KEEP OUT JAPANESE

Alaska Fishermen Appeal to Washington to Prevent Encroachment on Salmon Fisheries

Senator Alarmed

Washington Heads Plan to Resume Pacific Shelf For Americans and Canadians

SAN FRANCISCO, March 9: (CP)—San Francisco unit of the Alaska Fishermen's Union seeks aid from Washington to protect Alaska salmon resources from asserted threat of Japanese encroachment. The union passed unanimously a resolution asking United States Congress and President Franklin D. Roosevelt to take steps to prevent depletion of the supplies of fish either by foreign or American fishermen working in co-operation with foreign canners.

It was said that the Japanese government planned to send floating canneries to operate outside the three mile limit.

Senator Alarmed

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 8: (CP)—Senator Lewis B. Schwellenbach of Washington pictured in the United States Senate yesterday the threatened invasion of the North Pacific fishing grounds by Japanese, British and Norwegian ships. He contended that the future of the fishing industry of British Columbia, Alaska, California, Oregon and Washington was menaced. Schwellenbach gave warning that any invasion of fishing waters permitted and built up by international treaty would bring retaliation by American and Canadian fishermen.

The proposal that United States and Canada join in a declaration that the North Pacific continent should be their exclusive fishing grounds would run afoul of the international three-mile limit. Senator Schwellenbach admitted that he urged that it not be thrust aside without searching consideration.

Senator Schwellenbach told of the plan of British and Norwegian financial groups to send the steamship Thorland into the North Pacific where the United States and Canada have co-operated by treaty since 1924 to protect the halibut supply.

Vancouver Logger Is Dead in East

Frank O'Connor Succumbs at Mayo Clinic Where He Had Gone For Treatment

VANCOUVER, March 9:—Frank O'Connor, well known Vancouver logger, died yesterday at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota, where he had gone for treatment. His body will be taken by a brother to San Francisco for burial.

B.C. Population Put at 750,000

IS GIVEN NEW POST

Commander A. S. M. Nicholls Promoted in Service of Canadian National Steamships

MONTREAL, Que., March 9:—The appointment of Commander A. S. M. Nicholls as marine superintendent, Canadian National (West Indies) Steamships, with supervision over vessels of the Ontario Car Ferry Company and Canada Atlantic Transit Company, with headquarters at Montreal, was announced today by R. B. Teakle, general manager of the company. Commander Nicholls succeeds Capt. Robert A. Gouday who retires after many years of faithful service with the company.

Other changes in the staff include the appointment of M. F. Scott, formerly mechanical assistant, department of steamship and car ferries, Toronto, to the position of superintendent engineer of the above mentioned interests, with headquarters at Montreal. In this position he succeeds W. C. Jarvis, who is now transferred to Halifax as superintendent in charge of marine and engineering departments of the company.

Nicholls' Career

Commander A. S. M. Nicholls, O. B. E., R. D., R. N. R., was born in London, England in 1881. Passing out of the training ship Conway in 1898, he was appointed midshipman in the Royal Naval Reserve and served two years apprenticeship in the four-masted barque Clan Galbraith. In 1900 he joined the Head Line of Belfast and sailed as junior officer for nine years after which he completed his naval reserve training. He joined the Canadian Northern Steamships in October, 1910, and was appointed to the Royal George. Two years later he became chief officer of this ship and remained with her until the outbreak of war in 1914 when he was assigned by the Admiralty to service in the White Sea and later with the Grand Fleet and in the submarine service. In 1919 he joined the Canadian Government Merchant Marine as master of the Canadian Ranger in trans-Atlantic service.

In the following year he was appointed assistant marine superintendent at Liverpool and for the next ten years was marine superintendent at London, where he was made Commander, R. N. R. In 1930, Captain Nicholls was transferred to Vancouver, B.C., as marine superintendent of the Pacific Coast services of the company. In 1932 he went to Sydney, Australia, in a similar capacity with the C. G. M. M., then to Halifax, N.S., last September as marine superintendent of the Canadian National (West Indies) Services, from which post he has just been transferred to take his present appointment.

Word was received here today from L. W. Patmore K.C. in Vancouver that an agreement had been reached whereby Prince Rupert and Vancouver halibut fishing fleets come under the provincial marketing scheme. The necessary order-in-council will be passed before March 15. The board will consist of five members—two from Vancouver and two from Prince Rupert as well as a chairman from Prince Rupert. The personnel of the board has yet to be selected.

Big Automobile Companies Being Strike-Affected

FLINT, Mich., March 9: (CP)—In addition to the Chevrolet Motor Co. plant here, which has had three divisions of its plant closed by strikes, the Franklin Motor Corporation, all major units of which have been tied up, and the Hudson Motor Car Co. at Detroit, where there is a sit-down strike affecting five thousand employees and closing down several departments of the plant, the Chrysler Corporation also faces strike difficulties following its rejection of the demand that the United Automobile Workers of America be recognized as the sole bargaining agency for its sixty-seven thousand employees. The Fisher Body Corporation has agreed to arbitrate difficulties with its employees.

Hospital Situation Discussed By Commissioner W. J. Alder

The following statement was made last night by City Commissioner W. J. Alder in regard to the local hospital situation:

"I regret more than I can tell you that the Sisters of St. Ann have withdrawn their offer to build for this city a 75-bed, fireproof hospital, costing \$200,000. It is without doubt the most discouraging news that has been received in this city since I became commissioner. For over three and a half years I have striven to place the finances of this city in such a condition that capital investment might come in with confidence and the offer of the Sisters has been the first large capital investment to come to us with open hand.

AGREEMENT VIOLATED

Manchester Guardian Outspoken in Condemning Action of Italy in Sending Troops to Spain

LONDON, March 9: (CP)—The Manchester Guardian said today that ten thousand Italian troops landed in Spain on February 21 to join the insurgents in the civil war was in clear violation of the international agreement effective February 20 banning the dispatch of "volunteers" to either belligerent.

From Madrid General Jose Miaja, directing the Spanish government defence against the insurgent push from the northeast, declared today that three Italian prisoners captured in fighting, admitted that they were part of a whole Italian division engaged in the offensive. The prisoners said they were landed at Cadiz February 22, two days after twenty-seven nations, including Italy, had agreed to stop the flow of volunteers to the civil war. An Italian division normally consists of about 14,000 men but it may be more or less.

Meanwhile from Madrid it was reported that the insurgents had launched a sharp attack on Almadene, northeast of Madrid, apparently in the attempt to encircle the capital from another direction.

Today insurgent planes, backing up five thousand ground troops using modern equipment, bombed the lower part of Guadalajara Highway on Madrid's northeast.

Was Spanish Ship

The British ship supposed to have been bombed by Spanish insurgents in the Bay of Biscay now is believed to have been a Spanish vessel carrying airplanes from United States to the loyalist forces. The ship got away from the States just before the embargo deadline.

The Hospital Situation

The controversy over control of the local hospital may have had some undesirable features but it can at least be credited with arousing a greatly increased measure of interest in hospital matters. Incidentally, the membership of the Prince Rupert General Hospital Association now totals some seven hundred persons whereas before there were hardly fifty. At the membership fee of \$1, this means that the hospital got in an unexpected revenue of close to \$700.

It is to be expected that, now the Sisters of St. Ann have withdrawn their offer to build a new hospital here, the campaign to raise the funds required in connection with the local financing of a new hospital building will be resumed with a minimum of delay. Prior to the offer being made by the Sisters, it had been planned to call a meeting of representatives of various organizations to discuss ways and means of raising \$30,000.

The urgency of safer and more adequate hospital facilities being provided in Prince Rupert with a minimum of delay is even more accentuated by the report of the fire marshal's department on the condition of the present building. That report, to say the least of it, is an alarming document and would seem to imply a definite responsibility to see that the risks referred to therein are removed at as early a date as possible.

It is to be hoped that no further issues shall be raised to becloud the main and pressing problem of obtaining a new hospital for Prince Rupert in the very near future. Possibly, some one will come forward with a practicable and acceptable plan of making available the money required. Any plan that may be settled upon, it might as well be realized right now, will require the entire and undivided support of the community.

There has been some suggestion of a curtailment of the previous objective of a \$100,000 unit in addition to using a portion of the present building. Possibilities along that line were pretty well canvassed some time ago by the hospital board and it was considered were impracticable and would not meet the situation. Any curtailment of the \$100,000 plan would probably resolve itself down to nothing more than patching up the present obsolete and unsafe building and, in the long run, would probably be poor business.

In regard to the whole matter of a new hospital, it now appears to be pretty squarely up to the community locally. There is a lot of money yet to be raised. Every available avenue of financial support will have to be explored. And that with a minimum of delay.

Synopses of Mining Laws

MINERAL ACT
Free Miners' Certificates
Any person over the age of eighteen, and any Joint Stock Company is entitled to enter upon all waste lands of the Crown and upon any other lands whereon the minerals other than coal are reserved to the Crown and its licensees (with specific reservations, for the purpose of prospecting for minerals, locating claims, and mining. The fee to an individual for a Free Miners' Certificate is \$2.50 for one year, and to a Joint Stock Company having a capital of \$100,000.00 or less the fee for a year is \$50.00; if capital exceeds this the fee is \$100.00. The Free Miners' Certificates run from date of issue and expire on the 31st of May next after its date or some subsequent 31st of May. Certificates may be obtained for any part of a year, terminating on 31st of May, at a proportionately less fee. (Free Miners' Certificates are also applicable to the Placer Mining Act.)

Mineral Claims
Size: 51.65 acres.
Recording fee: \$2.50 per claim.
Representation: Assessment work to the extent of \$100.00 must be done each year and recorded on or before the anniversary date of record of the claim. Cash in the sum of \$100.00 may be paid in lieu of such assessment work. Fee for recording assessment work, \$2.50. If the required assessment work has been recorded within the year, but not recorded within that time, a free miner may within thirty days hereafter record such assessment work upon payment of an additional fee of \$10.00. The actual cost of the survey exceeding \$100.00 may also be recorded as assessment work. As soon as assessment work to the extent of \$500.00 for cash or a like amount is recorded and a survey made of the claim, the owner of such claim is entitled to a Crown Grant on payment of a fee of \$25.00, and giving the necessary notices required by the Act.

PLACER MINING ACT
Four types of placer claims: dry diggings; and precious stone diggings. (For details see Part II, Placer Mining Act.) Representation: A placer claim must be worked by the owner or someone on his behalf continuously as far as practicable during working hours. Lay-over leaves of absence may be declared by the Gold Commissioner under certain conditions. To hold a placer claim for more than one year it must be re-recorded before the expiration of the record or re-record.

Placer Mining Leases
Size and method of staking, etc.
Eighty acres in extent, staked along a "location line" not more than one-half mile in length. In this line one bend or change of direction is permitted. Where a straight line is followed two posts only are necessary, i.e., an "initial post" and a "final post." Where there is a change of direction a legal post must be placed to mark the point of the said change. The leasehold is allowed a width not in excess of one-quarter mile. The locator is required within thirty days after the date of the location to post a notice in the office of the Mining Recorder setting out the name of the applicant; the number of his free miner's certificate; the date of location; the number of feet lying to the right and left of the location line; and the approximate area or size of the ground.

Dredging leases on rivers for five miles below low-water mark are also granted. Fees: Annual rental on placer mining lease, \$30.00; annual development work required to be expended, \$250.00; annual rental on dredging lease, \$25.00 per mile; annual development work required to be expended, \$1,000.00 per mile; the value of any new plant or machinery employed to count as money expended in development. Fee for recording certificate of work, \$2.50. Lease fee, \$5.00.

Provisional Free Miners' Certificates. (Placer) Act
Department of Mines Act
Among other things, these Acts provide for the staking and representing of placer claims without payment of fees and assistance to prospectors by free assays, etc.

A detailed synopsis of the above Acts, also the "Mining Development Act," "Mineral Survey and Development Act," "Iron and Steel Bounties Act," and "Phosphate-mining Act," are available at the Department of Mines, Victoria. Complete copies of the Acts may be obtained from the King's Printer, Victoria.
