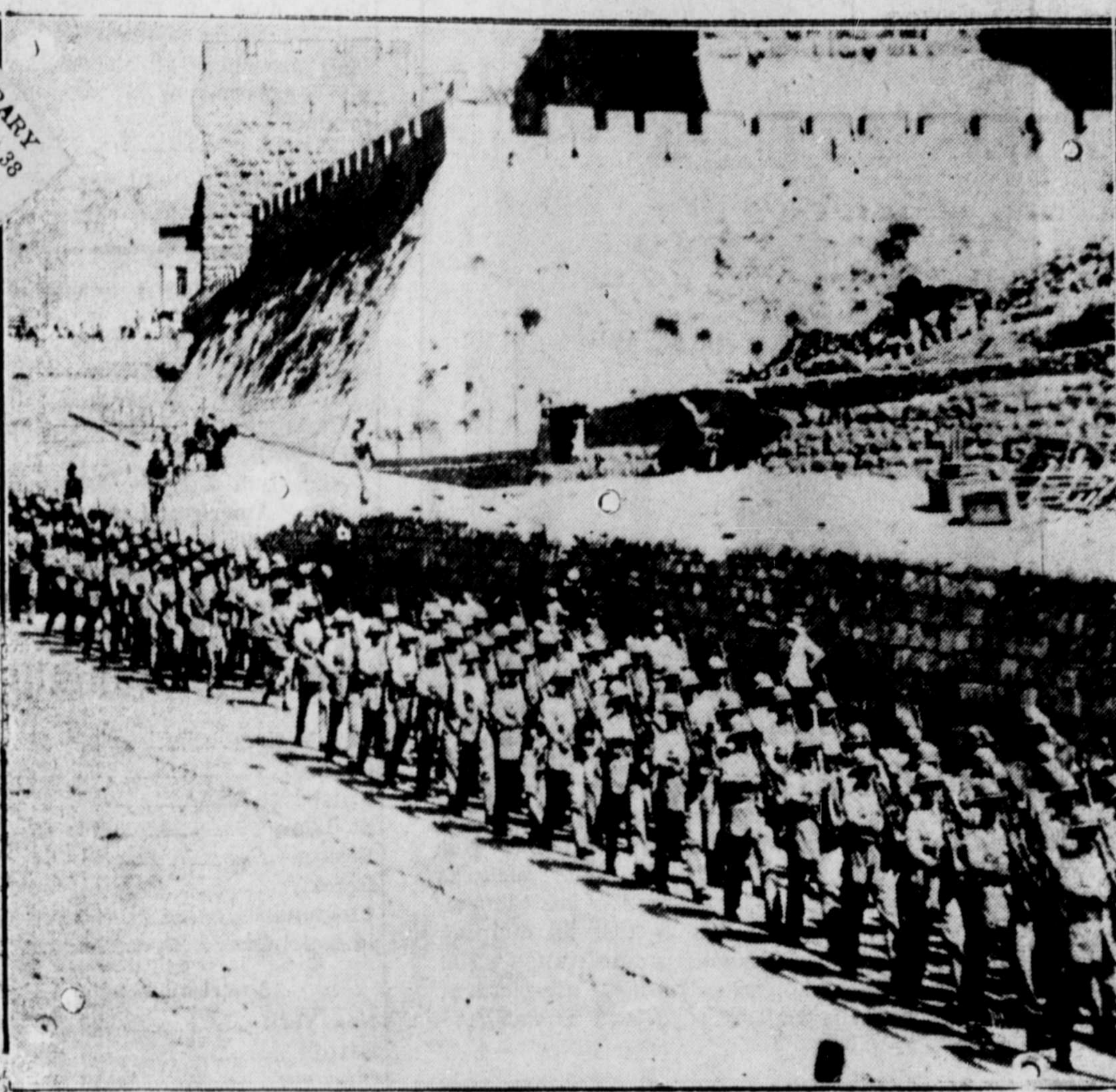
## Weather Forecast

## To Revise Agreement On Patrol

PARIS, Sept. 22.—A conference will be held here within a few days for the purpose of making arrangements to include Italy in the Mediterranean anti-piracy patrol. There will have to be some revision of the Nyon nine-power agreement. Italy has demanded equality with Great Britain and France in accepting the invitation to join the patrol. Russia may take exception to such equality being granted Italy.

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## HATFIELD CONVICTED

Notorious Reparations Cases Concluded Today With Defendant Found Guilty

OTTAWA, Sept. 22: (CP)—Capt. Freeman Hatfield, Nova Scotia skipper of the schooner Gypsum Queen, was found guilty by a Supreme Court jury today of defrauding the reparations commission of \$71,000. The jury recommended mercy.

Hatfield received reparations after the ship had allegedly foundered in a storm but he claimed it was torpedoed by Germans during the Great War.

## HINDRANCE TO MINING

Mr. deGanahl Impatient With Taxes and Duties Imposed

SMITHERS, Sept. 22:—Charles F. deGanahl, New York financier, who is operating a number of placer properties in the interior north of Fort St. James, was a visitor to Smithers on Sunday and Monday. He was accompanied by his son and his solicitor, T. W. Brown, of Prince Rupert.

Mr. deGanahl is employing a large amount of money and he cannot understand the psychology of a government that imposes heavy taxes on the machinery of production brought into the country to give employment and develop the natural resources. He feels that a hindrance is placed on the mining industry through the heavy duty on mining machinery that cannot be bought in Canada and has to be imported from the United States. Neither can he see the fairness of having to pay a freight rate on machinery landed at Vanderhoof that is computed on the mileage through to Prince Rupert and back to Vanderhoof.

While here Mr. deGanahl looked at Lake Kathlyn with a view to the possibility of using the lake for a landing place for airplanes, whenever necessary.

He returned to Fort St. James on Monday afternoon.

## Continue Bombing Of Nanking And Canton; Many Civilians Dead

Victims are Principally Aged and Decrepit Who Are Unable to Flee to Countryside for Safety—Explosives Rain on Inflammable Grass Huts

TOKYO, Sept. 22: (CP)—Japan today expressed regret for the wounding of the British ambassador to China in an aerial attack outside of Shanghai recently. British quarters said the note met the demands for an apology and assurance against repetition of such incidents.

NANKING, Sept. 22: (CP)—Less than forty-eight hours after Great Britain and United States had protested to the Japanese government against the unrestricted bombardment of Nanking, over fifty Japanese airplanes twice raided the city today, killing, wounding or burning to death over two hundred Chinese refugees. Those killed and injured were mostly those too feeble or helpless to join the exodus into the safety of the surrounding countryside. Dozens of incendiary bombs and high explosives fell into the straw huts of the Hsiakwan slum district. The huts burned like match boxes and many were trapped and burned to death. Despite the British and United States protests, the most densely populated civilian sections were attacked.

Meanwhile at Canton three hundred lives were feared lost today in a series of Japanese bombing raids. The fourth attack of the day and the sixth within twenty-four hours came at mid-afternoon. Eyewitnesses said that four of the attacking planes were brought down by Chinese planes or anti-aircraft guns.

## Miner Seriously Injured; Will Be Carried To Plane

EDMONTON, Sept. 22:—Seriously injured in one of the remote mining areas of Northern Alberta, Charles Gould is awaiting transportation to hospital here. Airplanes are unable to land near where Gould lies so it is now planned to put him in a plaster cast and have him carried by men working in relays to some lake where a plane may land and pick him up.

### VALUABLE TESTS BEING MADE

The war between Japan and China is giving to other powers some very interesting information as to the value of air forces in time of war. There had been lots of rumors as to the real value of airplanes and modern bombs in attacking and also in defense. It was said that London could be almost immediately wiped out by modern air armaments and that the defenses would prove quite futile.

Without trying to minimize the value of the airplane as a means of attack, it is being shown that they also have value as a means of defense. Britain is building airplanes as fast as they can be turned out. In a few months that country will be in a position to not only defend its own coasts but also to carry the war into any European enemy country. It is a terrible situation but it must be remembered that it works both ways. Any European country setting out to attack another must be prepared to receive blow for blow and the losses will be heavy on either side. There will be no such thing as digging in and holding ground indefinitely. Non-combatants are in as perilous a situation as those taking part in the war, possibly worse.

Doubtless, Britain is learning much from the successes and failures of the Japanese and will revise her defenses accordingly.

Those Canadians who feel that they should take no part in world affairs must by now realize that no country can live to itself under modern conditions. As has been said by journalists and others, we live in a land-hungry world and if we are not prepared to settle our own lands and prepare to defend them we shall soon find ourselves in a position where somebody will want them badly enough to wrest them from us and non-combatants will find it just as dangerous as those who are willing to take part in their defense.

### ECONOMISTS VIEWS

The views of the Royal Bank economist are often interesting. In the current issue of the monthly letter he sees hope for future world improvement in the rearming of Great Britain and the recovery in the United States, both of which means the increase of purchasing power. The increased debt, he says, is partly offset by the increase of the price of commodities. He also suggests that prosperity is a solvent that will improve human relationships. It will not only tend to do away with the present intense nationalism of so many countries but the antagonism between classes within countries will be softened. He says there are no fundamental factors in the present situation likely to bring about a decline in the demand for goods, a decline in profits or a decline in prices. The fear of deflation seems to have affected the world markets temporarily but he thinks this fear is not justified in a world where the need of goods is as great as it is today.

### Bernice Palmer says . . .

Prepared biscuit and pie crust mix are a boon to the busy housewife and today I am going to give you a biscuit mix that can be kept in the cooler for several weeks and used from time to time either as a topping for meat pie, biscuits or even muffins.

**Homemade Biscuit Mix**  
8 cups flour, 1/2 cup baking powder, 4 teaspoons salt, 1 1/2 cups lard.

Sift flour and measure. Sift again with the baking powder and salt. Cut in the lard until the mixture has a fine even crumb. Place in a closed container and keep in refrigerator, using as desired. This mixture will keep at least a month in the refrigerator. It will yield five batches with two cups of the mixture to the batch. It may be used for biscuits, dumplings, shortcake, waffles, muffins, quick coffee cake and dozens of other things.

**Minute Mix Muffins**  
2 cups homemade biscuit flour, 1/4 cup sugar, 1 egg, milk, 1/2 cup dates, nut meats, blueberries, or sliced raw cranberries.

Combine biscuit mixture and sugar. Put egg in measuring cup, and fill the cup with milk. Add to mixture. Stir until thoroughly combined but do not beat. Add to dates, nut meats or fruit as desired. Pour into muffin pans and bake in moderately hot oven (400 degrees F.) for about 26 minutes. Serves 6.

**Swedish Luncheon Ring**  
2 cups homemade biscuit mixture, 2 cups cooked meat, 1 table spoon onion, 1 pimiento chopped, 1 small green pepper chopped, salt and pepper, milk or broth, bacon.

Add enough milk to biscuit mixture to make a soft dough. Roll on a floured board to one fourth inch thickness. Spread with mixture of the meat, seasonings and enough broth or milk to moisten. Roll like a jelly roll. Form in ring. Place on cookie sheet. Cut diagonal slashes to center, place one-half slice bacon in each slash. Bake in moderately hot oven (375 degrees F) for 30 minutes. Serve with pimiento sauce. Serves 6-8.

**Pimiento Sauce**  
2 tablespoons flour, 2 table spoons butter, 1 cup milk, 2 or 3 pimientos, salt and pepper.

Blend the flour with the melted butter and gradually add the milk which has been warmed. Cook until thick, stirring constantly. Put the pimientos through a fine sieve and add to the sauce. Season. Reheat and serve very hot.

**Orange Date Dumplings**  
2 cups homemade biscuit mixture, melted butter, 1/2 cup chopped dates, 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind, 1 cup sugar, 1/2 to 1-3 cup milk, 1/2 cup orange juice, 2 teaspoons lemon juice, 1 teaspoon grated orange rind.

Add enough milk to home made biscuit mixture to make a soft dough for rolling. Roll out to one-fourth inch thickness. Brush with melted butter. Cover with dates and lemon rind. Roll up like jelly roll. Cut in 8 pieces. Place cut side down in a greased baking dish. Pour over the boiling syrup made by cooking all the other ingredients together. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees F) for about 30 minutes or until well browned. Serves 8.

**Cheese Biscuit Ring**  
Prepared biscuit mixture, milk, American cheese.

Add enough milk to some of the biscuit mixture to make it easy to handle. Roll in oblong sheet about 1/2 inch thick. Sprinkle very generously with grated American cheese. Carefully roll it up like a jelly roll and bring the two ends together to form a ring. Place on a baking pan. With sharp scissors, cut through the roll about two inches apart from the outside of the ring two-thirds of the way towards the center. Each of the sections is turned over so that the cut side is placed on the baking sheet, resembling a Swedish tea ring. Bake in a moderately hot oven (400 degrees F.) until done
