Man v Canadians In Hospital Draw

Fish Too Have Their Problems, Says Scientist—Took Them Hundred Million Years To Swim

The problem of progression through the water which took the fish one hundred million years to solve is similar to the problem of progression through the air which has taken man only 35 years to solve, according to the National Fish Week address delivered at the Prince Rupert Rotary Club luncheon yesterday afternoon by Dr. Neal Carter on behalf of Dr. W. A. Riddell of the Prince Rupert Fisheries experimental station staff. Dr. Riddell was in the hospital and was unable to deliver the address himself.

OTTAWA, Oct. 22.—Secretary of State Cordell Hull of the United States was guests of honor at a dinner at Rideau Hall last night by Governor General and Lady Tweedsmuir. At noon Mr. Hull had luncheon with the United States minister to Canada.

Secretary of State and Mrs. Hull left last night for Toronto where today Mr. Hull gives an address at the University of Toronto.

Reciprocal trade treaty matters are reported to have been discussed with Canadian officials by Mr. Hull who is paying a three-day "courtesy visit" to Canada.

United States 200 Years Behind Times, Says British Author—Expects War in 1940

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 22.—H. G. Wells, noted British author, said yesterday that the United States was old-fashioned in its ideas and two hundred years behind the times. Wells said that President Roosevelt was an honest but not an outstanding man. The author predicted the outbreak of a world war in 1940.

PAYS VISIT TO HITLER

Duke and Duchess of Windsor See German Chancellor—Ambassador to Meet Them in States

BERLIN, Oct. 22.—The Duke and Duchess of Windsor paid a visit to Chancellor Adolf Hitler today in the course of their tour of Germany. Yesterday they visited one of the country's most important motor works.

King's Request
LONDON, Oct. 22.—King George is reported to have requested the Foreign Office to instruct the British ambassador to the United States to meet the Duke of Windsor officially on the occasion of his forthcoming visit to the United States.

Supporter Of Government In Africa Winner

CAPETOWN, South Africa, Oct. 22.—In a South African by-election, regarded as indicating the trend of political feeling in South Africa, a supporter of the Hertzog government, J. S. Wilkins, was elected over a Nationalist opponent. A general election is expected to take place next year.

GIJON IS OCCUPIED

Insurgents Take Over Loyalist Stronghold and Continue Advance Upon Asturias

GIJON, Oct. 22.—One quarter of General Francisco Franco's insurgent army occupied Gijon today with the remainder moving on to complete their conquest of the Asturian loyalists and the capture of control of the entire Bay of Biscay coast. The capture of Gijon was followed by the immediate release of 2000 political prisoners.

The long siege of Oviedo by the nationalists was reported last night to be crumbling.

British and French vessels have been co-operating in the evacuation of refugees from Gijon and other captured centres.

PREMIER IS HEARD IN HOUSE

Chamberlain Thinks Economic Action or Force in Sino-Japanese Conflict Would be Mistake

LONDON, Oct. 22. (CP)—Talk of economic action and force in the Sino-Japanese conflict was described as a mistake by Premier Neville Chamberlain in addressing the House of Commons yesterday. Great Britain would seek a peaceful solution at the forthcoming nine-power conference, the Prime Minister said.

Great Britain accepted Premier Mussolini's assurance that Italy had no intention of annexing Spanish territory, Premier Chamberlain said. The Prime Minister added that Great Britain had just been instrumental in evacuating 30,000 refugees from Gijon on the Bay of Biscay coast following its surrender to the insurgents.

Clement Atlee, British Labour leader, charged that Great Britain's weakness in failing to stand by the League of Nations had been the principal reason for Japan embarking upon its present campaign in China.

FOUR ARE DROWNED

Quadruple Tragedy This Afternoon at Pitt Lake Near Port Coquitlam

PORT COQUITLAM, October 22: (CP)—Four persons were drowned and two others were rescued this afternoon when a small boat overturned on Pitt Lake ten miles north of here. The drowned are Mansell Reese David Henderson, a three year old child and an unidentified man. Mrs. R. Hayes and her child were rescued by a nearby boat. All were from Port Coquitlam.

PATTULLO IS BACK

Premier in Vancouver Today Enroute to Victoria—Predicts Development in North

Vancouver, Oct. 22: (CP)—On his way back to Victoria after a trip to Ottawa and New York on public business, Premier T. D. Pattullo arrived here today and was met, among others, by Mayor G. C. Miller and Ex-Mayor G. G. McGeer M.P.

Last night in Calgary, Premier Pattullo predicted to newspapermen an era of industrial development in Northern British Columbia such as had not been known for years.

Aviatrix Makes Good Time From Australia West

KARACHI, India, Oct. 22.—Making good progress on her projected record-breaking solo flight from Australia to England, Jean Batten, Australian aviatrix, landed here last night from Rangoon Burma. The most hazardous part of the undertaking is now over.

JAPS BEING HELD BACK

Chinese Counter-Attacks Continue Effective—Reinforcements Landed near Shanghai

SHANGHAI, Oct. 22: (CP)—Chinese counter-attacks continue to prove very effective in fierce fighting on the coast immediately to the north of Shanghai. Shanghai was showered with shells yesterday as anti-aircraft guns continued to fight off bombing planes. The Japanese are reported to be landing heavy reinforcements five miles north of Shanghai for use on the Tajang front.

South African Trades Union Congress Asks for Co-operation From Government

CAPETOWN, South Africa, Oct. 22.—The South African Trades Union Congress yesterday approved of a boycott of Japanese goods and services and has asked the co-operation of the Hertzog government in connection with same.

Moving Men To New Camp Soon

Sixty Will be Taken from Okalla To Deroche and Placed at Work On Roads

VANCOUVER, Oct. 22: (CP)—Sixty men, the first to be removed from Okalla to the newly opened prison camp at Deroche, are about to leave, Warden Walter Owen states. These men, arrested at Vancouver for begging, will be put to work on the roads under police guard.

RELICS OF WAR FOUND

Four Hundred Shells Aboard Jap Ship at Singapore Believed From Emden

SINGAPORE, Oct. 22: (CP)—A Japanese ship calling here yesterday had on board four hundred six-inch shells which it had picked up in an island of the East Indies. It is believed they may have come originally from the German warship Emden which was operating in that vicinity during the early part of the Great War.

Woman Died From Shock

Further Particulars Received Of Recent Sudden Death of Mrs. Annie Sweder

Following the inquest, further particulars have been received of the sudden death at Woodpecker, near Prince George, on Wednesday of Mrs. Annie Sweder. It appears that deceased and her husband, who had been riding in a wagon, had gone into a small building on the roadside for shelter from the rain. Their team was tied up. Suddenly a runaway horse appeared and Sweder went out to see that his own horses did not become frightened and bolt. On his return, he found his wife dead. The jury found death due to excitement and shock owing to the runaway.

HAVING IDEAS

It is usually dangerous to have ideas about anything. Particularly this is true in public life. The men who are devoid of any pretence of original thought are often the ones who rule the world. It does not pay to be ahead of the multitude.

When a subject has been suggested and thoroughly explored by the advance guard of civilization, some man around town who has been elected to a school board or other public body suddenly realizes that the idea is a good one, seizes it as his own and popularizes it. Gradually from this point it seeps into the consciousness of the mass of people. The thinkers are too radical for the average person to follow. Changes usually take place slowly and new ideas must have time to permeate the average understanding.

WITHDRAWAL FROM SPAIN

The British government is making a big effort to have outside European powers withdraw from Spain and Italy has agreed to co-operate. That is a step in the right direction. Italy is one of the countries aiding the insurgents without officially taking part in the war. Germany is also aiding the insurgents and it is claimed by these countries that Russia and France are aiding the Spanish loyalists. There are also some British soldiers fighting in that country including a regiment of Canadians who are helping the loyalists defend their own country.

NEW WAR IDEAS

It is difficult these days to know when a country is at war and when it is not. Officially Japan is not yet at war with China. Russian troops are said to be aiding China but officially Russia is taking no part in the conflict. So in Spain several countries are involved yet there is no outside country at war with Spain. A few years ago if British soldiers or British citizens had been killed or attacked there would have had to be a quick apology or British warships would have been despatched to demand reparations. Today Britain is fearful of starting a world war which may have calamitous results, not only to Britain but to every other country involved. A world war today may lead to anything and probably it would be fatal to our present civilization.

REUNION OF 102ND

Affair Last Night in Knox Hotel—Reminiscences Prove Stirring To All

First of what it is planned shall be annual reunions of "originals" of the 102nd. Battalion, Canadian Expeditionary Force, was held last night in the Knox Hotel. It was an informal yet highly enjoyable affair for the "old boys" as well as a few guests, about twenty in all being present. The occasion was the twenty-first anniversary of the taking of Regina Trench on October 21, 1916. Incidentally it was capture of the trench was succinctly also Trafalgar Day.

D. C. Schubert was toastmaster and one of the principal speakers of the evening was Lieut. Col. S. D. Johnston M. C. V. D., officer commanding, 102nd. Heavy Battery, Northern British Columbians Royal Canadian Artillery, which unit perpetuates the old 102nd Battalion. Col. Johnston spoke on battery matters but possibly most interesting was the reading by him of excerpts from the official diary of the 102nd, around the time of Regina Trench. The record of the capture of the trench was succinctly as follows: "At 12:06 p.m. October 21 C. and B. Companies forming the first wave, and D. Company, forming the third and fourth waves, the battalion took Regina Trench." The recommendation by Col. J. W. Warden for the award of the Military Medal to Robert Edward Hudson, who was present at the reunion, was also read. Another part of the diary records the death in action at Regina Trench of Lieut. Adair C. Carr.

Major C. V. Evitt was also one of the speakers. Practically all present were heard in impromptu remarks. Reminiscences of war days were the burden of the most of the remarks.

Toasts included those to the King, the memory of Lord Nelson and departed comrades, the last mentioned being observed with the customary silence.

William Murray was a soloist and there was community singing with S. C. Thomson presiding at the piano.

The affair was in full swing from 7 p.m. until 11:30.

The "originals" present were: D. C. Schubert, Fred Hardy, James Parks, C. L. Youngman, R. M. Stewart (Masset), W. E. Denning, Ace Allen, R. E. Hudson, and J. W. Dunn.

Stay of Proceedings Now Seen as Possibility in Edmonton Libel Suits

EDMONTON, Oct. 22: (CP)—C. F. Powell, Major Douglas' Social Credit expert and technical advisor to the Alberta Government and J. H. Unwin, Social Credit M. L. A. for Edson, were yesterday committed for trial on four charges—seditious libel, defamatory libel, defamatory libel knowing it to be false and counselling murder. The charges arise out of publication and distribution of a pamphlet entitled "Bankers' Toadies" for the Social Credit Board allegedly containing libel.

With the preliminary hearing before Magistrate Gibson ended the possibility of a stay of proceedings is now mentioned. Such a stay could be ordered by the attorney General. A later Attorney General could order the trials to proceed.

The committal is to the session of the Supreme Court of Alberta opening there November 8. There is the alternative of speedy trial to that of facing a jury. Bail in the sum of \$20,000 each has been allowed.

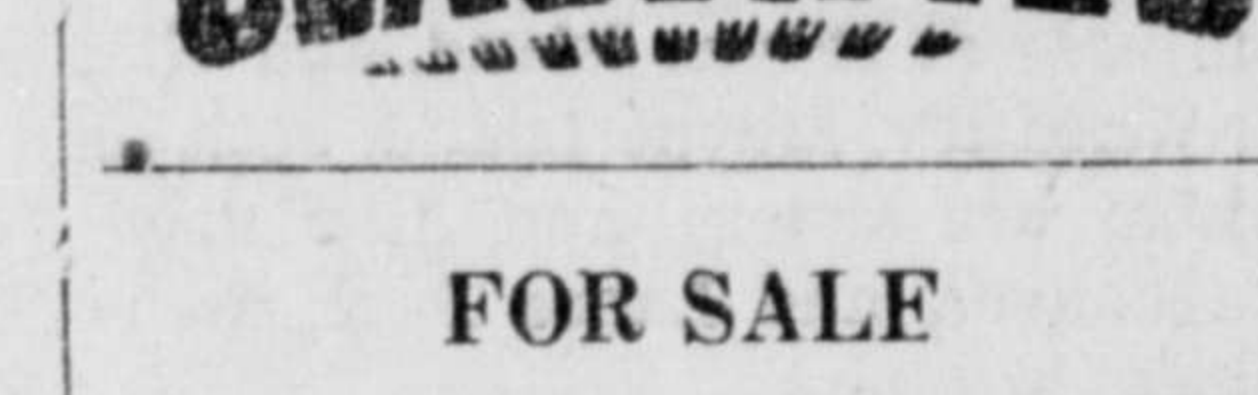

Obsequies for Late Mrs. M. A. Burbank on Monday from Roman Catholic Church

Burbank, D.S.O., divisional engineer, Canadian National Railways, Prince Rupert, who passed away at the end of last week. Many attended the mass and there were a great number of floral tributes. Final vessel of the Prince Rupert halibut fleet to be accounted for following the closing of the fishing season on October 19, the Sea Maid, Capt. Henry Doiron, arrived in port today with a catch of 11,000 pounds which she sold to the Royal Fish Co. at 7.6c and 6c. Landings of American boats are expected to continue into next week although it is not considered likely there will be many more at Prince Rupert.

The freighter Evelyn Berg, Capt. E. Hansen, arrived in port at 9 o'clock this morning from Ketchikan and, after discharging one carload of mild cured salmon in tiers for transshipment East over Canadian National Railways, sailed at noon in continuation of her voyage to Seattle.

C. P. R. steamer Princess Adelaide Capt. Henry Anderson, is due in port at 5:45 this afternoon from the south and will sail at 10 p.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

Delayed by extra calls on the way up the coast, Union steamer Cardena, Capt. John Boden, is due in port at 3:30 tomorrow morning from the south and will sail at 6 a.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

C. C. Kuchel, Australian scientific student, who has been given a two years' leave of absence to carry on research work for the Australian government in connection with the fisheries, will arrive in Prince Rupert at the week-end for a period of study at the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station which will extend until February when he will leave for Vancouver whence he will return to Australia. Mr. Kuchel has been for the past six or eight months at the Halifax Fisheries Experimental Station after having spent a year in the British Isles.

Four western halibut vessels sold catches from Area No. 3 totalling 156,000 pounds at Seattle yesterday as follows: Doric, 42,000 pounds, San Juan, 91c and 9c; Pacific, 40,000 pounds, 93c and 9c; Daily, 26,000 pounds, Whiz, 93c and 9c; Polaris, 48,000 pounds, Sebastian, 93c and 9c.

Two vessels sold halibut catches in Ketchikan yesterday at 9c and 8 1/2c. They were the Reliance, 34,000 pounds, and the North, 38,000 pounds.

Owing to cold storage space being taken up by heavy recent landings of halibut and sablefish, halibut vessels tying up for the winter at Seattle are finding difficulties in following their usual custom of stowing their gear in cold storage.

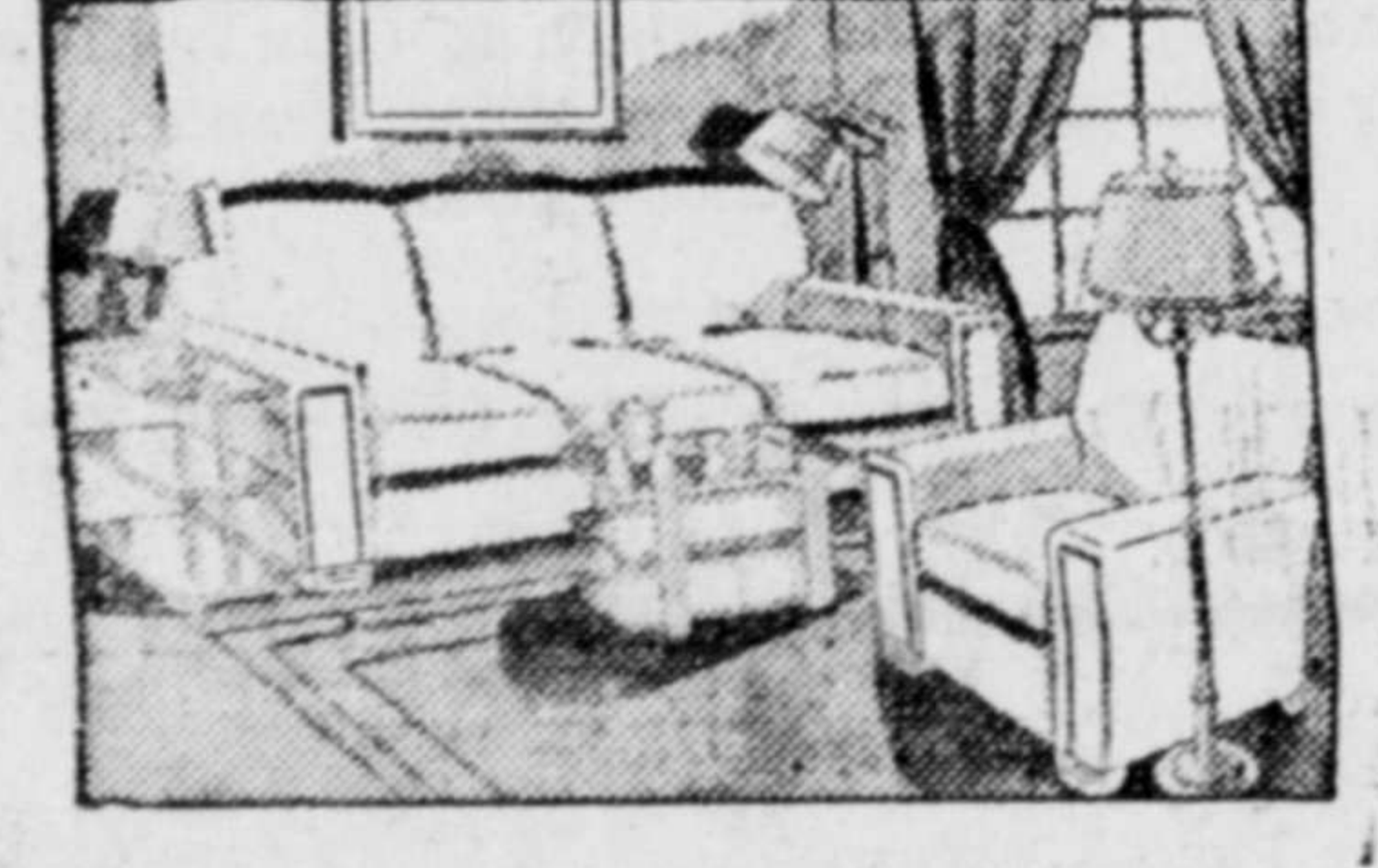
