Junior Chamber of Commerce Adorn Lamp Standards and Have Central Christmas Tree

Monthly Dinner

Variety of Matters Taken Up at Gathering Last Night—President Tells of Trip.

The Junior Chamber of Commerce will again endeavor to emphasize the Christmas atmosphere in Prince Rupert this year by decorating the ornamental lamp standards downtown with trees and by the erection of a large illuminated Christmas tree probably on the site of the new federal building. This was decided upon at the regular monthly dinner meeting of the Junior Chamber last evening. Lawrence Pierce will be chairman of the Christmas decoration committee. Members of the Junior Chamber will turn out next Sunday morning to get the work of decoration started.

Business at the meeting last night was largely of a general routine nature.

President J. C. Gilker, in the absence of a guest speaker, told some impressions of a recent trip to the Kootenay district. He had been impressed with the roads in that part of the country. The real wealth of these districts in the southern part of the province lay in their scenery as a tourist attraction, farming and mining. An increase in the price of silver, say to 55c and ounce, would mean a great revival of mining there as well as in the north. The change in transportation conditions as a result of highway development was most noticeable. Some railway lines had been abandoned altogether and on others steam trains had been replaced with the small diesel or power units. Mr. Gilker told how the lumber industry of Northern Washington had been adversely affected by the Sino-Japanese situation as had also been that of southern British Columbia. There were still many unemployed in such cities as Spokane and Seattle despite the supposed return of prosperity. Mr. Gilker told of visiting the Junior Chambers of Commerce in Seattle and Vancouver.

Mike McCaffery jr. and Frank Wilson have been elected as new members of the Junior Chamber. Dr. Gordon M. Schrum of the University of British Columbia, having advised that one University extension lecturer would be available this winter, the Junior Chamber decided to proceed with the lectures. G. P. Lyons will have charge of the arrangements of the lectures.

Assist Christmas Fund
In order to assist in raising funds for the annual Salvation Army Christmas appeal, the Junior Chamber will undertake a radio auction with George Rorie in charge.

Questionnaires in regard to questions to be taken up by the Royal Commission on Dominion-provincial relations were handed out to members at the meeting. On the basis of the answers a report will be prepared by a committee consisting of President Gilker, Past Presidents Lee Gordon and George Rorie, Vice-President R. G. Vandersluys and Secretary T. J. Williams.

There were communications from the Canadian Junior Chamber of Commerce in regard to proposed changes in constitution, proposed objectives and the national committee on traffic safety.

LABOR BILL BROUGHT IN

Be Unlawful for Employers to Train Employees From Organizing—Details of Measure

VICTORIA, Dec. 8. (CP)—The Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Act, making it unlawful for any employer to seek to restrain his employees from organizing, was introduced in the Legislature yesterday by Hon. G. S. Pearson, minister of labor. The bill recognizes the right of employers and employees "to organize for any lawful purpose" and requires that any such organizations shall file with the Minister of Labor details of objects, purposes and names of officers.

When dispute arises, application may be made to the minister for the appointment of a conciliation commissioner. Failing settlement, the minister is empowered to submit the dispute to three arbitrators, one named by the employees, one by the employer and these two to name the third.

Old Timer Of Stewart Lost

Search Instituted for Sandy McLeod Who Has Been Missing Since November 28

Alexander (Sandy) McLeod, well known old time prospector and miner of the Portland Canal district and also well known in Prince Rupert, has been missing at Stewart since November 28 and a search has now been instituted for him. McLeod was last seen at Hyder in the company of friends who have since left for the south. McLeod was known to have not left Stewart.

McLeod is fifty-six years of age, five feet seven inches in height and has grey hair, good teeth and a fresh complexion. When last seen he was wearing a grey cap, dark grey trousers, a reddish windbreaker and high black rubber boots.

BANDITS FOILED

Bank Manager and Clergyman Prevent \$30,000 International Nickel Payroll Lifting

CONISTON, Ont., Dec. 8. (CP) A bank manager and a minister foiled two armed men who attempted to steal a \$30,000 International Nickel Co. payroll from the Canadian Bank of Commerce branch here.

The robbers bound and gagged the wife of the branch manager, John Graham, and the wife of Rev. A. P. Addison and forced the two men to lead the way downstairs to the bank vault. When one robber turned momentarily Graham and Addison opened the door and ran out. The robbers escaped but without loot. Two shots were fired by the hold-up men but none were hurt. Coniston is seven miles east of Sudbury.

SPANISH RAIDING

Rebels Shell Madrid and Barcelona—Loyalists Get Reprisal At Majorca

BARCELONA, Spain, December 8—The Spanish loyalists claimed today that they had conducted a successful air raid over the insurgent island stronghold of Majorca as a reprisal for rebel air attacks on Barcelona and Madrid yesterday. The loyalists admitted that one of their planes had been brought down.

Both Madrid and Barcelona were shelled yesterday. Long range artillery poured shot at regular intervals into Madrid. In Barcelona it is said that fifty persons were killed and 150 injured.

No Income Tax Evasion Found
Late Andrew W. Mellon Cleared by United States Board of Tax Appeal

WASHINGTON, D.C., December 8—The late Andrew W. Mellon, one-time Secretary of the Treasury, Ambassador to Great Britain and noted financier, was not guilty of income tax evasion, it was determined yesterday by the board of tax appeals after an investigation of his estate.

NANKING REPORTS CONFLICT

Both Sides Claim Victories At Gates of Chinese Capital—Where Is Chiang Kai Shek?

DESERTING CHANG?
SHANGHAI—Possibility that China might form a new government without Premier-Generalissimo Chiang Kai Shek and make peace with Japan was advanced by authorities quarters here Thursday. The Generalissimo's departure from Nanking Tuesday, in face of the Japanese army, these sources reasoned, likely would cause subordinates to undertake whatever settlement is obtainable.

SHANGHAI, December 8 (Canadian Press)—There were widely conflicting reports today as to the progress of the battle between the Japanese invaders and the Chinese defenders for the former capital of Nanking. Both sides claimed victories as heavy fighting continued at the gates and walls. The Japanese claim that they have made a breach in the walls and actually entered the ancient city. On the other hand, Chinese authorities have declared that the Japanese had been badly beaten and that a thousand Japanese soldiers had been killed within two hours of fighting as two Japanese columns were repulsed as they attempted to storm two gates and scale the walls. A third column is claimed to have been held up at Muletkwan, failing to reach Nanking.

There are conflicting reports as to the activities and whereabouts of General Chiang Kai Shek, the Chinese leader. These reports ranged from one that he had given up hope and fled to Nanchang where he was about to sue for peace to another that he had not left Nanking at all but was continuing to personally direct the defence of Nanking by endeavouring to reform his troops.

At Tokyo, it is said, that the Japanese are delaying a major bombardment of Nanking in the hope of a peaceful surrender and general retreat by the Chinese, thus saving further bloodshed and destruction. However, the Japanese declare, they are ready to storm the city with heavy artillery from the land and bombing from the air if the surrender is long deferred.

At least one hundred thousand refugees are reported trapped in Nanking with no means of escape.

Japs Give Warning
Japanese authorities today warned all foreign and Chinese non-combatants to evacuate beleaguered Nanking as quickly as possible. "Hostilities may engulf the city at any time," they said. The Japanese said they considered the former capital "one large fortification" and, therefore, could not give Chinese non-combatants and foreigners assurance of safety in the so-called refugee zone.

Bridges have been blown up and village walls levelled in eastern suburbs of Nanking by the Chinese in the effort to destroy all possible cover for the attackers.

Coal And Petroleum In Province Will Be Put Under Regulation

Many Proposals to Govern Industry, Particularly in Consumer Phases, Provided for in Bill Placed Before Legislature

VICTORIA, December 8. (CP)—Establishment of a one-man board to effectively regulate and control the coal and petroleum industries in British Columbia is proposed in a bill introduced in the Legislature last night by Hon. Gordon Wismer, Attorney General. The board would be known as the "Coal and Petroleum Control Board." It would be empowered to fix prices at which coal or petroleum products may be sold in the province for use within the province. It would require every person engaged in the coal or petroleum industries to register with the board and obtain a license from it. It would also set the license fees and provide for their collection, suspend or revoke licenses, establish standards to be applied to petroleum products sold in the province and provide for examination and audit of all accounts of licensees. Further the bill provides that any person guilty of an offence under the Act would be liable on summary conviction to a maximum fine of \$5000.

DISTRICT IS COLD

Thermometer Descends to Twelve Below Zero at Burns Lake Today

The Government Telegraphs daily weather report indicates the first real cold snap of the winter now general in Prince Rupert district. The lowest thermometer reading for the day is twelve below zero at Burns Lake. Other interior points show corresponding cold as do Stewart, Anxox and Alice Arm. Skies are clear everywhere with wind in the northerly direction.

CANADIENS TAKE LEAD

Now Tied With Toronto Maple Leafs for First Place in Hockey Standing

MONTREAL, Dec. 8. (CP)—Les Canadiens moved into a tie with Toronto Maple Leafs for the leadership of the international division of the National Hockey League as a result of a five to one victory over their fellow townsmen, the Maroons last night.

The Boston Bruins losing streak continued when they were defeated in a close game 3 to 2 by the Detroit Red Wings at Boston.

INTERIOR VISITORS Eastern States Hit By Winter

Seventy-Four Persons Here Today On Annual Pre-Christmas Excursion to Town

Seventy-four interior people from points as far up the line as Prince George arrived in the city on last night's train on the annual pre-Christmas excursion of the Canadian National Railways. Some will be returning to their homes on this evening's train while others will remain until Friday evening. The hotels have quite a few of the visitors as guests. Some are receiving private hospitality with friends.

Terrace has sent the largest single group of visitors totalling 35. There are eleven from Burns Lake and nine from Prince George. Other points represented are: Smithers, five; Usk and Vanarsdol, three each; Telkwa, Kitwanga and Ex-stew, two each; Pacific and Skeena Crossing, one each.

ABERHART HOLDS ON

Social Credit Premier Shows no Signs of Resigning—Another Session of Legislature Planned

EDMONTON, Dec. 8. (CP)—Although no official announcement has been made, it is reported that another session of the Alberta Legislature will be called for about January 27.

There appears to be no disposition on the part of Premier William Aberhart to resign despite the recent reverse in the Lethbridge by-election. The Social Credit Premier does not admit that his administration has lost the confidence of the people.

Ten Inches of Snow in Upper New York—Frost Damages Crops in Florida

NEW YORK, December 8—Winter has clamped down on the Eastern States as far south as Florida. Ten inches of snow is reported in upper New York State. There is also snow and frost in Michigan and Indiana as well as other states in that area. Some points in Florida report temperature readings as low as 20 above. Some crops have suffered although no damage is as yet reported to the citrus fruits.

POSSIBLY A FEDERAL PROJECT

The connection of Prince Rupert with Terrace by Highway may possibly turn out to be a federal project carried out as part of the defense scheme for Northern British Columbia. Its strategic importance has already been recognized but whether it will be carried out is for the future to decide.

Prince Rupert has the key position in Northern British Columbia and, if there should be war, this would be one of the first places to be attacked by an enemy. With Northern British Columbia in the hands of an enemy, an effort would undoubtedly be made to take and keep all the country north of the railway including Alaska. This would include a country that is rich in minerals, timber, fish and agricultural land such as an overcrowded country would need. For this reason the defense of Prince Rupert is of paramount importance to Canada. It is very much to be desired that work on the defense should commence as soon as possible after the meeting of Parliament or even before that.

PROJECTS THAT INTEREST PRINCE RUPERT

The outstanding projects that interest Prince Rupert just now are adequate defense of the port, completion of the highway, erection of a pulp mill, construction of an airplane and seaplane base, direct connection by rail with the Peace River country and improvement of tourist facilities at Prince Rupert including the establishment of a tourist hotel either by the improvement of an existing one or the erection of a new one. Last but not least comes city beautification by the co-operation of the city, the railway company, the provincial government and the citizens. This seems to be rather a large order but none of the items mentioned are impossible of achievement and to bring them to fruition all the energies of the citizens should be centred.

THE NEXT MOVE

Presuming that the Chinese allow Japan to take Nanking, the interesting thing will be to note what will be the next move on the part of the invaders. Canton is the most important city in the south and the most accessible. Situated not far from Hong Kong, the invading armies and fleet will be within reach of the guns of Hong Kong, an island that is British territory. Across the harbor from Hong Kong is the British naval station of Kowloon on the mainland of China, which is also fortified. It is the headquarters for the British China squadron which, presumably is not very strong just now, most of the ships of the British navy being quartered in home waters of the Mediterranean.

So far the Chinese generals have followed the program laid down before the war commenced. They have retired in an orderly manner before the highly mechanized Japanese with the evidently object of making the big fight on the most favorable ground. Whether the Japanese will allow the Chinese to lure them on or will simply hold what they have and turn their attention to some other part of the country remains now to be seen.


LOCAL NEWS

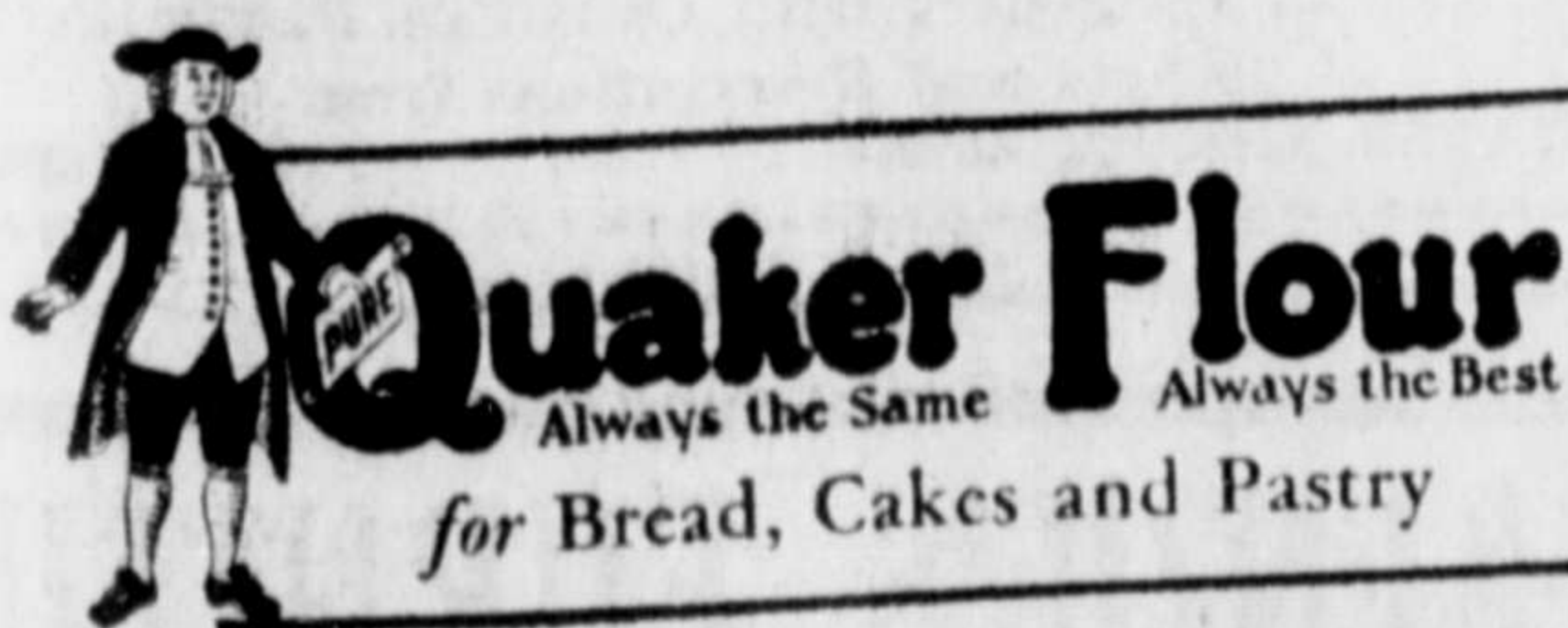

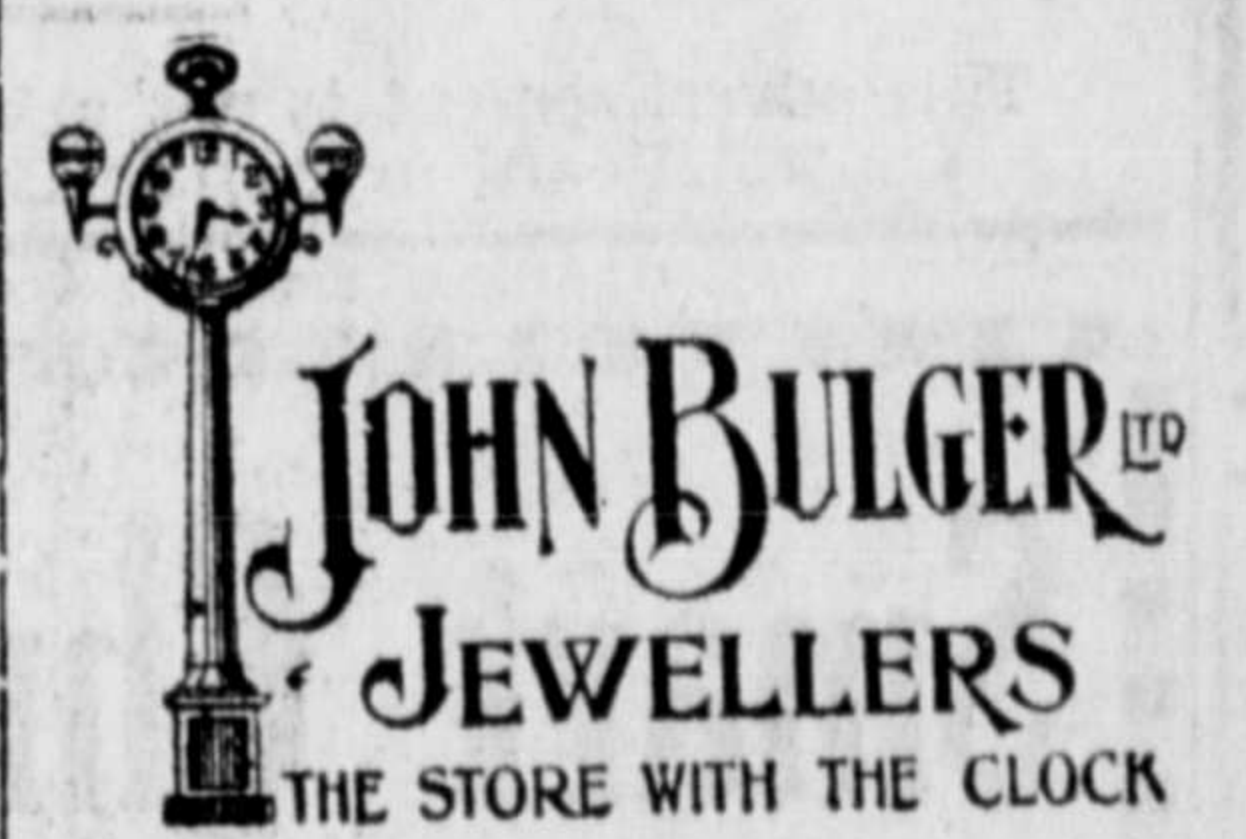
