American Passenger Plane Crashes Near Pittsburg; Death List as Result is Thirteen

PITTSBURG, March 27:-Another major disaster on United States air lines occurred late Thursday when a Transcontinental and Western Air Lines fourteen-passenger plane, bound from Newark to Chicago, crashed into a cornfield near Pittsburg. Three members of the plane crew and ten passengers met instant death. The plane had just received orders for landing at Pittsburg. The cause of its sudden disastrous plunge to earth from an altitude of 210 feet has not been definitely accounted for although the company expresses belief that it was due to ice forming on the aerelons as a result of which the ship got out of control. A searching inquiry has been instituted by the federal authorities.


