## MURDER OF MISSIONARIES BY CHINESE CONFIRMED

### CHINESE MISSIONARIES ARE FOULLY MURDERED

(Canadian Press Despatch.)  
 Pekin, Nov. 22—The killing of foreigners at Sian Fu has been further confirmed by Chinese students arriving from there. They say that during the fighting a city mob attacked the China Inland Mission outside the city and murdered Mrs. Breckman, an American missionary and five of the Mission children. Mr. Breckman escaped with wounds. The surviving foreigners are being sheltered by the Chinese Christians.

### HON. A.G. MACKAY GETS NOMINATED

 Owen Sound, Nov. 22.—Hon. A. G. Mackay, who recently resigned the leadership of the Liberal party in Ontario, has been again given the unanimous nomination for North Grey.

Dr. W. A. Henderson has been given the Liberal nomination at West Lambton to oppose Provincial Secretary W. J. Hanna at the Ontario elections on Dec. 11th.

### IMMIGRANTS ARE COMING IN FAST

(Canadian Press Despatch.)  
 Ottawa, Nov. 22—During seven months of 1911 a total of 265,833 immigrants arrived in Canada. 172,260 were from Europe, and 93,973 from the States. In the period of 1910 the total was 227,805, being 142,529 from Europe and 85,276 from the States.

### WOULD ABOLISH WARD SYSTEM

The Victoria Trades and Labor Council has passed a resolution favoring the abolishing of the ward system and has sent a request to the Victoria City Council asking that they submit a referendum to the people at the coming municipal election dealing with the abolition of the ward system of voting.

### GOVERNMENT WILL NOT GO ON WITH THE NAVY

(Canadian Press Despatch.)  
 Ottawa, Nov. 22—Following Premier Borden's intimation yesterday that the people of Canada will have the naval question submitted to them, Hon. J. D. Hazen, Minister of Marine stated in the House today that the tenders offered the late Government to spend over eleven million dollars in six years to construct four cruisers and six destroyers would not be accepted. He said the whole question from first to last will be taken up with the British Admiralty and a plan announced later that will appeal to the interests of Canada and the Empire as well.

### NEW STEAMER "PRINCESS SOPHIA" WILL BE PUT ON THE ISLAND RUN

The new steamer 'Princess Sophia' which the C. P. R. is having built at Bow MacLachlan's yards at Paisley, Scotland, for the Queen Charlotte, run was launched last week. She is expected to make her maiden trip in the first week of April. In appearance she much resembles the Princess May. Her length is 245 feet., 44 foot beam, and 1,200 tonnage. She will have oil burners and make 14 knots an hour.

As a passenger vessel the Princess Sophia will be one of the best in the northern trade. She will have 80 staterooms opening on deck and seating arrangements for 108 passengers. There will be accommodation for 150 second class passengers aft on the main deck and special apartments on the orlop deck forward for Orientals.

### MORE MINERS FROM GOOSE BAY

Inclement weather and snow-fall are retarding development work at Goose Bay mines. The G.T.P. s.s. Prince Albert brought seventy-seven men from there last night. The men complain that they were laid off eleven days ago, but could not get transportation and had to board themselves. This is the main grievance at Goose Bay.

### CAPT. WALBURN IS AN AUTHORITY ON THE BRITISH COLUMBIA COAST

Captain Walburn who has taken charge of the Dominion Govt. S.S. Quadra, light-house and buoy tender for this coast, had command of the Quadra previous to 1902 when he was transferred to the Marine and Fisheries Department. He knows this coast better than most men navigating it, and was the author of the official work published giving the names and origins of the names of every island and point on the coast. This work took some eighteen months or two years to prepare, the Captain being continuously engaged on it at Victoria. It is interesting to note that three of the islands opposite Rivers Inlet are named after members of Captain Walburn's family.

### CAPT. DAN LINDBERG IS ONE OF THE BEST SEAMEN ON THE COAST

The stranding of the launch Independence at Halibut Bay the other day is an example of the trying conditions under which seafaring work is done on the coast here during the winter.

Dan Lindberg, the owner of the launch, was one of the very best seamen on the coast. He has been in these parts for fully five years or more. He built the launch at Port Simpson in 1907, and has sailed her a great deal. The boat is 30 feet long and built to sail as well as her gas-line auxiliary drives her.

Before regular steamers were running up to Stewart and Port Simpson Mr. Lindberg did a good deal of work ferrying passengers in his boat. This is the first time he has had a mishap, and the reason for the trouble in this case is said to be the exception severity of the squall which caught the boat. Navigation of the waters around Prince Rupert is no child's play as launch owners here know.

In Caxton's Bay, the father of printing toiled over his types, setting each single letter by hand.

Today, the expert compositor with the latest form multiple type-setting machine--the kind the News is having installed--sits on a stool in front of his complicated machine and by pressing on his keyboard commands a range of five hundred and forty types.

But, for a few days, while effecting the change, the News will have to fall back on the Caxton method of hand set type. It will be a novel newspaper. It will have all the local stories and the news of the world, as usual, but compressed into tabloid form.

The present and succeeding copies of the News will be well worth treasuring among your keepsakes of the evolution of Prince Rupert.

### ARE TRYING HARD TO GET WORK STARTED ON WOODWORTH SCHEME

The City Council is working overtime these days trying to get some work started on the Woodworth Lake scheme. Excavations for the pipe line within the city limits are necessary. In a few days Col. Davis expects to be ready to call for tenders on this work. The Acropolis Hill reservoir, which but for absurd interference would have been completed years ago, can be recommenced shortly, and there is the blasting out of the Shawatlans Lake natural rock shelf at its outflow to the passage. This latter work also requires Government sanction, which it is hoped may be obtained swiftly and without hitch. A meeting of the council is called for Thursday.

### V.C. HERO HELD AS A SUSPECT

(Special to Daily News.)  
 San Francisco, Nov. 22—John R. Swan, who won the Victoria Cross in the South African war, and who has received presentations here for life saving, is under arrest. He is thought to be wanted for murder in Bloemfontain. A charge of cruelty in connection with his children led to his arrest, and a search through his papers led to his connection with the fugitive from Bloemfontain.

### BANK REWARDS LUCKY FINDERS

New Westminster, Nov. 22—A reward of ten per cent. has been paid by the bank of Montreal to the six workmen who found \$24,370 of stolen money recently. Each man gets a little over \$400.

### MAY NOT PRESS CHARGE

Friends of George Alexander's Are Anxious to Give the Young Man a Chance and Are Recovering the Diamond Ring.

George Alexander, the young man who got into trouble yesterday over his handling of a diamond ring valued at some \$175 and the property of J. S. Gray, Jeweller, Sixth street, is likely to be released from his position under arrest. A few good friends of his have got together and planned that by the recovery of the missing ring, which can be located easily enough. By its return to Mr. Gray, the trouble for George can be got over. Mr. Gray was not desirous of pressing the charge against the young man.

### BIG STEAMER IS ON THE ROCKS

## LONDON SUFFRAGETTES WAGE BATTLE AGAINST 1800 POLICE

They Stoned the Windows of the Liberal Club, the Public Offices, the Post Office and the Bank of England—Worst Riot of Recent Years—223 Arrests Made

(Special to Daily News.)  
 London, Nov. 22.—The worst riot that London has known for some years took place last night. It was promoted by the suffragettes. It took 1800 policemen to quell the disorder. In consequence, 320 female and 3 male suffragists are now in custody.

The riot started when the demonstrators tried to storm the House of Commons which was in session. Having failed to gain an entrance to the House they turned their attention to smashing the windows of the public offices, the Liberal headquarters, the National Liberal Club, the post office and the Bank of England. They were accompanied by a gang of male rowdies, armed as well as the women with large stones. Several of the women were injured. The battle was fierce but short.

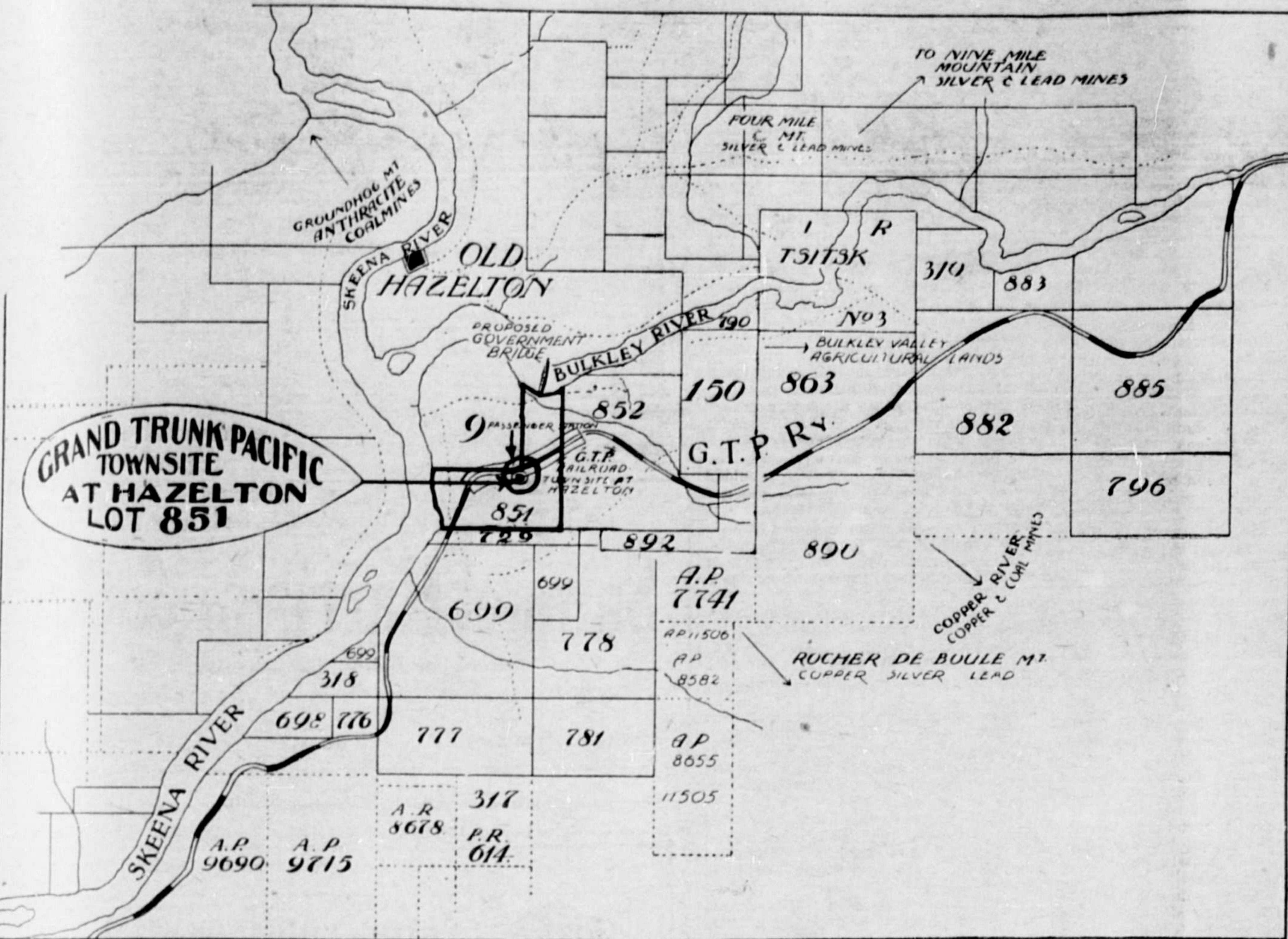

**THE BIG FIGHT**

From many angles the biggest fight that has taken place in England in years will be that between Jem Driscoll, English featherweight champion, and Owen Moran. It is to be held December 2 at Birmingham, Moran's native city, and preparations are being made for the battle upon much the same scale as for a world's championship affair in the States. And in one respect at least the two will be very much alike. Exchanges say the men in charge of the Driscoll-Moran affair are having tickets printed that are the exact replica of those for the Johnson-Jeffries mill. Nothing of that sort has ever been seen in England. There will be accommodation for something over 17,000, and the price sale of seats will run all the way from five shillings to five guineas, the latter being, of course, the price for the choicest box and ringside seats. The building itself will be 260 feet long by just about one-half that width. Although the boxes are to make weight the affair is not for any time. Driscoll has already gone into active training. The featherweight champion is, as usual, at Cardiff, while Owen Moran is quartered at Malvern. The bout is to be refereed by Eugene Corri, and Corri's very presence in the ring will give it any tone it might otherwise lack through being staged outside of London and the National Sporting Club.

**LORD DERBY AS WINNER**

English sporting papers to hand by yesterday's mail contain a statistical table of the winning breeders, owners, trainers and jockeys on the turf, compiled from March 20 to November 3, inclusive. Lord Derby heads the list of winning owners (his total winnings amounting to £41,460. During the season his nine horses won twenty-eight big events. J. B. Joel, owner of the Derby winner this year, is second with winnings aggregating £34,629. Mr. Joel entered seventeen horses during the season and won thirty-five races. Lord Derby and Mr. Joel are the only owners who won above £10,000 during the season. Mr. Joel leads among winning breeders, while the leading trainer was Hon. G. Lambton. F. Wooten was the leading jockey, with a percentage of 25.29. He had 680 mounts during the season. His record shows 172 firsts, 136 seconds, 112 thirds and 260 unplaced. Mr. Fairie, who led the list of winning owners last year, is fourth on the list this year, his winnings during the season aggregating £9,607. Third place on the list is occupied by C. E. Howard, who won £10,014.

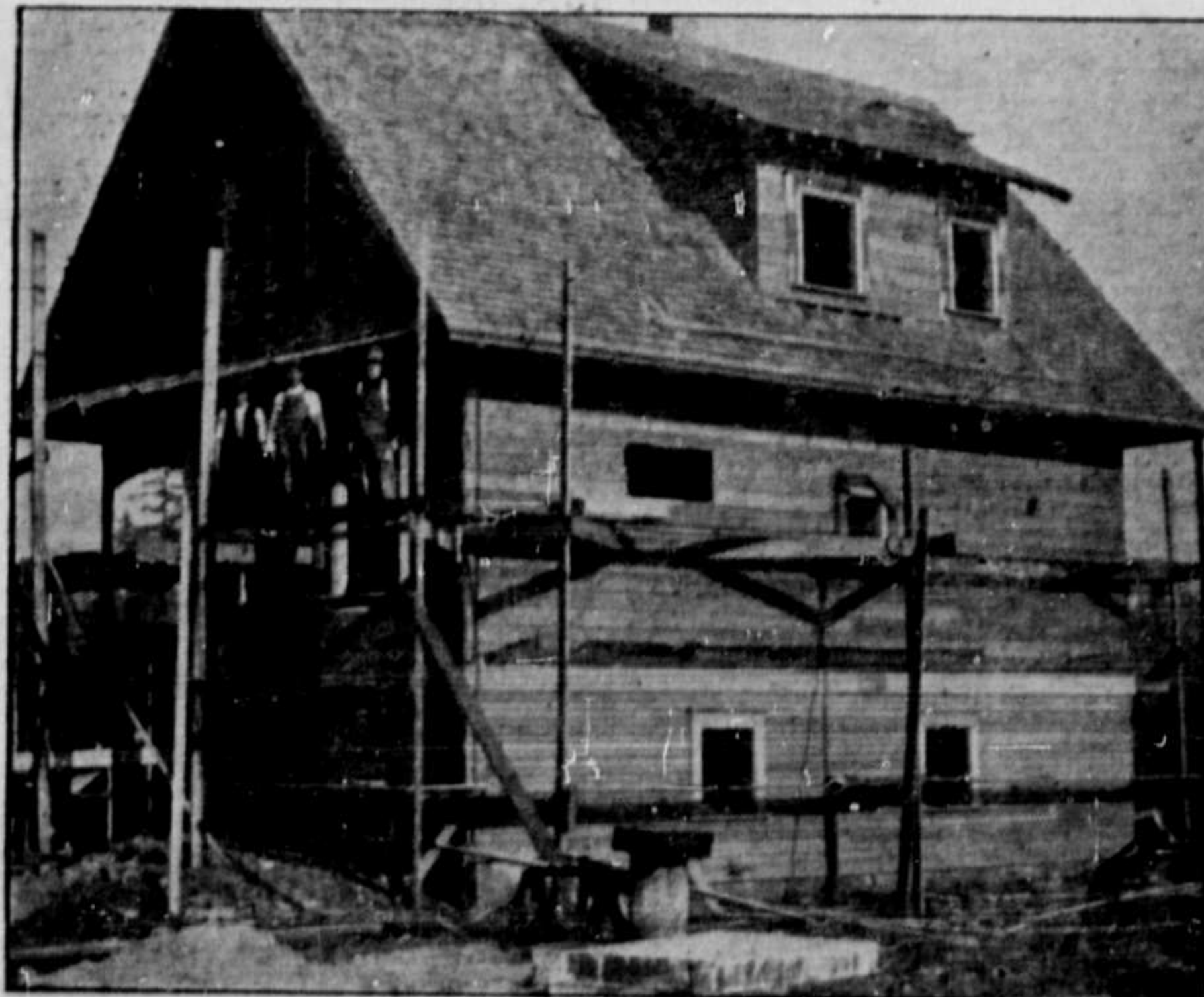
