PEIPING, China, July 8: (CP)-Chinese troops, ignoring the Japanese demand that they surrender, fought a Japanese drive on the walled city of Wanpingsien vesterday, manning the battlement with machine guns. Five hundred troops were sent to the city while an additional 1500 Chinese soldiers erected defences across the Yinging River.

Fighting broke out in the suburbs of Peiping between Japanese and the Chinese 29th route army after a midnight skirmish between troops conducting night manoeuvres. It continued throughout the night, the struggle for possession of the western suburbs of Peipeng continuing today as the agreement to withdraw troops from the battle zone failed.

Reinforcements were ordered to advance to the aid of the Japanese from Tienstin. Guns and tanks were also dispatched to the scene of the fighting.


