CANADIAN NATIONAL REQUIRES LESS THAN FORTY MILLIONS

BOSTON, Dec. 17: (CP)—A little less than \$40,000,000 will be required from the federal treasury to meet the Canadian National Railway deficit this year, Hon. Clarence D. Howe, Canadian minister of transport, said in an address here. Gross earnings of the Canadian National for the year, estimated to exceed \$200,000,000, are the best in several years. The deficit last year was \$43,000,000 and this year \$35,000,000 is appropriated in the estimates for deficit.

EXPORTING OF POWER

Premier King Answers Challenge of Premier Hepburn, Saying Parliament Will Settle Dispute

TORONTO, December 17 (Canadian Press)—Premier Mitchell Hepburn of Ontario yesterday challenged any Ontario or Quebec member of the House of Commons to vote to deny the province's right to export surplus electrical power under contract. "If they vote against permitting us to export they are voting against the best interests of their constituents," Premier Hepburn said.

OTTAWA, December 17 (Canadian Press)—Commenting on a challenge by Premier Hepburn of Ontario with respect to the right of the province to export hydro electric power, Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King last night said that any dispute on that subject would be settled by Parliament. The government was at present opposed to such export, Mr. King said.

No Farm Bill Vote Is Taken

Rowdy Night Session in United States Senate—House Still at Hours and Wages

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 17:—After a rowdy three hour night session was ended, still no time had been set last night for the long overdue final vote in the Senate on the farm relief bill. The House is still battling over wages and hours of work legislation.

TAKEN TO HOSPITAL

MOORBY DUE MONDAY
Advice was received here today that the British motorship Moorby will be here about Monday next to load a full cargo of grain from the local elevator for the United Kingdom or Continent. Capt. Dan McKinnon is arriving this afternoon on the Princess Adelaide from Vancouver to act as pilot for the vessel.

FRENCH SHIP ATTACKED
TANGIER, International Zone of Morocco—An "S.O.S." reporting she had been attacked by Spanish warships one mile south of Europa Point was picked up today from the French steamship Sydney. Lloyds register lists a 119-ton vessel named Sydney registered out of Lorient, France. The message did not indicate whether the vessel had been damaged.

THRIVE ON RELIEF
CALGARY—It has been disclosed that a Calgary family, which started out with eight in 1937 and has lived on relief ever since, has now increased to twenty-two.

VERNON SCHOOL OPENS
VERNON—A new \$125,000 school building here was formally opened yesterday by Hon. Dr. George M. Weir, minister of education.

WITH WINDSORS
PARIS—It was announced by a spokesman of the Duke and Duchess of Windsor today that the former monarch and his bride would leave Tuesday for Cannes to spend Christmas as the guests of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Rogers. Early in January they will return to Paris.

HOSPITAL AT McBRIDE
VANCOUVER—Miss Grace Wright and Miss Inez Brown, Vancouver nurses, have left for McBride to take charge of a hospital consisting of surgery and six beds which is being opened at McBride by the Red Cross Society. Other such hospitals are being opened at Hope, Malahat, on the Pacific Highway and at Yahk.

BREAK AT ALCATRAZ
SAN FRANCISCO—Police and coastguard officers are combing San Francisco Bay waters and shores for two long term convicts—Ralph Roe, aged 29, and Theodore Cole—who escaped from Alcatraz federal prison yesterday. They are the first convicts ever to make their getaway from the supposedly "escape proof" prison which was founded a few years ago to house the country's most desperate criminals. Roe and Cole vanished during a dense fog and are believed by Warden James Johnston to have had little chance to get ashore safely through the swirling tides. The general belief is that the two southwestern desperadoes, both from Oklahoma, Roe from Duncan and Cole from Stroud, must have been drowned and their bodies carried out to sea.

PATTULLO HITS BACK

West Has Been No Burden To East—On Other Hand It Has Been "Luscious Milk Cow"

VICTORIA, December 17 (Canadian Press)—Premier T. D. Pattullo of British Columbia said today that he deprecated statements "attributed to Ontario and Quebec" that the central provinces of Canada "do not wish to be burdened by the west."

Mr. Pattullo said that, far from being a burden, the west has "not only paid its way to the last penny but has been a most luscious milk cow for the good old provinces of Ontario and Quebec."
Hepburn Knows Nothing
TORONTO, December 17 (Canadian Press)—Mr. Duplessis might have been in touch with the Maritimes but I don't know anything about it," declared Premier Mitchell Hepburn of Ontario in regard to a statement attributed to Premier Maurice Duplessis that Quebec, Ontario and the Maritime Provinces were considering an alliance whereby they would divorce themselves from the rest of Canada.

Premier Aberhart
EDMONTON, December 17 (Canadian Press)—"The East should take its hands out of its pockets," said Premier William Aberhart of Alberta in commenting upon the Ontario-Quebec-Maritime Provinces alliance suggestion of Premier Duplessis of Quebec.

QUEBEC, December 17 (Canadian Press)—Returning here yesterday from Shawinigan Falls where he made his speech proposing an alliance of Ontario and the Maritime Provinces, Premier Maurice Duplessis reiterated his conviction of the desirability of such a plan.

Tokyo Complains Of Treatment By The Soviets Of Its Subjects; In Hong Kong Trouble Looked For

British Bolstering Their Fortifications as Nipponese Campaign Spreads Southward in China—United States To Send Further Protest

TOKYO, Dec. 17: (CP)—The Japanese Foreign Office today formally charged the Soviet Union with acting in a manner "utterly unthinkable in any civilized country" in connection with the arrests of Japanese in Russia. The Foreign Office protested to the Soviet embassy, citing what Japan called numerous cases in which Soviet authorities had arrested Japanese and held them without trial. A memorandum accompanying the protest said that Japan wished a "reasonable" answer.

Almost concurrently, the Tokyo newspaper Yomiuri charged that Russia was continuing to strengthen military forces at Vladivostok, Russian Far East seaport.
No Direct Reply
A Foreign Office spokesman indicated today that Japan might not receive a direct reply to the United States protest in the Panay incident on the ground that the government had apologized before the American note was delivered.
A meeting of the cabinet which was to have been held today has been postponed until next week.

The Third Japanese Fleet has been recalled from Shanghai waters and will be replaced by the Second Fleet. This amounts to the recall of Admiral Hasayama, who has been in charge of naval operations for Japan in that area, and the order may or may not be an outcome of the Panay incident.
Object To British
OSAKA, December 7 (Canadian Press)—At a meeting of business and political leaders here yesterday, opposition was expressed to British interference in China. Excitement was taken by resolution to British assistance to Japan and to British efforts to bring about a settlement of the Sino-Japanese conflict.

SHANGHAI, December 7 (Canadian Press)—Japanese warfare today threatened to spread to the South China coast in far-flung attacks of Japanese forces "not satisfied" with the capture of Nanking. Chinese sources expect a Japanese attempt to invade southern Kwantung Province and attack Canton, sixty miles northwest of the British crown colony of Hong Kong.
Indeed, it was reported today that Canton had already been subjected to a heavy aerial bombardment, evidently preparatory to a land attack.
Chinese casualties on all fronts so far in the Sino-Japanese conflict are estimated at 300,000 with property loss of an extent so great that it is difficult to estimate. The United States gunboat Cahu arrived at Shanghai today with dead and wounded and rescued survivors from her sister ship Panay.

Chicago Infants' Ailment Clearing

One of Babies Sufficiently Recovered to Go Home—Others Getting Better
CHICAGO, Dec. 17:—Nathaniel Porter, 23 days old, one of the infants who was stricken in hospital here with a strange form of diarrhea which proved fatal to twelve babies, has sufficiently recovered to be able to be taken home. One of the other babies is doing nicely and will be able to go home soon. Another is still in serious condition but hopes are held for recovery.

convey to the general public it would really be too foolish to bother with.

I haven't had time to collect many statistics on the subject, but I do know that there are over 50 men employed in connection with the Tucks Inlet plant and that the smallest wage is 40c an hour. Is that a minimum wage? Mr. Rushbrook?

I should say that there are about one hundred and thirty men employed in the local herring reduction industry at present and that ninety percent of them are local men. Did Mr. Rushbrook take into consideration what a payroll of this size means to Prince Rupert? If not I would suggest that he ask some of the business people in town about it.

And does Mr. Rushbrook think that our very efficient Department of Fisheries is asleep on the job? If so I think that it would be wise for him to interview the local supervisor, Mr. Boyd, before seeking further publicity, and that he also look into the uses of herring meal and oil.

I myself am only an ignorant fisherman. But I will be delighted to discuss this matter with Mr. Rushbrook either in public or privately if he so desires.

In closing I should say that in my opinion Rev. W. F. Rushbrook should attend to his own business of saving souls and leave the conservation of fish to those who understand such matters.

I had a night school assignment for the Educational Department and among those covered was the cooking class where students were making pastries. Hot water pie crust seemed to be popular so I copied the receipt for you. I have tried it out myself and it is grand.

Hot Water Pastry

2 cups flour;
1/2 cup shortening plus 2 table-spoons;

1 tablespoon lemon juice or vinegar;

3-3 cup boiling water;
1 teaspoon salt;

1/2 teaspoon baking powder.

Method: Sift and measure flour, sift dry ingredients together. Cut in shortening. Add lemon juice to boiling water. Add to flour and shortening mixture gradually. Cool pastry. Roll, using very little flour.

The addition of vinegar or lemon juice is the mysterious "something" that keeps the crust tender. Try it yourself. The results will delight you.
