Former Monarch May Settle on His Canadian Ranch



H.R.H. the Duke of Windsor, formerly King Edward VIII, may settle on his Canadian ranch near High River, Alta., 90 miles from Calgary after the political furore created by his abdication has died away. It is considered improbable that he will return to England for many years, but there is nothing that would bar him from residing in Canada. It is pointed out that he would here find the seclusion that would be denied him in Europe. As Prince of Wales, Edward purchased the 4,000 acres of rangeland following a Canadian visit in 1919. It remains his private property. On his visit to the estate, known thereafter as the EP ranch, he made many friends among his ranch hands and neighbors, who liked him for his willingness to "mix." 

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

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
