## GOOD WILL MEETINGS

Women's Conferences at Vancouver To Stress International Amity

VANCOUVER, June 7: (CP)-Six international conferences of women will be held this summer and early fall, one in Canada, one in the United States and others in Europe. Two will be devoted wholly to the promotion of world wace and international underanding and it is expected that his theme will play a large part in he programs of the other four.

The peace conferences are those the Pan-Pacific Women's Association in Vancouver, July 12-24, and the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom in Luhacovice, Czechoslovakia, July! 27-31. The theme of the former is "Practical Ways and Means of Promoting Peace," and of the latter, "For a New International Or-

The Women's Christian Temperance Union will meet in Washington June 2-8, while the International Federation of Business and Professional Women has chosen Stockholm for its international convention, June 15-18.

Two meetings are scheduled for Paris, "The Mother in the Home," an association devoted to the work women for human progress, June 21-26, and the International o - operative Women's Guild which has for its provisional agena "The Position of Women in the Co-operative Movement," Septem-

Other international peace meetings which interest both men and women will be that of the "Institute of Intellectual Co-operation" which has planned a series of meetings on subjects pertaining to international afafirs in Paris June 28-July 28; the International Federation of League of Nations Societies at Bratislava, Czechoslovakia, June 28-July 3; International War Resisters, Copenlagen, July 23-26, and a world conference for International Peace through Religion at Geneva in September.

Mrs. George Black Gives Recipe For Holding Beauty of Wild Flowers

OTTAWA, June 7: (CP)-"Patience, fresh flowers, absorbent cotton, blotting paper and cardboard are all you need to preserve the beauty of wild flowers," Mrs. George Black says.

The little white-haired member of parliament from the Yukon has given her formula for pressing and mounting fresh flowers so their beauty may be preserved. She is the originator of the craft known as artistic botany and says flowers mounted in this way last as long Renews Threat Of as five years.

"After gathering, press the flowers between alternate layers of second-grade cotton and blotting wisps of cotton between each petal; of many-petalled flowers," is her first instruction.

#### Synopsis of Land Act PRE-EMPTIONS

JACANT, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation and improvement. Pull information concerning Pre-emp-

tions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C.; Bureau of Provincial Information. Victoria, or any Government Agent Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes within reasonable distance of road, school and marketing facilities and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre east of the Coast Range and 8.000 feet per acre west of that Range.

Applications for pre-emptions are to b the Land Recording Division in which the land applied for is situated, on printed forms obtained from the Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.
