Post Office Tenders Are Called

Alber Acts Referred To Courts

Ottawa Is Taking No Direct Action; Decides To Receive Advice

Meantime Bills Regarding Banks, Credit Control and Press Will Not Operate in View of Withholding of Lieutenant Governor's Assent

OTTAWA, Nov. 3: (CP)—Three bills passed by the Alberta Legislature at its recent special session which Lieutenant Governor Bowen declined to sign instead referring them to the Governor General will be the subject of reference to the Supreme Court and possibly to the Privy Council to determine if they will become law, Rt. Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King, Canadian Prime Minister, announced last night. Meantime the acts, which deal with Alberta bank tax, control of credit and regulation of newspapers, are prevented from becoming law through reservation of assent by the Lieutenant Governor pending signification of the Governor General who is to be advised by the federal government which, in turn, will await the finding of the courts as to validity of these three measures as well as on the question of federal right to disallow provincial legislation with the Prime Minister, complying with the request of Premier William Aberhart of Alberta, announced recently would be referred to the Supreme Court. On this occasion, the Supreme Court is expected to depart from its usual custom and hear evidence.

PARLEY IS UNDER WAY

Nine-Power Conference Starts With Fourteen Nations Represented

BRUSSELS, Nov. 3: — With fourteen nations represented, the nine-power conference on the Sino-Japanese situation opened today. Japan and Germany are absent but are represented by Italy, Capt. Anthony Eden, Foreign Secretary, heads the British delegation; Norman Davis, the American; Foreign Minister Yvon Delbos, the French, and Foreign Commissar Maxim Litvinoff, the Russian. Another invitation is to be sent to Japan to attend. Latest reports from Shanghai are to the effect that Japan is continuing to force the fighting in that area. Japan claims that 10,000 of its troops have crossed Soochow Creek, China, on the contrary, claims only a handful have got across. Japan says the native quarter of Shanghai will be demilitarized in order to protect the international settlement.

WHICH WAY FOR ROAD

Junior Chamber Debates Hazelton Or Canneries—Rail Service To Be Asked

The old question of whether local agitation should continue to be pressed on the general objective of connecting up Prince Rupert with Hazelton and the transcontinental highway systems or whether pressure should be brought to bear on the more immediate construction of a road to connect the city with the Skeena River canneries came up at last night's meeting of the Junior Chamber of Commerce. G. P. Lyons was all for connecting up with the canneries but R. G. Vander Sluys felt that the general objective to the interior was much more important. Hugo Kraupner offered the suggestion that the railway company be requested to operate an electric car between the city and the canneries during the fishing season. This will be gone further into. Richmond Mortimer, in declining to accept the chairmanship of a committee on the question, expressed the opinion that there was already adequate transportation to the canneries.

At last night's regular monthly meeting of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, G. P. Lyons referred to the importance of knowledge in connection with financial and other affairs of the city. With the possibility that, before long, there might be a return to local government in place of the commissioner's office, this, he believed, was of timely import at present.

City Beautifying To Be Taken Up

Committee to be Appointed by Junior Chamber of Commerce

In a letter to the Junior Chamber of Commerce read at last night's monthly meeting, a suggestion was conveyed by H. F. Pullen that city beautification might be made one of the objectives of the year. If representations were made by such a body as the junior chamber, more action might be obtained in the development of civic, railway and government gardens. In discussion which followed, the view was expressed by some that maintenance and repair of city streets was an item of prime importance in city beautification to which more attention might be given. The importance of civic beautification in connection with tourist traffic was emphasized. The outcome was the decision to have the chair appoint a committee on civic beautification.

England Short On Shiny Days

Fine Weather Notable by Absence This Year in Old Land

HARPENDEN, Eng., Nov. 3: (CP)—Deficiency of sunshine was still the most prominent feature of the records, declared W. G. Cochran of the government experimental station discussing England's No. 1 topic of conversation—the weather. He produced statistics to show every month this year and 10 months of last year had experienced below-average sunshine periods. The number of hours of sunshine from May to September, he said, was 797 hours—or slightly more than five hours a day. This was one hour less than the normal average for the period. During the period, however, rainfall, while not markedly below normal, was concentrated in short heavy spells and interfered little with holiday pursuits. An example was the unusually full program of completed matches in the county cricket championship this summer.

TRADE IS DISCUSSED

R. M. Winslow Interesting Speaker Before Dinner Meeting of Junior Chamber of Commerce

B.C.'s Position

Panama Canal, Ocean Freight Rates and British Preference All Factors of Importance

An interesting address by R. M. Winslow assistant general manager of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., on trade matters affecting Canada generally and the province of British Columbia in particular was the feature of last night's regular monthly dinner meeting of the Junior Section of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce in the Knox Hotel. At the outset, Mr. Winslow referred to the fact that the province of British Columbia annually was paying \$75,000,000 in taxes \$26,000,000 this year to the province, a new high record revenue. \$35,000,000 to \$38,000,000 to the Dominion and \$16,000,000 to the municipalities. One might wonder how the province could stand the pace. The answer lay in the fact that British Columbia was engaged in extraction of natural resources at a rapid rate and disposing of them in the world's markets. No other part of Canada or the United States, with the possible exception of Alaska, exported such huge proportions of its products as did British Columbia. Only about one-quarter of British Columbia's production was marketed in Canada, seventy-five percent going abroad.

Mr. Winslow discussed factors that made it possible for British Columbia to export so extensively. One of these factors was the Panama Canal through which it was estimated half of the province's products in value passed on their way to market. The Panama Canal had, indeed, placed British Columbia on the world's ocean lanes. Two other important factors had operated to give British Columbia its remarkable position in export traffic. Oddly enough one of these arose out of the depression, namely the low ocean freight of the last few years as a result of which British Columbia had been able to increase exports of lumber, base metals, fish, paper and other products. These lower freight rates had given British Columbia entry to the European lumber markets. Another important factor in British Columbia trade had been the Empire preferences, the treaties with Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and Great Britain. British Columbia had been able, the speaker pointed out, to maintain high wage scales, low hours of work and good working conditions as well as pay heavy taxes and yet compete in the markets of the world with such countries as the Baltic States with their lower wages and poorer conditions.

British Columbia was, therefore vitally interested in such matters as world markets, transportation of goods to those markets and the transfer of money in payment for those goods. In passing, Mr. Winslow referred to the importance of practical defence of trade routes. This was a question about which there was no argument. In regard to overseas trade, Mr. Winslow referred to the changing situation in ocean freight rates. Due to the improvement in world trade, the transfer of Japanese

Bids For New Federal Structure Here To Be In Before November 23

Important News Arrives Today and is Welcomed—Plans Are on Exhibit at Post Office Now

Sealed tenders have been called by the Department of Public Works for the new federal building at Prince Rupert and plans and specifications for the building have been received at the Post Office here as well as by Olof Hanson M.P. The tenders are returnable at noon on November 23. Announcement that the tenders are being called comes as welcome news to the people of Prince Rupert who have been awaiting such announcement for some time. The site as previously announced, is on Third Avenue in the old Court House square. The appropriation for the building is \$150,000. With full basement it will be a two-storey building of permanent construction and is designed to accommodate local federal departments in addition to the post office. The plans disclose a structure of very attractive appearance in the latest architectural design. A clock tower surmounts the building. A broad stairway will lead to the main entrance of the Post Office on the ground floor on which will also be located the telegraph and Indian offices. On the top floor will be located the other federal offices. There is a time limit of eleven months for completion of the building after the contract has been awarded.

LAGUARDIA ELECTED
NEW YORK—Mayor Fiorella LaGuardia has been re-elected by a decisive majority as mayor of New York over his Democratic opponent, Joseph Mahoney. Latest returns this morning gave LaGuardia 1,344,012 votes and Mahoney 889,591. LaGuardia carried every one of his running mates with him in his victory, even the district attorneyship in which his associate won by a majority which stood this morning at 119,000. The rout of Tammany was complete and the Labor party showed amazing strength. Mayor LaGuardia received the personal congratulations of President Roosevelt. Off-year elections in fifteen states show no definite political trends. C. I. O.-backed candidates lost in Detroit and elsewhere.

TORONTO—Outboxed by Eddie Carroll of Ottawa, Gordon Wallace, former Canadian welterweight champion, lost a ten round decision last night. Billy Townsend of Nanaimo was knocked out in the ninth round by Sammy Luftspring.

FACT WITH REBELS
LONDON—England has about completed a trade agreement with insurgent Spain, it is reported. The agreement would be independent of diplomatic relations.

CIVIL WAR NEAR OVER

General Francisco Franco Declares That Insurgents Have Already Won
MADRID, Nov. 3: (CP)—General Francisco Franco, insurgent commander-in-chief, predicts an early end of the civil war. The war has already been won by the insurgents, he says, with the collapse of the government forces. Meantime the insurgents are preparing to blockade the entire eastern coast of Spain. The Spanish non-intervention committee is in session again with a plan to provide for evacuation by foreign volunteers from both sides.

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EDITORIAL

OUTSTANDING PERSONAGE

Rev. Dr. Charles W. Gordon, better known throughout the country as Ralph Connor, was a Presbyterian minister who preached for many years at Winnipeg to a congregation composed very largely of professors and students from Manitoba College. His sermons had an intellectual quality that distinguished them from the average. They gave the listener credit for a reasonable amount of common sense and brain power.

It was not from his preaching, however, that Dr. Gordon became known to the people of Canada but from his books. They were an interpretation of life in the communities in which the Presbyterian Church was a powerful factor. Usually they contained a description of a real red-blooded fight in which the hero was a man who was standing for certain principles in which the writer strongly believed. Also they dealt with many of the problems of the day with which young men and women of religious training are bound to wrestle in this changing world.

Dr. Gordon was a strong advocate of church union and he joined the United Church on its formation. His convictions were all for union but his life was Presbyterian and he never was quite the same after the change.

tonnage to the needs of war and other factors, lumber rates had doubled in the last year. Base metals and fisheries products would also be affected by this increase in rates.

Turning again to the British preferences, the first move towards which had been made in British Columbia years ago, Mr. Winslow declared that this province stood to lose or gain more than any other part of the Empire by changes. British Columbia's prosperity could best be safeguarded by development of Empire trade. A permanent trade policy with the United States could also contribute to a great extent to prosperity of this country but it was essential that the policy should be permanent and not subject to change at short notice which would leave trade suspended in mid-air.

At the conclusion of Mr. Winslow's address, there was a general discussion, a number of questions being asked. Hugo Kraupner inquired as to the possibility of development here of specialized fish products such as preserving of fish in cans in various ways. Mr. Winslow replied that, so far, British Columbia's fisheries products were handled on a large scale. Specialty products must be handled on a smaller scale and also involved technical problems. Industrially, British Columbia was still pioneering it. Doubtless, in time specialized products would be an important part of the British Columbia fisheries business.

Junior Chamber Movement Strong In This Province

The Junior Chamber of Commerce movement has caught on in British Columbia more generally than in any other part of Canada, according to figures read at a meeting of the local junior chamber last night from Don Morrell of Montreal, the secretary-treasurer of the Dominion body. There are thirty-four junior chambers in Canada with 4000 members. In British Columbia there are ten junior chambers with 950 members. This exceeds any other province in the Dominion, even Ontario and Quebec.

Mr. Morrell's communication to the local chamber referred to such national problems as civil service systems, taxation, French-English relationships, youth movement, transCanada highway, the drought situation and the Canadian flag which might be taken up by Junior chambers this year. A committee of the local chamber will be designated to follow these matters up. Mr. Morrell presented a report of the recent convention in Vancouver.

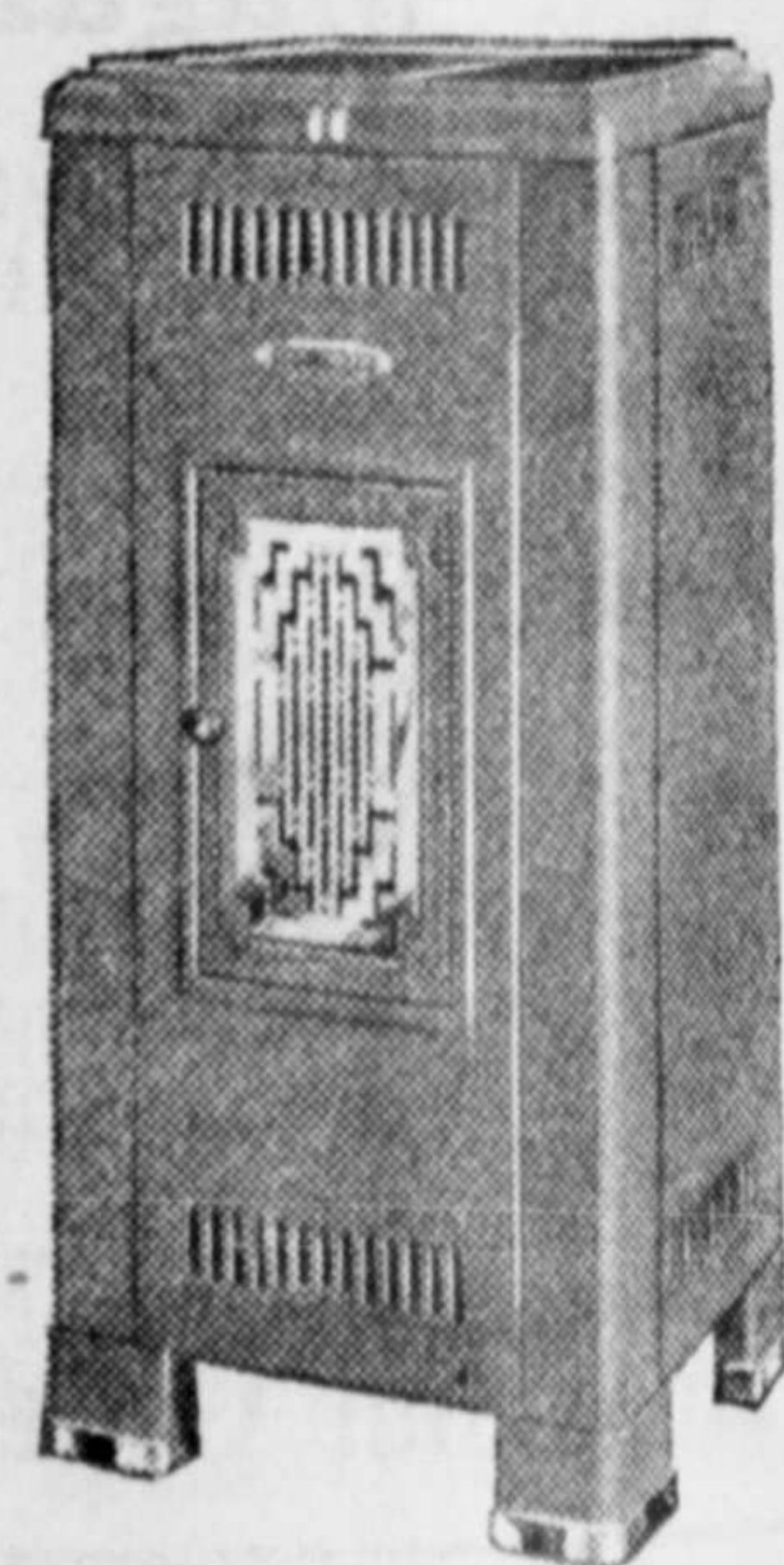
