Madrid Agen Shelled CHINA MAY By Insurgents In Spanish YET BECOME WAR SCENE Civil War and 15 killed Japanese Thought to be Preparing For New Major Drive to Consolidate Their Vollege

MADRID, July 23:-Twice shelled within twentyfour hours and with at least fifteen killed and a score injured by insurgent guns, Madrid was abruptly thrown back to the grimness of a bitter siege. Despatches from Santander, the Government Biscayan port, said the insurgent cruiser Almirante Cervera fired on the British ship MacGregor as it left Santander with refugees but ceased firing when the British Naval patrol approached.

WOLF FISH SPECIMEN

Rare Kind of Lancet Fish Brought o Experimental Station For Identification

There was brought to the Fisheries Experimental on the Catala the occasion of her recent call, a fine specimen of the Lancet fish sometimes known as "Subatka" or Wolf Fish but not the common wolf fish well known on this coast. Its scientific name is Alepissaurus Aescula-

Dr. Carter, superintendant of the station took charge of the fish and identified it. It was 41/2 feet long 21/2 inches in diameter and the pread of the jaws when open was

The Lancet fish is a large, swift, scaleless fish of the ocean depths, with a very high dorsal fin and the mouth filled with knife-like teeth, and it is recorded that it is occaslonally cast up by storms or driven to the shores by the torments of a parasite (Tetrarhynchus) found imbedded in the flesh.

On account of the body being so fragile, perfect specimens are rare. The dorsal fin is readily torn, the bones are very feebly ossified and the ligaments connecting the vertebrae are very loose and extensible so that the body can be consider-

The range of this particular spes is known to be from California to Alaska, in deep water. It has never been known to have been taken by a dredge or trawl, but has sometimes cast up by storms or else taken on deep-sea lines. It is one of the most ferocious of its class as can be proved by its dentition and the contents of its stom-
