### HON. SIMON FRASER TOLMIE

Most people read with regret yesterday of the death Canadian National Recreation Asat Victoria or the former Premier of British Columbia, sociation No. 2 for second place. Hon. Simon Fraser Tolmie.

Dr. Tolmie was one of those kindly souls who won club two games to one. High avmany friends. Until he went into politics he probably had not an enemy in the world and even then those who knew him were proud of his friendship. All his political opponents respected him.

Pre-eminently Dr. Tolmie was an agriculturist. He knew cattle and horses better than any man in the country. He was perfectly at home on the farm and delighted to show visitors his stock. Even after he entered political life he often retired for brief periods to enjoy the life of a

As minister of agriculture at Ottawa he was very successful and he was only induced to desert the federal field for the provincial maelstrom at the earnest solicitation of the members of the Conservative party with whom he had thrown in his lot. The depression came and the going was difficult for any and every government. The Premier did not always get good support from his cabinet and he gradually lost confidence of the electors, the party which he represented being almost wholly wiped out in the election of 1933 and he nimself defeated. He did not remain long in political idleness for two years later he was again sent to Ottawa to represent Victoria, a seat which he held at the time of his death.

Simon Fraser Tolmie was a good citizen, a useful member of Parliament, an excellent minister of agriculture but lacked the force necessary to hold his cabinet together as Provincial Premier and to carry out policies in which he believed. His going will be a distinct loss to British Columbia.
